POLISH AND SOVIET MILITARY INSTALLATIONS IN POLAND

Summary: This report contains [redacted] information on six military installations occupied by Polish ground forces units and one installation occupied by the Soviet Army in Poland. Included is information on the compound in WROCLAW occupied jointly by headquarters of the Silesian Military District and II Armored Corps, the pinpoint location of the headquarters of the 11th Armored Div in ZAGAN, and details of the specific buildings occupied by 11th Armored Div units within the casern in ZAGAN. Information is also given on the compound of an unidentified Soviet hospital and infantry battalion in WROCLAW.

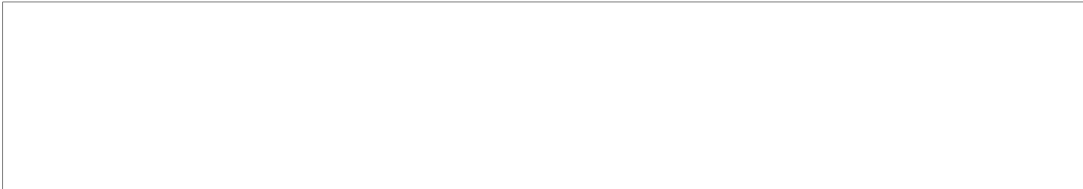

Introduction

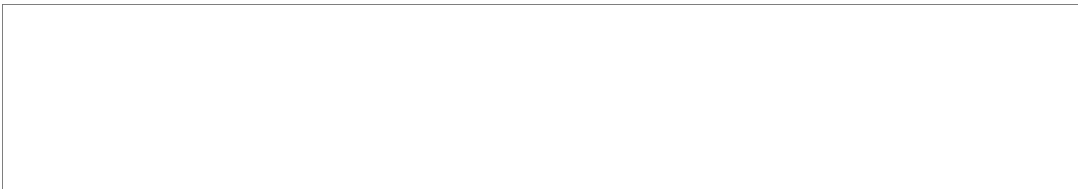

A. POLISH INSTALLATIONS

1. Two Army Installations in WROCLAW

a. Silesian Military District and II Armored Corps Headquarters Compound

(1) Location

The headquarters compound was located in the downtown section of the city, approximately 500 m west of the Plac Powstańców Śląskich in WROCLAW (see Annex A for pinpoint location and layout). This compound was bounded on the south side by Ulica Sztabowa, on the west side by Ulica Pruchniaka, and on the north-northwest side by Ulica Bernarda Pretficsa.


(2) Installation

(For  sketch of this installation, see Annex A.)

There was no sharp division between the offices of the two headquarters, the Silesian Military District and the II Armored Corps.¹ The commanding generals had their separate offices on the third floor of Wing 1a, adjacent to each other, and the staff offices of both headquarters were either occupied by the same offices together or were situated in the same sections of the buildings. This compound consisted of three sections. The main section included the headquarters building, EM billets and officers' club, moving picture theater, and transient officers' quarters. (See items 1a, 1b, 1c, 2, 3 and 3a, 9 and 10 of Annex A.) The second section was composed of the guardhouse and pass office (see item 4 of Annex A). The third section included the motor pool area and the finance office. (See items 5, 6, 7 and 8 of Annex A.)

(3) Administration

 the Quartermaster branch or an officer from that branch was responsible for the housekeeping details of this compound.

[redacted] the EM who worked in the headquarters, the guardhouse, and the motor park were billeted in one building.

(4) Equipment and Transportation

[redacted] this headquarters used radios since antennas could be seen on top of the headquarters building, [redacted]

[redacted] The motor pool serving this headquarters had an unknown number of trucks, motorcycles, and sedans, [redacted]

(5) Security

The main section of this compound was partly, but not completely, enclosed by the wall or the hedge which grew in places. The headquarters building was bordered by streets on three sides. [redacted] during duty hours all entrances were guarded by an EM wearing a cap with a red band and armed with a pistol. During the night all entrances were locked and the first floor was illuminated and patrolled by a guard inside the building. During hours of darkness, the outside grounds of the headquarters building were patrolled by one sentry who was armed with a submachine gun.

