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



The yarns are made of the best raw materials, and exceptional care is devoted to their manufacture. During the production they pass through a number of severe controls and tests so that the buyer has the certainty that he is purchasing faultless goods.


Wools for handknitting are turned out in all fashionable colours and shades, and are thus excellent material for knitting pullovers, sweaters, gloves, socks and dresses. The Czechoslovak mills also produce woollen yarns for turning out handmade carpets, and for technical purposes. One of the outstanding features of the Czechoslovak woollen yarns for handknitting is their fast colours which are unaffected even by frequent washing or by sunshine. To meet the requirements of every class of customer abroad, the collections of samples include both simple wools and a large selection of highly effective patterns. Attention may be drawn in particular to mother-of-pearl and cable yarns which are specialities of the Czechoslovak mills. A large number of spinning mills have switched their output over to industrial yarns for the weaving, knitting and hosiery factories. In addition to the ordinary kinds of yarns, crepe, bouclé, frisé, and others are turned out.


The first glance at the output of the Czechoslovak cotton mills shows us that there are four predominant articles in cotton fabrics. They are, first and foremost, fine poplins for shirting and pyjamas, bright-coloured fabrics for ladies' dresses, terry cloth and damask.


The quality of Czechoslovak poplins is determined by three factors. On the one hand there is the long tradition in manufacture, then the high quality raw cotton, and finally the character of the region in which Czechoslovak poplins are made and finished. The finishing mills for poplin are located in close proximity to mountain streams, so that the fabrics are steeped and washed in pure soft water of suitable mineralogical composition.


On the new collection cards of the Centrotex Company which has the sole right to export the output of the Czechoslovak textile and clothing industry you will find, a number of new features for the present season. These include in particular colourful woven poplins with a background of jacquard designs, which may be used as exclusive material for ladies' dresses and as airy, porous shirting.

In addition to unicoloured dress fabrics for Summer wear there are notably bright-patterned woven fabrics of highquality cotton. New features in this particular sector may be found, for instance, in several Gordon dress fabrics, conspicuous by their large irregular checks in the brightest of colours. This gaily woven dress material made from simple macco yarn in warp and weft is patterned and coloured according to the taste and the requirements of the individual markets. Of interest, too, is the check-patterned Midi dress fabric, and finally the Gaby, a fashionable dress fabric for ladies' wear made exclusively in striped patterns. The outstanding features of these and the many other kinds of Czechoslovak cotton dress, materials are quality, fast colours, and the ease with which they can be washed and ironed. Of the terry cloths we may mention in particular the material for towels and ready


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

Linen is a textile fabric which rapidly won great favour among the broad masses of the people. The linen fibre possesses many properties superior to those of other tissues. It is long, and its ends do not protrude from the fabric, nor collect so much dust, so that it does not get soiled so easily.

In Czechoslovakia the manufacture of linen has several hundred years of tradition behind it. In the moist mountainous regions with their suitable climatic location, flax has been cultivated for ages. Its quality is controlled by hundreds of experts on the staff of the flax research institutions.

The flax mills in Czechoslovakia manufacture all kinds of linen goods. One of the most important categories is that of table and bed linen. Damask of Czechoslovak make, handsome table sets and practical bed linen sold by the metre, to-day enjoy an excellent reputation in the textile markets of the world. Linen goods always give the impression of absolute cleanliness, and therefore they are to be found wherever cleanliness is a fundamental requirement. And so, high grade Czechoslovak linen has become an essential item for hospitals, sanatoria and operating theatres, not only as bed linen but also as material for doctors overalls and for surgical textiles.

In the household we meet in increasing measure with Czechoslovak linen sets. They consist not only of the table and bed linen above-mentioned, but also of towels and dusters which demonstrate the advantages of this fabric in not leaving any fluff on utensils and in very rapidly absorbing all moisture.

