

Throughout the Seminar, emphasis is placed on the United States Congress. Of the three branches of government — legislative, executive, and judicial — it is the Congress which offers to young Americans the most effective and expeditious route for national participatory democracy.

During the program, individual initiative is the rule, as the Seminar becomes a truly personal experience for each of its participants. With no formal class assignments or reports expected, any line of legitimate interest and debate is in order, and the Workshops staff maintains an objective and strictly nonpartisan contact that will never stifle reasoned and mature student inquiry. The Congressional Seminar, while fashioned by a competent and dedicated staff, still remains in final analysis what the students make of it — indeed, this is the reason why it has become so successful, so meaningful, and so enjoyable over the years.

Each Seminar session includes the following schedule of events:

- Daily dialogue discussions with Senators, Congressmen, White House staff, and other officials of government focusing on the important national and international issues of the day.
- A series of meetings with Congressional staff aides, with topics to include: "Traditions and Procedures of the Congress," and "Congress in the 70's."
- Frequent opportunity for small informal conferences with Senators and Congressmen of the participants own choosing, as well as student pursuits in areas of personal interest, such as Congressional committee meetings and House and Senate chamber sessions.
- Evening campus rap sessions with Ambassadors, members of the press and others peripheral to government:
- Sense of the Seminar Resolutions prepared by students during each session, and presented at a Model Congress evening on campus. Debate — always spirited and incisive — is under the procedures of the U.S. House of Representatives, with an official of the House presiding.



An integral part of the Washington Workshops seminar program is

a college campus environment. During the 1978 sessions, Congressional Seminar participants will live and take most of their meals at Marymount College, just across Washington's Potomac River in Arlington, Virginia. The rustic, all-enclosed campus is located on the historic former estate of Admiral Presley M. Rixey, Surgeon General to President Theodore Roosevelt. Residing on this attractive college campus in the Washington area gives students a firsthand experience of college living, thus offering valuable insights into college years ahead.

The total college environment of the seminar is in sharp contrast to other high school programs that pass through the Nation's Capital, where hotel living is the order of the day. At Marymount College, an enriching campus atmosphere includes air-conditioned, doubleoccupancy rooms and dormitory lounges. Facilities of the student union, the large, year-round indoor swimming pool, gymnasium, and the playing fields are available for student use during after-dinner hours and weekend free time. The complete facilities of the Arlington Hospital are near at hand in case of injury or serious illness.

Rounding out the week's stay on campus includes a Saturday afternoon excursion to Washington area monuments, Georgetown shopping, and a Saturday night campus dance.

FOLLOW-UP

The Washington Workshops stands alone in offering a series of productive, continuing activities to its seminar students.

The Advanced Congressional Seminar is the annual Workshops program available to students who have first completed the regular Congressional Seminar. The Advanced Seminar comprises three weeks of intern assignment in a Congressional office, plus preparation of a short research paper on an aspect of the Congressional process. Marymount College of Virginia, which houses the students for this program, awards three college credits upon each student's completion of the course requirements. The Advanced Seminar is perhaps the only extensive, national high school intern program on Capitol Hill.

After completion of the regular Congressional Seminar, students are eligible for participation in the European Comparative Government Tour program. For one month, each summer, students visit such places as London and Paris, participating in discussions with government leaders and other officials. In addition to government study and analysis, students will receive exposure to the many cultural and scenic attractions of the areas visited. Special overnight trips to the surrounding countryside are also part of the itinerary.

In keeping with true Workshops spirit, an annual reunion is held each year in Washington, D. C., for former participants of the program. For one weekend each summer, students convene and revive old memories through such activities as a Boat Dance down the Potomac and the traditional Reunion Banquet.

Also, each year the Washington Workshops National Student Advisory Committee, open for membership to all seminar participants, holds a series of regional meetings from coast to coast. These meetings afford a unique opportunity to discuss changing events in the political life of the nation, and recommend new directions and projects for the Washington Workshops Foundation.

Perhaps the most effective follow-up program of all is what countless students have done individually since first participating in the Congressional Seminar. Many have gone on to hold positions of leadership in their schools and communities, some were delegates to national political conventions; a number are serving in local offices.