The guardhouse and pass office were open 24 hours a day and housed the officer of the guard and the guard detail, strength unknown. The entrance to the guardhouse was illuminated at night.

The motor park was enclosed by a mesh wire fence. The gate and the pedestrian entrance were open in the day time and guarded by two EM, both armed with SMGs. At night the entrances were locked and guarded by a sentry usually located in a nearby guard shed. The garages and vehicles parked in the open were guarded at night by one walking sentry.

To enter the headquarters building, a separate pass was required for the offices of the commanding generals of the Military District and the II Armored Corps and offices of the tactical and operations staff sections of both headquarters. These passes were issued by the duty officer on duty at the guardhouse and pass office or his representative. Upon presentation of the appointment slip or official orders calling the officer to the headquarters, the duty officer checked it by phone with the office to be contacted and then issued the pass. A different type of pass was issued by the same office to visitors of the ground forces and technical staff section offices. This pass could be obtained by presentation of orders and/or by giving the name, grade, and office number of the individual to be visited. [redacted] this type of pass was easy to obtain, especially if one knew some officer by name who worked in an office. [redacted]

b. Motor Transport Compound

(1) Location

This installation was situated in the Rakewiec district of WROCEAW, approximately 600 m southwest of the Odra River. It was bounded on the southwest

side by Ulica Generala Pradzynskiego, on the west side by Ulica Lukaszewskiego, on the north side by Ulica Miernicza, and on the northwest side by Ulica Remalda Traugutta (see Annex B for pinpoint location).

(2) Installation

(For [redacted] sketch and a detailed description of this installation, see Annex B.)

(3) Equipment

[redacted] the transportation unit was equipped with an unknown number of unidentified ZIS-type trucks of WW II vintage, GAZ-69 trucks called "Gazik", Polish-made Star-type trucks, and a few Lublin-type trucks. [redacted] saw two or three Dodge 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -ton trucks entering or leaving this installation.

(4) Security

This compound was surrounded by a mesh wire fence and had one entrance through the archway of the headquarters building (item 1, Annex B). One room of the main building, situated to the side of the underpass, was used as a guard room and pass office. The entrance was guarded by one sentry wearing a helmet and armed with a SMG. This guard checked the vehicles and the military identification books of uniformed personnel wishing to visit the military store at this installation.

2. Three Army Installations in ZAGAN (W51-32, E15-19) (WT 220185)

a. 11th Armored Div Headquarters Building

(1) Location

This headquarters building was situated in the northeast part of ZAGAN, approximately 300 m west of the Bebr River highway bridge at ZAGAN, north of Ulica Zarska, and east of an unnamed, dead-end street (see Annex C for pinpoint location).

(2) Installation

The 11th Armored Div headquarters occupied only one building.

(3) Security

The building was located on Ulica Zarska on the south side and an unidentified dead-end street on the west side; no fences were seen on the east and north sides. The only entrance [redacted] was on the west side of the building about 25 m north of Ulica Zarska. Three or four steps led directly from the street to the vestibule which was guarded by one sentry who wore a cap with a black band and was armed with a SMG. To the left of the vestibule there was a room which served as a pass office and a guard room.

During the hours of darkness [redacted] the first floor of this building was illuminated and [redacted] the outside of the building was guarded by a walking sentry armed with a SMG.

b. Casern Used by 11th Armored Div Units

(1) Location

(For [redacted] pinpoint location of this installation, see Annex D.) It was located northwest of ŻAGAN, north of the highway from ŻAGAN to ŻARY (N51-38, E15-09) (WT 100210) and approximately 400 m west of the railroad line from ŻAGAN to BIENIÓW (N51-43, E15-11).

