10. Clapsastine Granation in North Vietness

Gameral Yaylor called the attention of the Group to CERCRAS's cable, 2505012, on the above subject.

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Mr. McCoon said that he had received a proposal from within CIA to move the Tibeten guerrilla force, now located mear into Tibet, where they would require continuing air recupply. He said that he was not estisfied with this proposal and wested at this time simply to call it to the attention of Mr. Johnson.

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Mr. McCons noted briafly some of the difficulties involved. He wentioused the problems inherent in any other disposition of this force, as well as the risks of continuing air operations, which he estimated would require about one serties a nonth. He also possible that he had told higher authority that air operations of this kind would not be requested in the future unless a joint arrangement could be unched out with the Indians. He explained that the letter has powed to be impossible, rinse the Indian Intelligence Service has an emphility of engaging in operations of this kind without outting in the Indian Defence establishment.

Kr. Johnson urged that CIA officers discuss more fully with State efficials the capabilities that the Tibeten generalies might have once inside Tibet. He said that he would talk with Covernor Revises and Ambassador Stabbins as soon as the latter errives in Manhington.

The opposition of Ambassador Galbenith to anything of this nature was noted. Mr. Parrett said that it had been folt that the Ambassador's letter did not require an answer, at least until a decision is made as to the eventual future of this project. He noted that a good deal of time has now gone by and that the question of an answer to delibenith remittee a pending problem.
