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### *Why object to spying, etc?*

Why the outcry about the military and the FBI spying on civilians whom they define as "subversive?"

Why the objection to the law which allows concentration camps in the United States, or to the House Committee on Internal Security, which blacklists "subversives," and its counterparts in the Senate -- the Senate Internal Security and Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee -- or to the Subversive Activities Control Board which was held unlawful according to the First Amendment?

Why object to the Defense Facilities and Industrial Security Act which allows unlimited investigations of any "defense facility" including "any plant, factory, industry, public utility, mine laboratory, educational institution, research organization, railroad, airport, pier, etc."

"The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized." U.S. Constitution, Fourth Amendment.

No wonder other nations object to CIA interference in their internal affairs; we seem to have the same situation in the United States.

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