This last-named property of flax has also destined linen for the making of Summer dress material which to-day is without a rival for practical wear in view of its numerous advantages. In the selections for men's wear attention is above all attracted to linen for tropical wear, while in those for ladies there is a very wide range of fashionable designs, the work of leading Czechoslovak artists who, with their pupils, have placed their services fully at the disposal of the textile mills, and have thus to be thanked in due measure for the progress, the taste and the perfection displayed in the outfitting sector. Wherever the sun shines, and especially in tropical regions, people are well acquainted with the priceless properties of linen dress material, its coolness, its strength, its capacity for rapidly absorbing perspiration, and its infinite renewal by simple washing. In the past this material has looked, as it were, with envy on its sister, the always-tidy woollen dress material. Uncrushability had been discovered also for silk, cellular material and cotton. Only linen held out and revealed thousands of creases immediately it got crushed. The Czechoslovak manufactures have, however, succeeded in reducing the crushability of linen dress material to a minimum by a new process in the course of manufacture. This new process prevents linen dress fabrics from creasing, and even if they do crease a little, the creases very quickly vanish of their own accord, and the dresses are as nice and trim as before. Thus, to the previous excellent properties there has been added another very valuable one which is contributing greatly to increased popularity for linen dress material. In the meantime we hope theat the last word has not been said in this matter, and that further improvements will be registered in reducing the liability of linen dress material to crush.

Recently use has also been made of linen fabrics as upholstering and covering material, And it is, above all, the really artistic and fashionable patterns produced by Czechoslovak designers that have given Czechoslovak linen the foremost place in respect to these cover fabrics. To the list of the best known linen products turned out by Czechoslovakia may be added mattress material which is exported from the Republic to all parts of the world.

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CARPETS AND FURNITURE COVERINGS TO ADD LUSTRE TO YOUR ROOMS


The proud housewife has always an eye open when it is the question of providing the proper furnishing of her home. However attractive the furniture itself may be, it alone does not suffice to give a distinctive air to a house. To make our flat or house in which we pass the greater part of our free time really pleasant and comfortable it is essential to purchase the right sort of carpets as well as suitable upholstery so as to give the furniture a proper setting. Carpets and upholstery coverings bearing the trade-mark TOKO are at the time of writing in ever increasing demand in all countries of the world. They give a distinctive air to the dwelling rooms of many prominent personalities in innumerable countries, in official reception rooms, as also in a great number of hotels enjoying an international reputation and finally in the homes of thousands of private individuals.

Last year Czechoslovak carpets were enthusiastically received wherever they were exhibited - carpet lovers recognizing immediately that they were being offered goods of rare distinction and originality. The carpet expert of Centrotex Ltd. which is entrusted with the import and export of Czechoslovak Textiles and Clothing (The Department for Carpets, Furnishing Fabrics and Woollen Rugs) with offices at Vratislavice nad Nisou - the section which has been entrusted with the exclusive sale of this class of goods for the whole of the republic, succeeded in booking an order for the Royal Palace at Kabul, Afghanistan, this order having been placed by His Majesty's Court Chancellor. We should like to state in this connection that this order was given in the face of keen international competition - both the quality as also the design being found superior to those offered by all foreign competitors. The renaissance design is worked on a gold ground itself being also in gold tone, and accords remarkably well with the style and general furnishing of the Royal Palace, this being one of the reasons for it being selected as the most suitable. Twelve factory girls carried out the work which totalled no less that 1,700,000 knots. The entire carpet weighed 230 kilograms - that is well over 4 cwts. The question of transport presented great difficulties which were, however, successfully solved owing to the particular care which was exercised. This success led to further orders. Centrotex supplied some magnificent carpets to Siam for the coronation of the ruler, as also to the Royal Court of Saudi Arabia and a TOKO carpet was also laid down in the Ducal Palace at Luxembourg.



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CZECHOSLOVAK FELTS AND TECHNICAL FABRICS

Felts, and articles made of felt have to-day become indispensible in all lines of industry. Where everything in this line is produced from polishing and grinding discs to wads for cartridges. To facilitate contacts with customers, the entire export of felts and technical fabrics has been entrusted to the Centrotex Co., Felts and Technical Fabrics Dept., Prague II, Soukupovo nám. 15. This Company can offer foreign buyers all the products of the felt industry in high-class finish and quality.

Saddlers' Felts are supplied, according to requirements, in full-wool or half-wool qualities, of a width of 180 centimetres and a weight of 1000 to 7000 grammes per metre. These felts are used for making pads for saddles, for the body side of horse collars and harness, for stuffing seats for motor vehicles and aircraft, for chair-seats, for pads for typewriters, and for foot and hand protectors in different sports, for the manufacture of packings and rings for various technical purposes, etc. Thinnish felts of up to 2000 grammes weight are used for making hassocks for churches, decorative cushions, etc. Saddlers' felts are supplied in a wide range of colours, the most usual being yellow, brown, red, dark brown, dark blue, green, black and natural white.