(2) Installation

This casern (located in former German territory) was built by the Germans at an unknown date prior to WW II and was used to house the Herman Goering "SS" Panzer Div. During the war this installation was damaged slightly but was repaired by the Poles during the period 1946 to 1949. The barracks buildings, 14 in all, fronted on the ŻAGAN-ŻARY highway, adjoined to the rear and north by the headquarters and regimental mess buildings, totaling seven buildings.

[redacted] with the exception of the infantry troops of the motorized infantry battalion of the 8th Med Tk Regt and of the 15th Mecz Regt, who slept in double-decked beds, there was sufficient space to house all troops described in Annex D in single beds.

The training areas, ideal for armor problems, were located adjacent to the casern on the west, toward ŻARY, on both sides of the ŻAGAN-ŻARY highway.

(4) Equipment³.

[Redacted] the capacity of the garages at this installation [Redacted] was ample space to keep all equipment under cover when it was not in use. There was no equipment parked or stored in the casern open areas.

The Division Equipment Repair Shop, which was in two large buildings, was capable of replacing and overhauling vehicle engines and of performing "higher" echelon maintenance on 11th Armored Div equipment. [Redacted]

[Redacted] armor repairs which could not be handled by this shop were done by the Tank Repair Shop in SIEMIANOWICE (N50-18, E19-02).

(5) Security

The casern was enclosed by a two-meter-high mesh wire fence, topped with three barbed wire strands mounted on cement posts, with the top part inclined toward installation. The over-all security for the installation was the responsibility of the Zagan garrison guard, which was quartered and had its headquarters at this casern. The garrison commander was the unidentified CO of the 22d Independent Tk Regt or the CO of the 15th Mecz Regt [Redacted]

[Redacted]. The detail for this duty, [Redacted] estimated at from 45 to 60 men, was supplied by the regiments stationed in the casern, rotating according to roster. The garrison guard manned the main entrance to the casern and provided walking posts along the casern fences. This guard also patrolled the city of ZAGAN and guarded the casern prison, also located in the casern.

In addition, individual regiments and battalions had their own guards around mess halls and meter parks.

The main entrance to the casern, which was open 24 hours a day, was manned by two sentries who wore caps with black bands and were armed with SMGs. The entrance to the casern, the mess hall and headquarters buildings, the meter parks, and the maintenance shop were illuminated at night.

c. Meter Transport Command

This compound was located about 500 m south of the town square, on the west side of the ZAGAN-LAWSZOWA highway (see Annex F for [Redacted] pinpoint location of this installation).

(4) Equipment

[redacted] unidentified WW II Soviet ZIS-type and newer Polish Lublin and Star-type trucks entering or leaving the compound.

(5) Security

This compound was enclosed by a two-meter-high mesh wire fence and had one vehicle entrance, which was guarded by a transportation sentry, armed with a SMG, and one pedestrian entrance to the main building, also guarded by a sentry. At night, the main gate, and the warehouse and garage area were illuminated.

3. 34th Labor Bn Casern in STRZELCE OPOLSKIE (N51-06, E19-47) (CA 087991)

a. Location

(For [redacted] pinpoint location of this casern, see Annex G.)

This casern was situated in the northwestern outskirts of STRZELCE OPOLSKIE, approximately 1,000 m northwest of the town square and southwest of the OPOLE-STRZELCE OPOLSKIE highway, at coordinates CA 076998.

b. Installation

This installation consisted of a total of six buildings and two additional buildings under construction. At least three of the buildings were not fully utilized since only the headquarters of the 34th Labor Bn, comprising approximately 100 officers and EM, was located here [redacted] there was a team consisting of an unknown number of tank officers visiting this installation [redacted] the talk among the officers indicated that in the future this installation was to be occupied by an unidentified tank unit. [redacted] the 34th Labor Bn still occupied this casern [redacted]

c. Administration

[redacted] the CO of the 34th Labor Bn was also responsible for the administration of this casern through his Quartermaster officer, Maj SZEMLEJ, (fnu).

d. Equipment

The 34th Labor Bn had an unknown number of ZIS, Star, and Lublin type trucks. In addition, there were a few horses which were used to haul supplies from the surrounding farms and from the railroad station at STRZELCE OPOLSKIE. Most of the trucks assigned to this installation were used to transport troops to their place of work.

e. Security

This casern was enclosed by a two-meter-high mesh wire fence mounted on cement poles and topped with three or four strands of barbed wire. The entrance was guarded by two sentries, each armed with old-type submachine gun or carbine. In addition, at night there was a two-man patrol walking around inside the fence. The gasoline pump, mess hall, and the garages, each were guarded by one sentry during night hours.

