De Lattre will request more troops for Indochina: 25X1A General De Lattre has stated that he has "fair hopes" of obtaining the 20,300 additional troops, consisting of 6,300 French troops, 7,000 Africans and 7,000 Indochinese recruited locally, which he is going to request while in Paris De Lattre heliower that the

he is going to request while in Paris. De Lattre believes that the greatest danger from a Chinese Communist invasion exists from now until May 1 and that, after that time, his defense preparations will be in an "advanced stage." US Legation Saigon concurs in De Lattre's estimate of needed reinforcements, and comments that De Lattre previously believed the period of greatest danger would not end until June 1.

<u>Comment</u>: The continuing delay in creating a Vietnamese army makes these reinforcements all the more necessary. De Lattre has threatened to resign if his demands are not met; it is expected they will be substantially fulfilled regardless of possible changes in the French cabinet.

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US Embassy Moscow views seriously the possibility that the Soviet Union may soon present a diplomatic demarche' to Turkey suggesting a renewal of their non-aggression treaty, per-

haps offering "moderate" proposals concerning the straits, and waiving territorial claims to the Kars and Ardahan districts. For some months, according to the Embassy, a pattern of Soviet "sweet reasonableness" has become apparent as part of Soviet efforts to neutralize Near Eastern countries. Since Turkey alone in the Near East possesses the

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capability of substantial resistance to the USSR in case of war, the Embassy believes that "neutralization" of Turkey is a major objective of Soviet policy.

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