Collar-lining Felt is made in three types: uni-colour on both sides, melé-both sides mixed material, and double, that is, one side mixed, the other coloured. This type of felt is used in the ready-madeclothing-industry for finishing collars of men's suits. It is turned out in a width of 180 cm, weighing from 350 to 400 grammes.

The felts for Toymaking have the excellent property that on being cut they do not form rough edges like other fabrics. This property is availed of in the manufacture of toys, dolls, figures and decorative objects such as cushions, artificial flowers and other ornaments of a modern home. Felts for toymaking are manufactured in the current width of 180 cm, and have a weight of 300 to 500 grammes per metre. Felts for linings and vateline felts are in general use in the clothing and footwear industries. They are supplied in widths of 160 to 180 cm, weighing from 250 to 500 grammes per metre.

Dress Felts and Felts for Footwear Uppers are supplied in all-wool and half-wool qualities according to customers requirements. Dress felts are used for trimming and ornaments, for making ladies, hats, children's hats, caps, berets, for the manufacture of fancy vests, coats, etc. They are frequently





used in industry for lining cases, baskets, cupboards, in the furnishing industry, for the manufacture of ornamental objects, handbags, highclassed dolls, toys, etc. These felts are supplied in a width of 180 cm weighing from 350 to 500 grammes, and in the width of 140 cm, of a weight from 550 to 1200 grammes.

Felt for Uppers is employed in the boot and shoe industry for making cloth shoes, slippers, boots, top boots, etc. It is also used for making gaiters. For these purposes felt is supplied in a weight of 600 to 1500 grammes and width of 140 cm. The colours are all darkish and may be chosen from a colour scale. Felt uppers are likewise supplied in all-wool and half-wool qualities at the customer's wish. For linings white or brown toughened felts known as "leather felts" are used and in footwear act as excellent insulation against cold.

Woven Felts are used in paper mills for covering the rollers of the papermaking machines. The current kinds for the paper industry include ordinary, fine and extrafine drying felts, all-wool and half-wool draining felts for the manufacture of roofing, cellulose and eternite roofing, woollen drying felts, asbestos wool and cotton felts, woven tubular felts, and the special Czechoslovak LEV tubular felts.

Technical Cloths are made for every sector of industry in all-wool and half-wool — cleaning cloths, roller cloth, sizing cloth, filtering cloth, bottom cloth, tubular felting for tanners, cotton flannels and cottonized steaming cloths, lappings, technical plushes, etc.). An important aid for large ready - made clothing concerns and tailoring establishments are the HAENSEL interlinings which are elastic, airy and retain their shape permanently.

Czechoslovak Films for Abroad


Great interest continues to be displayed abroad in Czechoslovak puppet and cartoon films. Recently the United States and Canada have purchased the puppet films "Song of the Prairie" and "Inspiration", and the cartoon films "Love and the Zeppelin", "The Fox and the Jug", "The Angel's Coat", "Watersprite in the Mill", and "The Chimneysweep". Sweden has bought the short documentary films "The Origin of Bread" and "Life in the Forest", while Belgium has acquired the colour documentary film "Moravian Highland Dances".

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The optical industry in Czechoslovakia has already its tradition, but the fact is not so generally known. From its inception up to the beginning of the 19th century it was occupied predominantly with such products as lay somewhat outside the scope of public attention. It is unnecessary to enumerate the various makes of theodolites, surveying levels, microscopes and many other important instruments — all of them most interesting and useful from the standpoint of optical and mechanical construction — which as early as the beginning of this century came from the hands of Czechoslovak constructors and workers. These instruments made Czechoslovakia famous in the eyes of experts and scientists whose appreciation no doubt has a high objective value, but who, as a rule live somewhat apart from the general public.

The public in general have quite other ideas about "optics". understanding by that expression much more popular objects and instruments, such as spectacles, photo cameras, movie cameras, etc. In this respect the tradition of our optical industry would seem to be rather young, roughly of only some twenty years. It seems at first sight young because the tradition can be regarded as commencing only from the date on which the first photographic or cinematographic apparatus appeared on the market. In actual fact, however, the Czechoslovak production of photo-cameras, movie cameras, enlarging apparatuses and projectors for both professional and amateur use must be considered as a continuation of the very old output of optical scientific instruments. Instruments made either of glass or of metal were the touchstone for the ability of the Czechostovak constructor and worker. Looking at the development from this angle you will easily understand how it was that Czechoslovak made movie cameras for standard film used to appear as long ago as twenty years past on the U.S. market, in the country of a highly developed cinematographical industry, and were used by Hollywood cameramen. Cameras for 8 mm film likewise won wide acceptance among cine-amateurs in Holland and France. Czechoslovakia was not playing the part of a more looker-on. This is quite natural in a country which has such a great tradition in optics, a country which possesses film studios and laboratories that, as regards number, scope and equipment, are matched by few film studios elsewhere in the world. The movie cameras CINEPHON are the outcome of wide experience and of constant control in the Czechoslovak film-studios. In view of the fact that these studios are being used even by foreign producers, the importance of such control will be appreciated. Cincaton cameras predominate in Czechoslovak