B. SOVIET INSTALLATION IN POLAND

Unidentified Hospital and Unidentified Infantry Battalion Casern in WROCLAW

a. Location

This casern was situated in the Karlowice district of WROCLAW, north of Ulica Ignacego Chrzanowskiego and east of Ulica Czajkowskiego.

b. Installtion

This compound consisted of 10 red brick buildings and two wooden barracks. The headquarters and the hospital were in two of the buildings, and the rest of the buildings were occupied by troops wearing magenta shoulderboards, [] called infantry troops. [] estimated the strength at one battalion.

c. Administration

[] no knowledge of the administration of this installation.

d. Equipment

[] no knowledge of the equipment of the hospital. [] an unknown number of unidentified Soviet trucks and ambulances were parked in the area around the garages.

e. Security

This installation was enclosed by a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -m-high mesh wire fence. The main gate and the adjoining guardhouse and pass office were guarded by a sentry who wore magenta shoulderboards and was armed with a submachine gun.

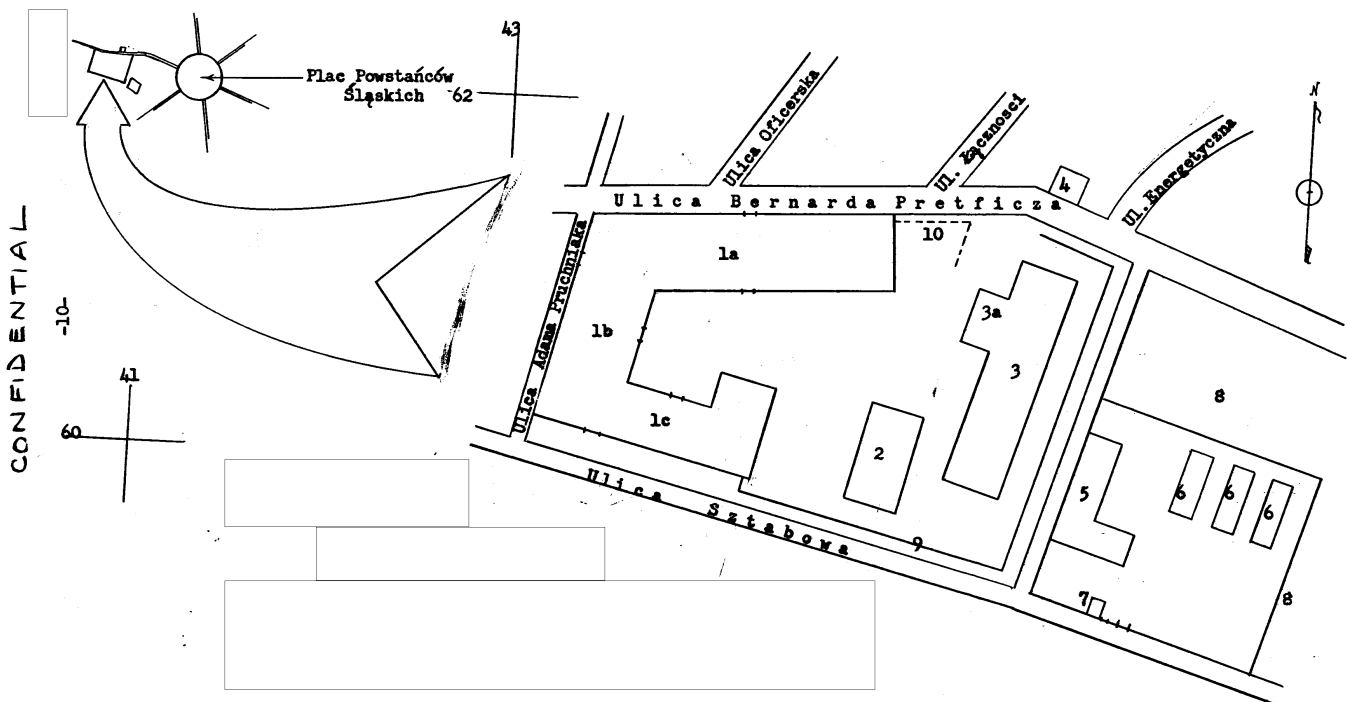
There was a pedestrian entrance, fenced in and leading directly to the officers' club and quarters. []

