- I. Production of Czechoslovak export goods of inferior quality has reached unprecedented propertions, allegedly amounting to 35 to 40% of all export orders. Such goods are seld for less than the cost of production and often less than the cost of the raw materials—raw materials which were obtained with difficulty and often paid for in hard currencies. Delivery contracts with the Soviet Union always have penalty clauses and the Soviets thus often get goods for next to nothing or, at best, pay the price of the raw materials.
- 2. The Czecheslevak State Transport Corporation¹ has credited large amounts of money in fares to organizations such as the Czecheslevak Youth Organization and the Czecheslevak-Seviet Friendship League², etc., and is unable to demand payment from them because these organizations are backed by the Communist Party and are thus politically privileged.
- 3. There is a considerable shortage of scrap iron and iron ore, and these commedities must be paid for in foreign and hard currencies, which also are difficult to obtain. Consequently, scrap metal collecting centers have been set up in many places; there are two very large collection centers in Kladno. One of these ordered a huge press for handling the scrap but it arrived, disassembled, at the wrong depot in Kladno by mistake, and since no one there know anything about it the parts were just crushed into scrap iron for the collecting drive.
- 4. The Czecheslevak currency in circulation as of the beginning of 1953 was estimated at 70 billion Kcs., but the actual figure prior to the currency reform is believed to have been about 110 billion Kcs., instead.
- 5. Circuses in Czecheslevakia are State-eperated. In 1952, their deficit amounted to 37 million Kcs.
