## TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR AD HOC FANEL "A"

 The Froblem: To prepare propaganda and psychological strategy plans of global application in the following order of contingencies:
 11an A: Fresent armistice negotiations in Korea are broken off.
 Flan B: Fresent armistice negotiations continue over a protracted period.
 Flan C: Fresent armistice negotiations attain any degree of success.
 Cbjectives:

## PLAN A

- a. To ensure that the policies, attitudes and actions of the United Nations (as they reflect those of the United States)
  with respect to the initiation and conduct of the negotiations are put forcefully before the world.
- b. Concurrently, to vigorously and persuasively undercut the anticipated Communist propaganda and agitation with respect to the issue.
- c. To prevent relaxation in the attitudes, actions and capabilities of the free world, insofar as these are affected by the course of the negotiations.

## PLAN B

- a. To further the early and favorable completion of the negotiations by the application of the total psychological operations means available to the "nited States.
- b. To ensure that the policies and actions of the United Nations (as they reflect those of the United States) with respect to the initiation and conduct of the negotiations are put forcefully before the world.

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- c. Concurrently, to vigorously and persuasively undercut the anticipated Communist propaganda and agitation with respect to the issue.
- d. To prevent relaxation in the attitudes, actions and capabilities of the free world, insofar as these are affected by the course of the negotiations.

PLAN C

- a. To ensure that the policies, attitudes and actions of the United Nations (as they reflect those of the United States) with respect to the initiation and conduct of the negotiations is put forcefully before the world.
- b. Concurrently, to vigorously and persuasively undercut the anticipated Communist propaganda and agitation with respect to the issue.
- c. To prevent relaxation in the attitudes, actions and capabilities of the free world, insofar as these are affected by the course of the negotiations.
- d. To ensure that the United Nations and the United States are credited before the world with responsibility for the successes, and the Soviet Communist regime is charged with responsibility for the failures.
- 3. These plans should be clearly focussed upon the problem and objectives stated above. rsychological strategy plans of a wider scope are concurrently under survey.

SUPJECT: List of Froblems for the Director and Staff in Under of Work Friority

As the first important task, I have had my staff prepare for your consideration a list of the problems in the field of psychological strategy which are troubling your departments.

Time has not permitted a full staff survey. However, we have obtained from the areas of your departments responsible for psychological operations lists of the problems which they feel require examination by 1SP. In addition, my staff, who have been generously loaned to me by your departments, have examined these lists in the light of their own personal knowledge of the problems which are vexing them.

I have had this list organized so as to reflect both their relative importance to the cold war effort, and a workable order of handling by the staff, taking into consideration the phased growth of the staff and the capabilities of the departments to furnish personnel assistance to the staff.

This list reflects a caution I gave my staff which is of great concern to me. In my many talks with those in Washington about the state of our nsychological effort, I have come upon many problems which are immediate, are serious and are not being dealt with as effectively as they might be. I appreciate the necessity of the board being remsonally concerned about each of these. But as I see it, these problems must not be accented by the board and staff without careful consideration of the effect that this may have upon the solution of the board's longer range problems in a systematic and orderly fashion.

I find that the problems coming within the purview of 4 SP fall into four general categories.

- a. Fsychological strategy planning not previously in tiated.
- b. Work already in the planning stage or being implemented by departments and agencies, which requires review by FSB in order to fill policy gaps.
- c. Froblems for which effective policies exist but which will require implementation planning.
- d. Crisis problems which will arise from time to time.

The fist includes only categories a, b and c. In general terms the problems down to and including II C in the attached list fall under category a. My staff has not undertaken at this time to make a specific division among the other categories.

The problems are listed in the first column in approximate order of importance.

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The work priority for the staff, taking into consideration in adjustment of priority needs to staff capabilities, has been established as indicated in column 3 Work Priority for the Staff) to include the First 9 items.

The first h problems in the Work triority column are in work or completed.

I have furnished you a progress report on Froblem 11 G (Fsychological Strategy Flans for Post Armistice contingencies (Korea)) by separate memorandum. Aside from the problems referred to above, with which the staff is presently seized, I feel that problem I and Problem AI D are of the highest priority. I expect to put before you in the near future a proposal for accomplishing Froblem I.

In viewof the fact that I am unable at this time to visualize the specific phasing in the augmentation of my staff, I felt that the priorities for the remaining items should not be indicated at this time.