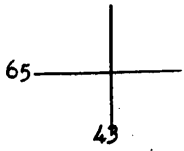
1. Four-stories high, gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with tile. This structure was in the form of a figure six (6) and housed the offices in its three wings (1a, 1b, 1c) as follows:
 - Wing 1a, approximately 50 m x 12 m in size.
 - The first and second floors were occupied by the Training (Tactics) and Operations Staff Section of the Silesian Military District and II Armored Corps Headquarters.
 - Third Floor - Commanding Generals, the Deputy CG for Political Matters, Military District Party Commission (Okrękowa Komisja Partyjna) and Political Branch of Special Units, such as: labor battalions and others [redacted]
 - Fourth Floor- Political Branch Supply (books, training aids, films), code rooms, and radio rooms; antennas were mounted on top of the building.
 - Wing 1b, approximately 30 m x 12 m in size - Offices of Rear Services, Quartermaster, Medical Service
 - Wing 1c, approximately 30 m x 15 m x 12 m in size - Offices of chiefs of ground forces and technical staff sections (Signal, Engineer, Transportation, etc.)
2. Three-stories-high, red brick building with a peaked roof covered with red tile and approximately 20 m x 12 m in size. This building housed the EM of the detachment serving this headquarters. [redacted]
3. Three-stories-high, gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with red tile, approximately 60 m x 15 m in size. The first floor of this building housed the officers' club, dining room, dance and movie hall, and library, while the second and third floors were used as officers' transient billets.
- 3a. One-story-high, red brick structure approximately 15 m x 12 m in size which was an extension of the movie and dance hall mentioned in item 3, above.
4. One-story-high, red brick building approximately 10 m x 4 m in size. This building housed the guard detail with the officer in charge, the pass office, and the telephone exchange with approximately 15 telephone booths for local city calls.
5. L-shaped, three-stories-high, old gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with brown tile, approximately 30 m x 15 m x 10 m in size, which housed the finance offices and the motor dispatch office.
6. Three newly constructed garages (1954), capacity and size unknown.
7. Wooden, portable type, guard shed approximately 4 m x 4 m in size, by the main gate and pedestrian entrance.
8. Mesh wire fence about 2½ m high.
9. Two-meter high wall.
10. Two-meter high hedge.

