MEMORANDUM FOR: Deputy Director (Intelligence)

SUBJECT: Monitoring of Baltic SSR's

1. The attached project is forwarded for consideration by the Projects Review Committee. It would be greatly appreciated if this project could be considered by the Committee during its meeting next week or, at the latest, the week after.

2. Representatives of BBC will be in Washington early in December to discuss monitoring activities with FBID, and Baltic coverage should be discussed with them at that time.

3. This project was approved in principle by the Deputy Director (Intelligence) on 31 October 1952.

SUBJECT: Monitoring of Baltic SSR's

1. **PROBLEM.**—To provide radio monitoring coverage of the Baltic SSR's and other areas of northwestern USSR.
2. **FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM.**
 - a. The need for this project arises out of the responses (Tabs D-L) to Tab C.
 - b. The British Broadcasting Corporation Monitoring Service (BBC MS):
 - (1) under the terms of the reciprocal arrangement has primary responsibility for monitoring transmitters in northwestern USSR,
 - (2) probably cannot undertake the coverage within its strict budgetary limitation,
 - (3) can provide the coverage more economically and with less difficulty than the Foreign Broadcast Information Division,
 - (4) will make the full product of any of its monitoring available to FBID.
 - c. Stockholm appears to be the most suitable location technically for monitoring of northwestern USSR. A BBC MS reception survey shows that regular coverage of Karelo-Finnish, Estonian, Latvian and Byelorussian Republics, as well as of Leningrad and Kaliningrad, could be maintained. (Tab B)
 - d. Coverage would require a BBC staff at Stockholm for listening and recording and at BBC MS headquarters at Gowerham, England, for transcribing records at an approximate annual cost of \$50,000.
 - e. The potential significant yield from such a monitoring operation is estimated to average between five and ten thousand words per day in the following principal categories:

- (1) Economic, agricultural and industrial data.
- (2) Regional political and sociological information.
- (3) Other information useful to the U. S. psychological effort.

3. DISCUSSION.

- a. The ESO NS can provide Baltic area coverage more cheaply than FEID can, due principally to the difference in British and American wages. It is reasonable to expect a better coordinated operation from ESO NS since it presently covers Moscow and Eastern Europe. Finally, it is believed that FEID as an overt component of CIA would encounter more difficulty in securing Swedish permission to operate in Stockholm than would the ESO, a semi-private corporation.
- b. The delay involved in monitoring and recording in Stockholm and transcribing in England is estimated at ninety-six hours. This would not significantly diminish the value of the material. (Tab D-I)
- c. The ESO NS has indicated that due to strict budgetary limitations there is little hope for a positive decision on its part to undertake this additional commitment. (Tab A) It is probable that the only way in which such coverage can be secured is by partial or complete financial support by FEID. No precedent exists for subsidizing or otherwise paying for activities to be carried out by the ESO NS. The reciprocal arrangement under which ESO NS and FEID cooperate is largely a quid pro quo with both services performing those functions which they are best equipped to carry out and freely exchanging the results.

4. CONCLUSIONS.

- a. The ESO NS can best perform monitoring of the Baltic States and associated areas.
- b. FEID may have to defray part or all of the expense if this monitoring is undertaken.
- c. The interest of the intelligence agencies in this coverage warrants the expenditure of up to \$50,000 annually for this purpose.

- 5. **RECOMMENDATION.**--It is recommended that the Assistant Director for Operations be authorized to negotiate at the forthcoming FRIS-BBC Joint Coordination Committee Meeting for a monitoring operation to provide coverage of the Baltic SSR's and associated areas at the most advantageous financial terms possible within an overall limitation of \$50,000 per year.

I am sending you herewith two copies of our report on the investigation in Stockholm into the coverage of the Baltic States and associated areas, and I am also sending a copy to you here.

The report is being sent at the same time to our authorities here and I will keep you informed of any decision which is taken in the matter. You have already, I believe, had transcripts of the actual bulletins which we sampled and have expressed interest in the material which was obtained from them, and I should be very glad to know now what your reaction to the whole project is.

I cannot be too hopeful that there will be a positive decision about it here because to do so on any scale that would be worth while would undoubtedly cost a fair amount of money, and I cannot see that there is anything in our present coverage which we could give up to balance that which would not make a bigger hole than the one which we are trying to plug. However, your views on the matter would certainly be useful.

SUBJECT: Monitoring of Baltic SSR's

1. It is desired to assess intelligence and psychological warfare requirements for monitoring coverage of domestic broadcasts in northwestern USSR, particularly the Baltic republics, against the expense and organizational complications involved in effecting it.

2. Attachment reports the result of a BBC survey of potential coverage, concluding that a satisfactory operation might be carried out at an annual cost of about \$50,000 under a procedure in which recordings would be mailed to England for processing, with a delay of perhaps 96 hours in reporting resultant information. Processing at the monitoring site and reporting by telecommunications would add substantially to the cost.

