Dear Mr. Mearty:

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Your letter of 8 September 1950 concerning a Presidential Directive on departure of persons from the United States has been carefully reviewed by this office. We are fully in sympathy with the need for further information concerning both citizens and aliens who wish to leave this country and for adequate records on which to base action on passport applications. This Agency wishes to assist such a program both in the interest of internal security and because of related problems in the duties for which we are responsible.

Two major problems are seen in the Proposal as set forth in your letter formarding the Draft Directive — one practical, one involving security. The practical aspect arises from the fact that we necessarily have in various files vast numbers of personal records of one sert or another either strictly biographic, or related to personnel and administration, or those involved in intelligence operations or reports. A great majority of these people would possess information of such a nature that the disclosure of it either willingly or unwillingly to unauthorized persons abroad would endauger the security of the United States. Culling out those who come within this category would be a reference task of major proportions, which at this moment we are not in a position to undortake.

The security problem involves many of the same names as those noted above and under a bread construction the Draft Directive would require CIA to report all of its exployees and the names of all others used by it in various capacities as persons possessing knowledge the unauthorized disclosure of which might seriously indanger the security of the nation. Such a list, for obvious Feasons of security, is not compiled in any one place even within the Agency.

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te believe the solution to the difficulty live in a clearer definition of these persons whose never CIA should and can report under your program. These would be persone who, CIA believes, have information the mauthorized disclosure of which zight seriously endanger the security of the Sates, and who because of their backgro ad or the circulatenees of the propused travel may, in the opinion of CTA, make such unauthorized disclosures. In other words CIA would not report a person merely because of the passession of information, but would report those cases in which CIA believes there is a likelihood of mentherised disclosure. This progres, will commut nore limited in scope than that apparently contraplated by ICIS, would, we believe, be more positive and effective and would be within the capabilities of CTA without impairing the security of intelligence operations.

If you agree with our sugrestions, we would be glad to help redreft the Directive to reflect our position, but perhaps you would prefer to stand by the Braft in so far as the other appointes are concerned and come to a secarate understanding with this Agency. This would be quite Agreeable to us.

In carrying out its functions, perticularly in the field of counter-copionego, GIA would find the information desired by your progress on departures from the United States very valuable. Furthermore, certain individuals, sho in the opinion of other departments have such knowledge that their departure should be controlled, may be considered by this Agency to be such valuable sources of information that their potential for our purposes should entweigh the objections of an other agency, or at least should be considered in connection with the passport application. Furthermore, if we were in possession of the names which would be furnished by other agencies under the proposed regulations, we might be able to furnish positive information for guidance as individual cases arose. Is thereafore strangly recommend that CIA be designated as recipient of such names, both citizen and alies, in connection with our reconstibilities in the field of foreign intelligence.