In such a "cinematographic" country as Czechoslovakia, which precesses a great network of cinemas, there is of course a well-developed production of projectors of modern construction, such as the bridge according to the projector type ETA 7, destined for premiére cinemas. ITA 3 projectors are being exported to countries, with the most specifing demands.

Parallel with production of projectors for standard film, the development proceeds of cameras and projectors for sub-standard film. Here too exists hardly another country in Europe where so many sound projectors for 16 mm film are in operation. These projectors can be found in thousands in schools, factories and even in private hands. By keeping these projectors in good repair, the production is gaining wide experience for improvements and new designs. MEOPTON - A sound projector for 16 mm film, destined for little cinemas, is being manufactured both with projection lamp and high-intensity arc-lamp. MEOPTON is the last but certainly not the final word in Czechoslovak optics.

The production of scientific instruments is proceeding space, and by the, completeness of its programm is far more important than might be imagined. Optical industry has concentrated from 1932 its attention successively to greater and greater numbers of more popular products. Enlarging apparatuses of Czechoslovak origin are completely dominating the European market. They are as well known in South Africa and in Australia and are being used in both Americas. The production of enlargers, which is enormous, makes it possible to produce not only the current models, but also enlargers the production of which, with regard to rentability and

solution of technical complications, could not be possibly undertaken by any producer without wide experience.


Czechoslovakia occupies a solid position on the world market as regards photo-cameras. This position has been gained chiefly by the light twin reflex camera FLEXARET. The technicians as well as most exacting users put Flexaret among the first there cameras of this kind. The miniature camera MIKROMA, possessing objective with short focal distance, the optical qualities of which are almost incredible, has placed the Czechoslovak optical industry in front of development in this section. Mikroma has been the first solution




of the smalleet photographical picture-size (10 $\,$ 24 mm) in practical use for taking valuable pictures.










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Czechoslovakia's Economic Progress

The trend of development in Czechoslovak economy continues to be an upward one. During the Two-Year Plan (in 1947 and 1948) industrial output rose by 10% as against the pre-war level. In 1949 the Five-Year Plan came into operation and signifies a further advance. In the industrial sector the Five-Year Plan was fulfilled in its first twelvemonth, that is in the year 1949, to the extent of 102% - in the production of investment material the figure of fulfilment was 102%, in the consumer goods branch 103%, and in the foodstuffs branch 98%. Compared with the year 1948 the volume of industrial output in 1949 according to sectors was as follows, in percentages (1948—100%):

Thus, on the whole, as the above figures show, industrial output in Czechoslovakia in the year 1949 was 8% in excess of that for 1948. By the end of 1949 industrial production had exceeded the pre-war level by 20% — the output of productive investment material indeed by 40%. As regards indiviadual items it may be noted that, compared with 1948, the output of brown coal increased by 12%, that of coke by 18%, of electric motors by 5%, of telephone apparatus by 29%, of glass by 3%, of building materials by 5-22%, of cellulose by 7%, paper by 6%, cardboard and roofing by 8%, plywood by 18%, and yarns by 10%, etc. In the sphere of agriculture, too, production was well above the 1948 level, while there was a substantial improvement in building operations (by about one-third compared with 1948).

The Volume of Foreign Trade

increased by 4300 million Kčs (about \$ 86.000.000) as against 1948. Imports reached a value of 39.400 million Kčs and exports a value of 40.300 millions, so that the trade balance was favourable to the amount of 900 million Kčs (18 million U. S. dollars). At the same time there was a considerable increase in the proportion of raw materials imported to meet the requirements of growing industrial output. The success in export trade is a proof that, despite keener competition in the world's leading markets, Czechoslovak goods are able to compete not only in respect of quality and prices but also of short terms for delivery.

