In NIE-9: TURKEY'S POSITION IN THE EAST-WEST STRUGGLE

- 1. Reference Page 1, Par. 1, Line. 4. Revise as follows:

- 2. Reference Page 2, Par. 2. Add the following sentence to end of

OK paragraph: However, in this case Turkey would still attempt to maintain a policy of neutrality and, in any event, would resist with force any direct attack on Turkish territory.

- 3. Reference Pars. 3 and 4, Page 2, and top of Page 3. Change to Par. 5, a, and b, as indicated in Par. 5 below.

- 4. Reference Pars. 5 and 6, Page 3. Change numbers of paragraphs to 3 and 4.

- 5. Reference Page 3. Add the following as Par. 5, a, b, and c:

5. In the event that ^{advanced} Soviet ~~moves~~ in the Middle East (against Iran, Iraq, and Syria on one flank of Turkey and against Greece on the other) ^{which} do not result in general war, Turkey's foreign policy would probably be as follows:

3. a. Turkey would probably not alter its alignment ~~with the West~~ even if its ^{were partially} ~~land~~ ^(from the West) communications with the Western Powers were virtually cut off, by Soviet conquest or absorption of Iran, Iraq, and Syria. In this event, Turkey would probably be obliged to adopt a more cautious policy toward the USSR but would almost certainly not grant the USSR territorial or other major concessions leading to ~~or embark on~~ a policy

7. 8. In the event of general war, Turkey, if not itself attacked, probably would initially maintain a her non-belligerency status but would do everything compatible with that status to facilitate a Western victory.

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8. Reference Par. 1, Page 4, of DISCUSSION. Revise as follows:

1. Turkey is determined to resist Soviet expansion. ~~Short of~~
However, a US retreat into hemispheric isolationism, or the outflanking of
Turkey by the USSR through the control of Greece, Iran, Iraq, and Syria,
would force Turkey to abandon her pro-US alignment and attempt to maintain
a policy of neutrality, and as long as it is not completely cut off from
Western aid, Turkey will remain solidly aligned with the West.

3. ~~At present the primary~~ One of the main objectives of Turkey's
foreign policy is to obtain a US commitment to come to Turkey's defense in
event of a Soviet or Soviet-Satellite attack.

10. Reference Par. 4, Page 6. End Paragraph 4 at end of sentence,
line 7. Change remainder of paragraph to 5, a, as indicated below in new
paragraph 5.

11. Add new Paragraph 5 as follows:

5. In the event that possible Soviet moves in the Middle East
(against Iran, Iraq, and Syria on one flank of Turkey and against Greece on
the other) do not result in general war, Turkey's foreign policy would probably
be as follows:

a. Even if its land communications with the West were virtually
cut off by Soviet conquest or absorption of Iran, Iraq, and Syria, Turkey
would probably not alter its alignment with the West. In this event,
Turkey would be obliged to adopt a more cautious policy toward the USSR.

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A number of individuals not unacceptable to the USSR might be brought into the government, and internal security measures would be tightened. It is unlikely, however, that Turkey would agree to territorial or other major concessions, request the US military mission to leave Turkey, or otherwise appease the USSR.

5v b. Assuming that the USSR has not taken over Iran, Iraq, and Syria, and if ~~If, after Soviet occupation of Iran, Iraq, and Syria,~~ the US failed to oppose militarily Satellite occupation of Greece or refused to consider a Soviet attack on Greece as sufficient justification for US declaration of war against the USSR, then Turkey's attitude would depend on broader strategic considerations. These considerations would include: (a) the degree of military preparedness in Western Europe; (b) Western military strength in North Africa and the Eastern Mediterranean; (c) the attitude of the US toward Turkey and US strategic plans concerning Turkey; and (d) the attitude of the Western Powers in general and of the US in particular toward Soviet aggression. We believe, however, that Turkey would probably maintain its pro-US alignment, provided the US left no doubt of its determination to oppose the USSR globally and to support and supply Turkey to the utmost of its ability. If Turkey were unable to obtain assurances of such support, it would probably attempt to adopt a neutralist policy of neutrality.

c. In the event that Turkey were outflanked completely by Soviet control of Greece in the west, and Iran, Iraq, and Syria in the east and south, the Turks probably would conclude that the US would be

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unable to support and supply them in the event of war. In such circum-
stances, Turkey would still attempt to maintain a policy of neutrality.
In this isolated position, however, Turkey would probably be eventually
forced to make substantial territorial or other major concessions leading
to a policy of general appeasement.

12. Reference Par. 6, Page 8. Revise Par. 6 to read as follows:

6. ~~Virtually the only circumstance which~~ The adoption by the US
of a policy of hemispheric defense would cause Turkey automatically to abandon
its pro-US alignment, ~~would be the adoption by the US of a policy of hemispheric~~
~~defense. Almost by definition, such a development would force Turkey to revise~~
~~its foreign policy.~~ However, even if Turkey were isolated from the West in
this way, the Turks would continue to resist Soviet pressure, and would attempt
to maintain a policy of neutrality. In time, a body of opinion favoring
appeasement and accommodation with the USSR would probably grow up and might
eventually dominate Turkish policy, but at present it appears more likely that
the Turks would -- if necessary -- fight for their independence, no matter how
suicidal such a course might be.

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