3. The potential significant yield from such a monitoring operation is estimated to average between five and ten thousand words per day in the following principal categories in order of volume:

a. Economic-agricultural-industrial data on the area of the type published in the FBIS Economic Abstracts.

b. Regional political and sociological information such as FBIS publications derive from other Soviet regional broadcasts.

c. Information useful to the U.S. psychological effort exclusive of that covered by categories a. and b.

SUBJECT: Monitoring of Baltic SER's

Reference is made to your memorandum dated 21 August on the above subject, which has been given to me for a coordinated reply.

The Department of State is definitely interested in monitoring of the Baltic area, from which we are presently receiving only a very limited amount of information. The proposed coverage would fill a gap in our intelligence, the value of which may be somewhat impaired by the estimated 96-hour delay but would nevertheless be of great value.

In view of the necessary delay in obtaining the replies to your memorandum, I have already informed FBID verbally of the Department's estimate of the value of this coverage.

SUBJECT: (Confidential) Monitoring of Baltic SSR's

1. Reference is made to your memorandum of 21 August 1962, subject, same as above, soliciting comments on the estimated value of subject coverage in fulfilling intelligence and psychological warfare requirements.

2. The yield from such a monitoring operation is of great value to this Headquarters in the planning of psychological warfare operations and analyzing Soviet political and sociological trends. The economic-industrial data of the type published in the FBIS Economic Abstracts is extremely useful in the USAF Targeting program. In many instances it has provided the first indication of the existence of various industrial installations and is valuable in determining current production.

3. A delay of ninety-six (96) hours or more would not appreciably reduce the value of this coverage insofar as the USAF is concerned.

SUBJECT : Monitoring of Baltic SSR's

1. Your memorandum to DD/P of 21 August 1952 explains a proposal to monitor, through an arrangement with the British Broadcasting Corporation, domestic radio broadcasts in the northwestern USSR and requests our comments.
2. We feel that the proposed operation would produce information of value to several branches under DD/P. The estimated 96-hour delay in processing should not seriously reduce the value to us of the monitored texts.
3. If a decision is reached to effect this Baltic coverage, we should appreciate being alerted regarding the date when FBID will begin to publish the broadcasts.
4. It is understood that the DD/P area will not be required to provide any financial support in connection with the project.

Monitoring of Baltic SSR's**

1. Production of National Intelligence Estimates relating to the Soviet Union is always hindered by a lack of detailed evidence. Our information concerning the Baltic Territories is especially scanty. Monitoring of Baltic SSR's would therefore probably make a distinct contribution to our intelligence effort. Moreover, according to the fifth Five Year Plan, the Baltic area will have greater importance in the next few years than it has had in the past. As a consequence, any information we get on this area will shed considerable light on the changes taking place throughout the Soviet Union under the pressure of this last Plan.