Czechoslovak Packing Media Praised Abroad

In the February issue of the British Packing Review, Major C. W. Cousland, R. E., Printing and Packaging Officer, Industrial Division of the Council of Industrial Design, discusses the Exhibition of Packings held last year in Manchester, where Czechoslovakia was represented by the Papco Company. Major Cousland speaks highly of the Czechoslovak products, and emphasizes the large range of designs and

the tasteful finish of the cardboard objects. He devotes considerable attention to the practical side, and the economic design of a number of the Czechoslovak exhibits, and finds the closure technique so perfect that he recommends it as a model for British manufacturers.

Success of the Czechoslovak Paper Industry in Iran


The Iranian Tobacco Monopoly authorities some time ago invited tenders for the supply of packing cartons. The successful tender was that submitted by the *Papeo Company of Prague*. The cartons are being supplied from the same factory that in the year 1949 secured notable orders for Egypt which have already been executed to the customers' satisfaction.

Czechoslovak Folklorist Motifs in

That Czechoslovak folklorist motifs in art proper and in industrial art are no mere local features is proved by the commercial successes secured by the glass figures made at Zelezný Brod and exported by the Glassexport Co. A very good market for these delightful nick-nacks has recently been found in Bermuda where the little figures have been popularised by Czechs settled there. Thousands of these figures have been consigned there, and the selections include not only successful caricatures of well-known statesmen and such usual international motifs as fish, monkeys and palmtrees, but also typical Czech figuresgrape-pickers with their baskets, nightwatchmen, etc., which constitute the bulk of the models ordered.



A new Indo-Czechoslovak Agreement was signed in Prague on the 5th April 1950. The Agreement was signed by the Indian Ambassador in Prague Shri N. Raghavan on behalf of India and by the Viceminister Dr. R. Margolius on behalf of Czechoslovakia.




New Features in Rubber Toy Exports

Czechoslovak rubber toys are in great demand particularly in the North and South American markets. A wide range in gay colours and high quality finish made especially suede toys popular.

In the United States, for example, rubber balls as imitation footballs are in great demand. EXICO's branch office in *Bratislava* entrusted with the export of all rubber products has received from customers in *Paraguay* and *Guatemala* very favourable comments about the latest range of rubber toys. The importers opinion is that considerable orders will be received on account of the attractive toys offred by EXICO Company Limited, Branch Office in Bratislava.

Všetaty Onions

Vietaty onions are one of the special items of Czechoslovak agricultural export. In some countries preference is given to




round onions, whereas V setaty onions have an elongated form. This shape, however, is far from being a disadvantage; in point of fact it is an advantage. Moisture percolating

into the soil passes the longish onions by, whereas it remains on the upper parts of the round-shaped ones, causing them to mould or decay. Vietaty onion seeds are exported by the Czechoslovak Company Koospol, which also exports other seeds, notably cabbage and lucerne, and agricultural produce generally.



Export of Seeds

The Koospol Export-Import Company has recently increased its exports of seeds, particularly to the countries of Western Europe. The export of seeds and seedlings is throughout the world a question of confidence, and the export successes of Koospol are on that account all the more noteworthy. The Company exports largely vegetable seeds, especially kohlrabi seeds, of which Czechoslovakia is one of the world's best producers from the angle of quality. Considerable quantities of lucerne seeds and onion seedlings have also



been exported. The seeds exported undergo a number of tests. The most important supervision is that exercised by the central concern "Oseva", which ascertains




the quality of the resultant plants. The consignments are under the personal control of the *Koospol Company*, and are always accompanied by an attest from the *State Seed Control Station*.

Hops and Malt

With effect from the 3rd of April 1950 the export companies for malt and hops have been amalgamated into a single concern under the name of: Hopmalt, Czechoslovak Malt and Hops Export Company Ltd., with head offices in Prague.

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Sports Requisites from Czechoslovakia

Hundreds of thousands of people throughout the world may be playing table-tennis. Czechoslovakia for the fifth time won the world's tennis championship at Budapest in February last. Czechoslovakia is not only the holder of the world championship, but has an extensive, specialized manufacture and a big export trade of table-tennis requisites, as well as of frames for tennis rackets. 
The biggest Israeli hospital, management Kupath-Holim, has purchased Czechoslovak apparatus for diathermy.






