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1. The Central Commercial School was founded in 1942 during the occupation of the Ukraine. It was located in the northern section of Rava-Ruska, on the left side of the Lvov-Warsaw highway. The school buildings were three hundred yards south of the stream, Rata, which crossed the Lvov-Warsaw highway.
2. The school consisted of one large brick building, three stories high, and a smaller brick building, of two floors. The larger building contained classrooms on the first and second floors and living quarters for the director and administrative staff on the third floor. The smaller building had several workshops and store rooms on the ground floor and an auditorium on the second floor.
3. Courses at the school were for two years. Students who had completed seven years of public schools were admitted to the commercial school. The main purpose of the school was to prepare cadres of young people who would enter into commercial work such as: Commission salesmen, office workers (stenographers, typists etc), and administrative positions. Obligatory subjects at the school were: Ukrainian and German languages, accounting, business arithmetic, commercial law, geography, economics, salesmanship, shorthand; typing, singing and physical culture. In addition, one could study Latin, French, insurance law, and bookkeeping.
4. Classes were conducted six days weekly and from six to seven hours daily. Because there were very few textbooks, the subjects were taught by lectures. The lectures were prepared by the Board of Education. commercial division in Lvov and were delivered to commercial schools in Rava-Ruska and elsewhere in the Western Ukraine, at the beginning of each semester. School enrollment was approximately 250 students each semester.

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
