Dear Mr. McCloy:

Nour letter of 24 March requesting certain intelligence studies has been received, and I have directed the Deputy Director for Intelligence of this Agency to constitute the messagery task force to accomplish the studies.

We in intelligence fully appreciate the import to our mational security of any nuclear test ban which may be realined, and we will be prepared to render prompt and thorough intelligence support to the United States Delegation to the Gentral Commission. It is my intention to discuss with you and, in due course, with the President the organisational and staffing arrangements for providing support of this type plus any other intelligence support to discussent negotiations or realized treaties. In the meantime, we shall be secomplishing the studies you request.

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Dear Mr. Dulles:

As you know, the American Belegation to the Hielear Test Ban Conference has returned to Geneva with revised proposals which make the conclusion of a treaty at least possible. This possibility, of course, depends largely upon a movement by the Soviet Union toward accepting a reliable control and inspection system.

I believe that the prospects for a treaty, though far from assured, do call for a thoughtful and timely exemination of requirements which would arise should this event transpire. In particular, present U.S. proposals and the draft treaty require that a Preparatory Consission shall come into existence one day after the signature of the treaty. This Consission will function until the ratification of the treaty and will be responsible for developing detailed recommendations for the installation and operation of a nucleur test ban control organization. It is therefore clear that various studies should be got under vey in the near future which define and support anticipated U.S. proposals for installation and operation of the control system in the UNBR, U.S., U.K. and other locations specified for Phase I of the instalistion schedule. Such proposals should take into account all relevant information and substantive capabilities of the U.S. Intelligence Community concerning the UESH and other treaty areas.

In this regard, you will recall that approximately 100 seismic events annually of magnitude 4.75 or greater will be eligible for

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inspection within the USER in accordance with the simplified criteria which only require a determination of equivalent yield and approximate time and location of the event. The choice of events to be inspected within an agreed quota, from among those declared to be eligible, must be largely determined on the basis of national intelligence data, including technical informatian. Once the choice has been mads, inspection teams must be rapidly and comprehensively briefed in order that they will be fully informed about significant conditions in regions to which they will be going. Finally, the U.S. will be entirely dependent upon unilatoral intelligence for indications of possible clandestine tests not detected by the international control system, e.g., decoupled underground and high altitude events.

Accordingly, I would like you to be responsible for the following studies which will be needed by 15 May:

1. Support measures the U.S. Intelligence Community should undertake for the U.S. Delegation at the Test Han Control Commission which will supplement the effectiveness with which observance of treaty obligations are enforced, including:

a. Intelligence information which may elarify ambiguous data collected by the control organization indicating the occurrence of mucheer tests,

b. Intelligence information which may indicate the occurrence of nuclear tests not detected by the control organization. c.g., decoupled underground and high altitude tests,

c. Pactors to be taken into consideration in deciding to request on-site inspection of suspicious events,

d. Information which should be evailable in the Intermational Inspection Office or the U.S. Delegation at the Control Commission for briefing or otherwise facilitating the effective operation of on-site inspection activities.

2. Capabilities within themear future of the U.S. Intelligence Community, including its technical components, to implement the above measures. particularly,

a. Organization of existing information in a repidly recoverable form, probably by means of electronic data processing systems,

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b. Organization of internal resources and procedures insuring that all newly acquired information relevant to foreign clandestine nuclear activities will flow repidly to the basic fund of intelligence,

c. An intelligence unit, with the necessary logistical support, within the U.S. Delegation at the Control Commission responsible for keeping the U.S. Representative appraised of all significant intelligence development and to otherwise assist him,

In planning for implementation of the above studies, it should be borne in mind that the draft treaty provides for a relatively brief proparatory period after treaty signature before installation of system elements is to commence. Accordingly, organization of implementational activities should proceed as nearly in step with development of the above studies as is feasible and prodent.

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SUBJECT : Letter to Mr. John J. McCloy Special Advisor to President on Disarmament

1. The attached letter to Mr. McCloy is in response to his letter of 24 March. He had requested a complete delineation of how and to what degree United States Intelligence would support the U.S. Delegation to a Control Commission. I have convened within the DDI area a task force to prepare the necessary studies. A representative from the DDP area is also participating with the group. I believe the studies will be completed and ready for delivery by 15 May. Prior to their transmittal it may be desirable to present these to the United States Intelligence Board.

2. Above and beyond this immediate response to Mr. McCloy, there is the broader question of how U.S. Intelligence will gear itself to support _______ disarmament discussions and any treaties which may be realized. A recent request for much broader support than asked for in the 24 March letter from Mr. McCloy makes the breadth of this matter clear. I believe it will be necessary for you to make recommendations to the President on the assignment of responsibility for intelligence support _______ very soon; and, together with Mr. Bissell, I shall be drafting the necessary staff papers and recommendations.

1. Mr. John J. McCloy, Special Advisor on Minarmanent, has eaked the Director to consider the problem of intelligence support for a possible Muclear Test han. In particular, he has requested studies detailing the types of information that should be evaluable to the U.S. Delegation to a Test Ban Control Commission, and the organization and information handling system such support would require. I have appended a copy of Mr. McCloy's letter.

2. I believe that this request can best be answered by establishing rapidly a small group of vorking level people who can consider in detail the types and depth of information needed, priorities, support services required, communications problems and intelligence collection possibilities. Accordingly, I have asked the several offices of the BD/I to provide experienced people for such a group under the chairmanship of the Office of Scientific Intelligence.

3. Clearly, it will be necessary to have a representative from DD/P in this group to provide guidance on those aspects of the problem which are unique to the DD/P and to keep the DD/P advised of the group's progress, problems and responsibilities.

4. I would appreciate it if you select a member of your staff who will contact Dr. Scoville's office in order that additional information on the work of this group and the type of people who will be involved can be provided.

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
