# DALLAS COMMITTEE FOR FOREIGN VISITORS

The Dallas Committee for Foreign Visitors is an organization of over 800 volunteers who meet, greet, escort and entertain citizens of foreign countries who visit Dallas.

The Committee was organized in 1954 and has steadily increased since that time in the extent of its services and in the number of Dallas citizens involved in the work of its various projects. Two outstanding accomplishments thus far in 1972 bear mention:

1. Participation by a delegation of six members of the Committee in the National Conference on Community Services for International Visitors in Washington in March.

The impact which this group made in the sessions they attended was considerable. Their depiction of the volunteer strength, their enthusiasm for the volunteer spirit which seemed to permeate the conference was noticeably felt.

The Dallas Committee's handbook (guide) to the various chairmen of the committee has a national reputation and many requests for copies were received by the delegation.

2. DCFV, cooperating with the Love Field Management, the City of Dallas, and the Office of International Programs at SMU, has launched a new service at Love Field Airport. The desk and phone provided by the city is an information center, staffed 8 hours a day, 7 days a week, by volunteers from DCFV.

The function of these staff members is to answer questions of foreign visitors. Many people, both foreign and U. S. visitors, stop to chat about Dallas and its people.

Those who serve at the desk say it is much fun and invite others who have not yet served to call and offer to do so.

The next big effort — now in the beginning stages — is to gain the interest of all towns in the area in preparing for the additional foreign visitors, tourists, as well as sponsored visitors, preparing for significant educational and cultural exchange opportunities. The committee leadership see this as a service to the visitor to be sure, but especially to the Texans who have the privilege of gaining a better understanding of other cultures.
