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Note

In the tables which follow, where there is a dash the figure is nil or negligible; "n.a." denotes that the figure is not available. Figures do not necessarily add exactly to totals because of "rounding" and those for latest years are provisional in some cases.

"Tons" means long tons where used on pages 5-39; on pages 67-87 US tons are used; "tonnes" means metric tons, used in some cases on pages 5-39, and also generally on other pages. Crop production figures on pages 46 and 100-121 are for harvest years referred to the calendar year in which the entire harvest or the bulk of the harvest took place; for livestock, reference is made to the month and year of enumeration, or to the year ending September. Monetary statistics, where changed from national currencies to £ sterling or US \$, have, unless otherwise specified, been converted at the average par value for the relevant year (for 1967 at the equivalent of US \$2.75 = £1 sterling); where no par value exists, or where it applied for part of a year, the most appropriate average rate is used (at the equivalent of US \$2.435 = £1 sterling for 1971, US \$2.50 = £1 sterling for 1972 and \$2.452 = £1 sterling for 1973). The term billion, where used on pages 67-87, refers to a thousand million. Sterling values prior to February 15, 1971, formerly in the form of shillings and pence, have been converted to new pence. Population of cities generally include surrounding suburbs.

It is impossible to mention here all the sources from which the statistics are compiled, but all are gratefully acknowledged. British official statistics are reprinted by kind permission of the Controller of HM Stationery Office.

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

Circulation of The Economist 1843-1973. World wide sales of The Economist 1973








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Industrial production¹ (% increase on one year earlier)

Selected industries (growth rate of production ; % per annum)





UK capital gains tax

This tax applies to gains accruing on the disposal of most forms of property after April 6, 1965; where assets were acquired on or before April 6, 1965, only so much of the gain as arises after that date is taxable. From April 15, 1969, gains arising from disposal of British Government and Government-guaranteed securities more than 12 months after acquisition are exempt from capital gains tax for individuals and corporation tax for companies.

Rate payable

Individuals—30%, or (if to the taxpayer's benefit) one-half of the gain up to the first £5,000, plus any gain over £5,000, charged as investment income. For 1970-75 capital gains where the total proceeds of all disposals made in the year do not exceed £500 are exempt from this tax; further, for amounts over £500, the amount of capital gains tax chargeable shall not exceed one-half of the excess over £500.

For 1967-71 chargeable long term capital gains less losses up to £50 for the year were exempt from this tax; for 1965-71 short-term capital gains (occurring after not more than 12 months) were charged instead to income tax and surtax.

Companies—charged to corporation tax (if this was not applicable for 1965-66, a special rate of 35% applied to that year).

From April 1, 1973, a fraction of the capital gains of companies is deducted from the net capital gain; the fraction for each year is determined at the end of the financial year. For 1973-74 the effective rate for companies' capital gains was 30%.

For authorised unit trusts and approved investment trusts a special rate of 15% applies from April 1, 1972.

UK value added tax

Value added tax (VAT) came into operation on April 1, 1973, when Selective Employment Tax and Purchase Tax were abolished. In general, VAT is a tax on imported goods and on goods and services supplied in the United Kingdom by a taxable person in the course of business carried on by him.

Taxable person. Taxable person includes individuals, partnerships, companies, etc., and is defined as anyone carrying on a business having a taxable turnover of more than £5,000 per year. Certain organisations, such as trade and professional associations, are not regarded as 'carrying on a business'. Taxable persons are required to register with customs and excise.

Taxable turnover. Taxable turnover refers to the value of supplies of all goods and services which are not exempt. The main groups of exempt products and services are: land; insurance; postal services; betting, gaming and lotteries; finance; education; health; burial and cremation.

Rate of tax.¹ There are two rates of tax initially fixed: the standard rate and the zero rate. The standard rate, fixed at 10% for 1973-75², applies to all taxable products and services other than those which are zero-rated. The main zero-rated groups are: food (excluding confectionery, etc. from April 1974); water; books, etc.; talking books for the blind; newspaper advertisements; news services; children's clothing; power; construction of buildings, etc (excluding repairs and maintenance); services to overseas traders or for overseas purposes; transport; caravans; gold; bank notes; drugs, medicines and appliances supplied on prescription.

Operation of the tax. The tax is added to the sales value to the final consumer, and at each stage of production and sale. When tax received from sales is higher than tax paid for 'inputs', the balance is due to be paid to customs and excise; when tax paid for 'inputs' is higher than that received from sales (for example, where goods are zero-rated), a tax refund can be obtained.

UK corporation tax¹

This tax is charged on the total income of companies (including all bodies corporate and unincorporated associations, but excluding partnerships); it replaced for these bodies the income tax and profits tax for income arising after that period which was the basis of the charge for income tax for the income tax year 1965-66.

The corporation tax came into full operation on April 6, 1966; assessments on companies are made for accounting periods, and not for years of assessment. The rate of tax applicable is that fixed for each inland revenue financial year ending March 31st; normally the rate of tax is fixed in April of each year for the financial year just past. The accounting period is apportioned into sections according to financial years, and the respective rates fixed for each year apply to the section falling in that year; for example, if a company's accounts are made up for the calendar year 1974, one-quarter of the total profits are charged at the rate fixed for the financial year ending March 31, 1974, and the remaining three-quarters at the rate for the financial year ending March 31, 1975.

Dividends. Under the new system of corporation tax which was introduced from April 1973, companies deduct from gross dividends the basic rate of income tax, and forward this to the inland revenue as an advance payment of corporation tax; from April 1974 an additional sum is due at the same time, equal to one-half of the advance corporation tax payment. The advance rate for 1974-75 is 33/67ths of the amount of the distributions.

Overseas tax paid by a United Kingdom company on its overseas profits can be claimed as a credit against corporation tax, but not against the advance payment of corporation tax made on dividends. Transitional measures of relief are provided for those cases where the overseas tax on income from direct investment is in excess of the corporation tax. These relief payments ("overspill relief") tapered off after 1968-69, and were planned to end after 1972-73; following the introduction of the new system of corporation tax, "overspill relief" is planned to continue until 1976-77, at the 1971-72 level.




The rate of inflation in the UK

Selected consumer items (growth rate of prices; % per annum)








Exports¹, 1973; indicating flows within EEC over £200 million.





It should be emphasised that this is a simplified table and that in some countries there are also (a) bank holidays (b) local holidays for a particular city and (c) religious holidays difficult to forecast exactly at the time of going to press; further that in many countries the day or half-day preceding or following an official holiday may also be regarded as holidays. This information has generally been supplied by the London representative of each country.

Sunday is observed as a holiday in the countries listed with the exceptions of Jordan (Friday) and Israel (Saturday). Any regular public holidays falling on a Sunday or other regular weekly holiday are included; the following day is also shown as a holiday when it is observed in such cases.

Tax must be paid on estates valued at more than \$60,000 gross. Estate tax is computed, at rates given, on the taxable estate in excess of the \$60,000 exemption and after making deductions for debts, administration and funeral expenses, charitable bequests and the marital deduction (limited to equivalent value of one-half of the adjusted gross estate). Allowance is also made for state death taxes. The tax must, in general, be paid within fifteen months of the date of death.



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International and domestic passenger-kilometres flown¹, 1972




European airports
