In connection with future developments, the best we can do at our present stage is to provide for the periodic consultation by one of our officers with your officers at the Special Air Warfare Center. I regret that our air operations officers are in such short supply that we are unable to furnish you a full-time liaison officer and trust that you will find my alternative proposal a satisfactory temporary answer to your requirement.

As you know, the U. S. Air Force activated a unit in the spring of 1961 to provide a counterinsurgency capability for deployment to trouble spots throughout the world. We have recently enlarged the unit to the equivalent of air division strength and renamed it the Special Air Warfare Center.

One of the responsibilities assigned to the Center is to develop and test not only equipment but ideas and techniques as well, which may prove useful in the counterinsurgency field. In this connection, I have long been of the opinion that the Agency has a wealth of experience in this field that should be more actively exploited. As a first step in this direction, I felt that a liaison officer from the Agency should be established with the Headquarters of the Special Air Warfare Center. Exchanges of correspondence in January and May between my Director of Plans, Major General Burchinal, and your Deputy Director for Plans Office have produced negative results. The reply to our May request regretted that could not be made available. qualifications are well known to some of my officers who work with the Agency on a daily basis and we therefore requested his assignment on a "name" basis. Perhaps that was our mistake.

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At any rate, I feel that the subject warrants your personal attention and would appreciate your assistance in this matter. For your information, General Sweeney, Commander, Tactical Air Command, sent me an unsolicited request for a liaison officer in the same position I have described. It seems obvious to me that a great deal of mutual benefit to the Agency and the USAF must inevitably accrue if we can arrange for closer coordinated planning.