Hospitality facilities for official and semi-official visitors to Czechoslovakia



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SUCCESS OF THE 51ST PRAGUE INTERNATIONAL TRADE FAIR



The 51st Prague International Fair which was held on 14th-31st May last was a pronounced success, for the orders booked exceeded in value those registered at last year's two Fairs (Spring and Autumn) together. Alongside Czechoslovak exhibits were displays from 19 other countries, among them Great Britain who was represented by the products of her engineering industry. Visitors to the Fair came from more than 60 countries. The Englishspeaking area was represented not only by Great Britain but also by the United States and the British dominions of whom Australia in particular made extensive purchases. There was a large attendance from overseas countries including Saudi Arabia, Egypt, India, Indonesia, Irak, Iran Israel, Lebanon, Pakistan, Syria, Trans-Jordan and others. The greatest interested was centred in metalworking and woodworking machinery, surgical instruments and equipment, tractors, agricultural machinery, printing machines, and jewellery set with Czech garnets (department of the Kovo Company); ladies' dress materials, cashmeres, prints, gabardines, handkerchiefs, artificial flowers, hat shapes, etc. (department of the Centrotex Company); utility glass and de luxe glassware, including Bohemian crystal ware (Glassexport Company's exhibit); footwear, pneumatic tyres, technical rubber and bootmaking machinery (Exico Company); porcelain, ceramic ware (Czechoslovak Ceramic Company); products of the meat-cannnig industry, live game and cheese (Koospol Company); chocolates, liqueurs and spirits and preserves (Centrokomise Company); furniture, office requisites and musical instruments (Ligna Company); chemical coal-tar products, chemical glazes, dyes, pure chemicals for laboratory use (Chemapol Company); products of the paper industry (Papeo Company); buttons of every type of material, fishing tackle, fancy goods, and tailors' accessories (Koh-i-noor Company). Czechoslovak goods were to the fore not only by reason of their reasonable prices but also by their steady improvement in quality and by prompt


terms of delivery. The Fair provided proof that Czechoslovakia continues to extend and intensify her economic collaboration with the Soviet Union and the People's Democratic countries, and that on the other hand her production capacity suffices for brisk trade with other countries, with whom she is desirous of maintaining commercial relations on the basis of mutual respect for one another's interests and needs.



Export of Diesel Engines and Pumps

The Czechoslovak export company Kovo Limited is exporting large numbers of Diesel engines yearly. Their makes Slavia and Škoda have since the end of the war increased their exports to more than eightfold. In Czechoslovakia all the usual types of oil engines are produced, i. e. mobile, stationary and marine engines, for outputs ranging from 10 HP to 2000 HP. Recently these engines have registered steadily growing sales abroad. As an example let us mention that Persia is using Czechoslovak oil engines for her municipal power stations and for driving various industrial plants. In Malaya and at Singapore Czechoslovak oil engines operate tin mines. In Mecca and Medina they supply power for lighting the Mohammedan holy places. In South America, particularly in Brazil and Argentina, they drive machinery in numerous factories, provide power and light for settlements, and coupled with pumps serve for irrigation purposes. For the Middle East oil engines are ordered most frequently with pumps, likewise for land irrigation.

In conjunction with this we would mention the pumps themselves which are another interesting product of Czechoslovak machine shops. They are produced in large lots and the entire range from the smallest hand-pumps to complete equipments for large pumping stations such as the huge Amiria Pumping Station at Cairo are steadily gaining markets abroad. Of sets installed in

Europe pumping plants have been particularly successful in Norway for example. But they do equally good service in India, Pakistan, the Middle East and in the Latin American Republics. For Pakistan an order for 50 large Sigma pumping stations was recently carried out in the record time of 12 weeks only. These were high perfor-

mance pumps, each of the units being able to pump 6600 gallons of water per minute. The Czechoslovak Sigma Works received a letter from the Pakistan Government expressing thanks for the prompt and praiseworthy fulfilment of the order and appreciation of the high quality of the work carried out



Kovo Ltd. at Foreign Trade Fairs

The Czechoslovak export and import company Kovo Limited which sells machinery, engines, motor vehicles and other engineering goods of Czechoslovak make had in the course of 1949 sent exhibits to more than 30 of the biggest international trade fairs, motorcar shows, aircraft exhibitions and agricultural shows. The 50.000 exhibits displayed by Kovo Limited at the various fairs and exhibitions occupied, all added up, a floor space of some 1 1/2 square miles which would be equal to an 11 yard wide band stretching from London to Paris. The total weight of the exhibits was equal to that of the Eiffel Tower. The exhibits with their salesmen and other officials accompanying the products had to travel a summed up distance equal to four times round the equator. Also this year the Czechoslovak engineering industry represented by Kovo Limited had exhibits at all leading exhibitions and trade fairs. The first show attended in 1950 was the Brussels motorcar show where, as to the number of realized sales, Czechoslovak Skoda cars secured the second place against a competition of leading world trade marks. In 1950 up to September the Kovo Company participated, in 27 international trade fairs and displays. Special success was achieved by its products: electromotors, machine tools, telephone exhanges, motor cars, motorcycles, textile machinery, optics, cutlery and woodworking machinery.