2. The 96-hour delay mentioned would not be important sofar as the interests of ONE are concerned.

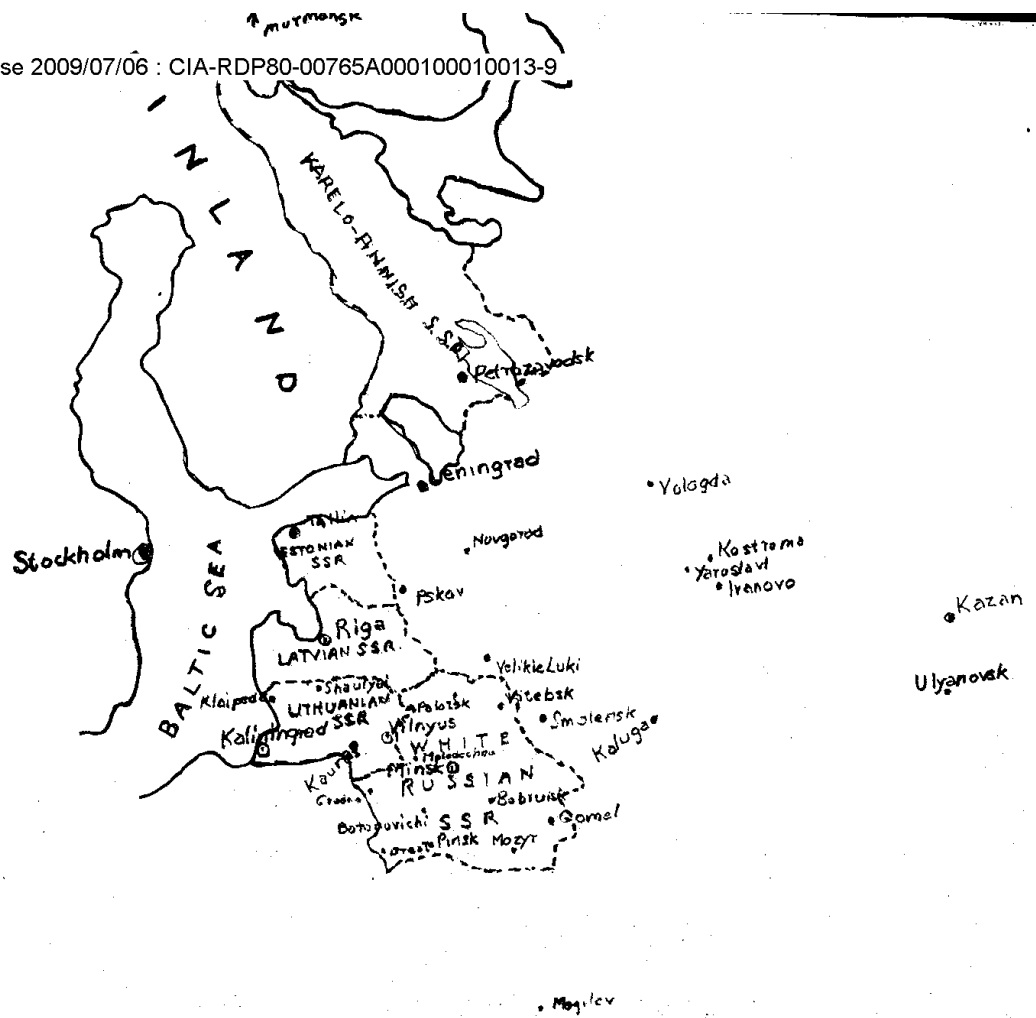

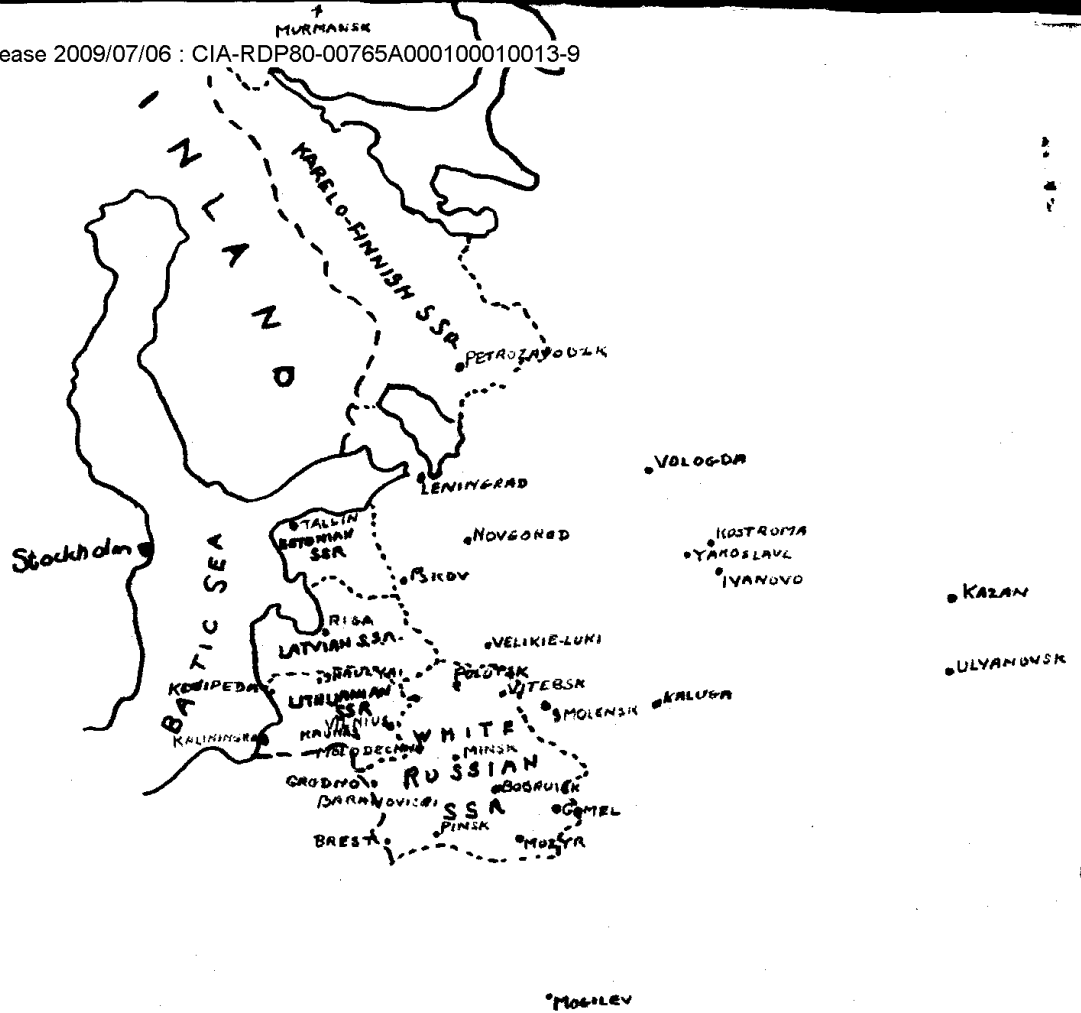