Czechoslovak Refrigerators for North Africa

People who live in hot countries place big demands upon electric household appliances. The Czechoslovak Kovo Export Company awaited therefore with great interest to see what the reaction in Algeria would be to the first consignment of the Maneta refrigerators supplied to that country. The importers gave an unequivocal answer by sending in an order for several further carloads of these refrigerators which have proved excellent in the hot African climate.

Tesla Wireless Receivers in Siam

The representative of the Czechoslovak Kovo Ltd. arranged at Bangkok, Siam (Thai) in connection with a radio competition, a special competition for Czechoslovak Tesla sets, the first prize being a Tesla "Pioneer" receiver. A report from the Bangkok representative, accompanied by photographs taken by a Czechoslovak "Opema" camera, speaks of the very favourable impression created by the compet-

ition, and the great interest displayed in Czechoslovak receiving sets. The report concludes with the words "We are impatiently awaiting a further cargo of Tesla wireless receivers."

Signalling Equipment for East Africa

In the programme of the Tesla telecommunication factories we find not only large and small transmitting stations, telephone equipment and instruments, traffic control and safety devices, but also numerous minor products which by reason of their practical design and careful finish find a good market in foreign countries. As an example of to what parts of the world these products penetrate, we may mention the delivery of the Tesla luminous signalling equipment for one of the big business enterprises at Karthoum, the capital of the Sudan. A complete acoustic signalling equipment has also been supplied for the royal palace at Cabul. Tesla products are exported solely by the Kovo Company, Prague.

Radio Components which Meet Exact Requirements

Radio components shall be compact and small and at the same time should resist the influences of heat and moisture. On the basis of the studies and tests carried out by the Czechoslovak electronic industry, the Tesla have turned out the first tropicaiized capacitors. The Kovo Ltd. has included them under the name of Isofix in its export programme, and has acquainted its leading customers abroad with this new feature. Some time ago one of the largest Swiss special laboratories subjected samples of the new Czechoslovak capacitors together with a whole range of similar products turned out by the world's leading concerns to severe material, mechanical and electrical tests in order to ascertain the relative performance of these capacitors operating under difficult conditions at sea and in the air. Of all the competing types the Czechoslovak samples emerged best out of these tests.

Tesla Technical Reports

Among its publications, the Kovo Company issues the Tesla Technical Reports which include scientific articles on the work of the laboratories and factories of the Czechoslovak electronic industry.

Czechoslovak Razor Blades in the Near East

Czechoslovak razor blades have found their way to numerous oversea countries in particular to those of the Near East—Syria, the Lebanon, Persia, Southern Arabia and others. Kovo Ltd of Prague have succeeded in introducing several makes of blades, such as Luxor, Niest Nieso and Shiraz which are made exclusively for the Arab population of the Middle East.

Glassmakers' Moulds

Glass making moulds are a Czechoslovak speciality which is closely connected with the old tradition of Bohemian glass production. These moulds are made in Brno and exported by Kovo Limited of Prague. The Brno works supplied glassmaking machinery and implements already before the war and exported them to countries as far away as South America... After the war customers gradually resumed their connections and came to visit their old customers. An example of this was the recent visit of a customer from Peru who made the long journey to Brno over the sea and a continent and who declared that Czechoslovak moulds were just the thing he wanted that he was well satisfied with the goods and with the prices too.

Moulds for Making Chocolate

In Czechoslovakia chocolate moulds are made in varied sizes, for manufacturing chocolate by hand and by machine. The material of which these moulds are made is the finest nickel-plated highly polished steel. Chocolate moulds are made for chocolate slabs, chocolate confectionery, dessert and chocolate fancy shapes and figures. First class material, immaculate finish and the vast variety of pretty and original shapes have won these moulds an excellent reputation abroad. 


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