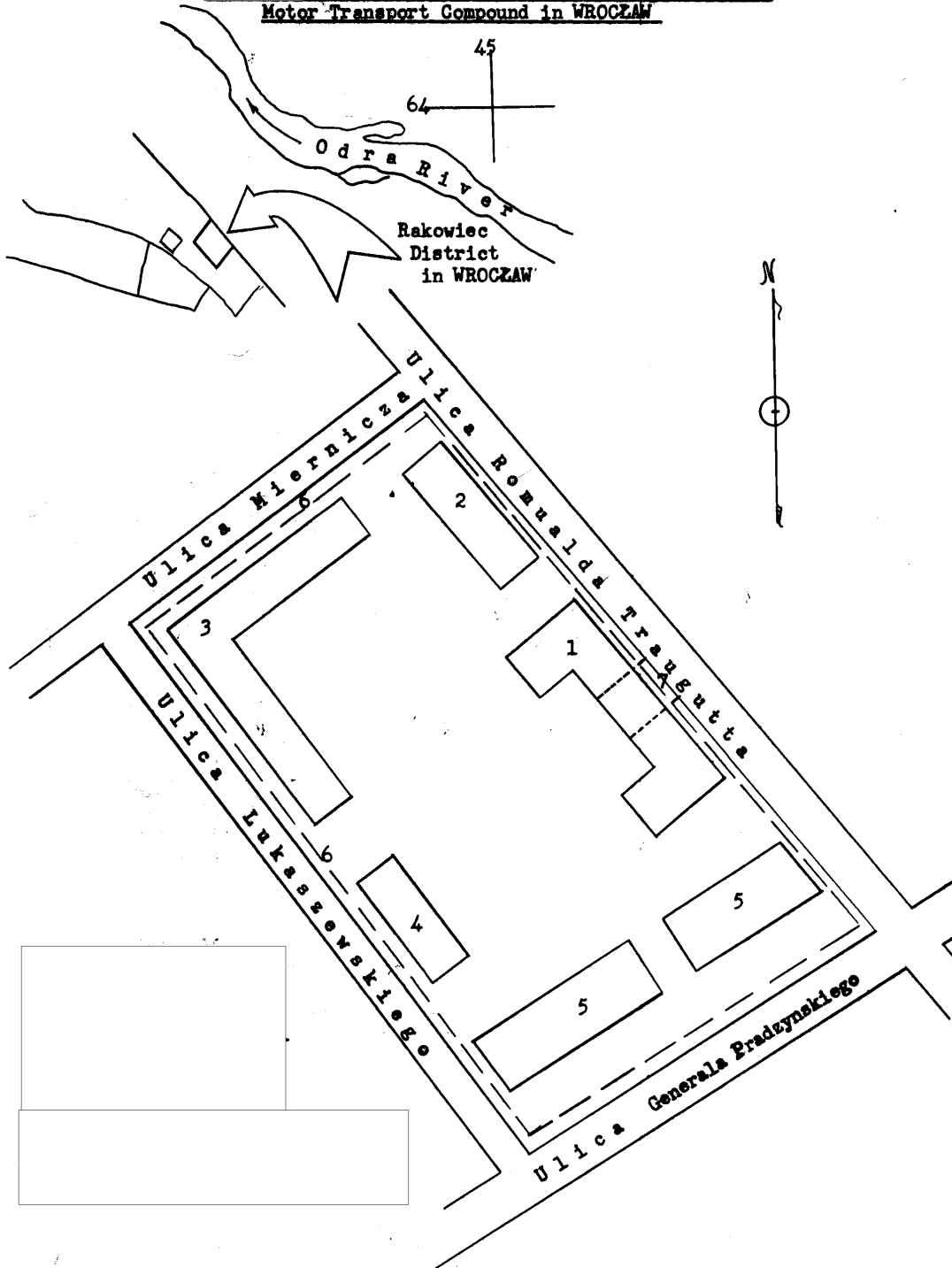

LEGEND:

1. U-shaped, three-stories-high, gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with red tile, approximately 80 m x 30 m x 12 m in size, with an underpass for vehicular traffic. The first floor of this building housed the headquarters of an unidentified motor transportation battalion, a military store, a barber shop, and a guard and pass office. The second and third floors were occupied by troops.
2. Three-stories-high, gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with red tile, approximately 50 m x 12 m in size. This building housed reserve troops, strength and type unknown, who were taking three months training at this installation.
3. Three-stories-high, L-shaped, gray stucco building, size unknown, which housed troops and an unidentified band.
4. Three-stories-high, gray stucco structure, size and use unknown.
5. Two one-story-high, gray stucco buildings, each about 50 m x 12 m in size, used as garages, capacity unknown.
6. Mesh wire fence about two meters high.
7. Entrance through an archway.

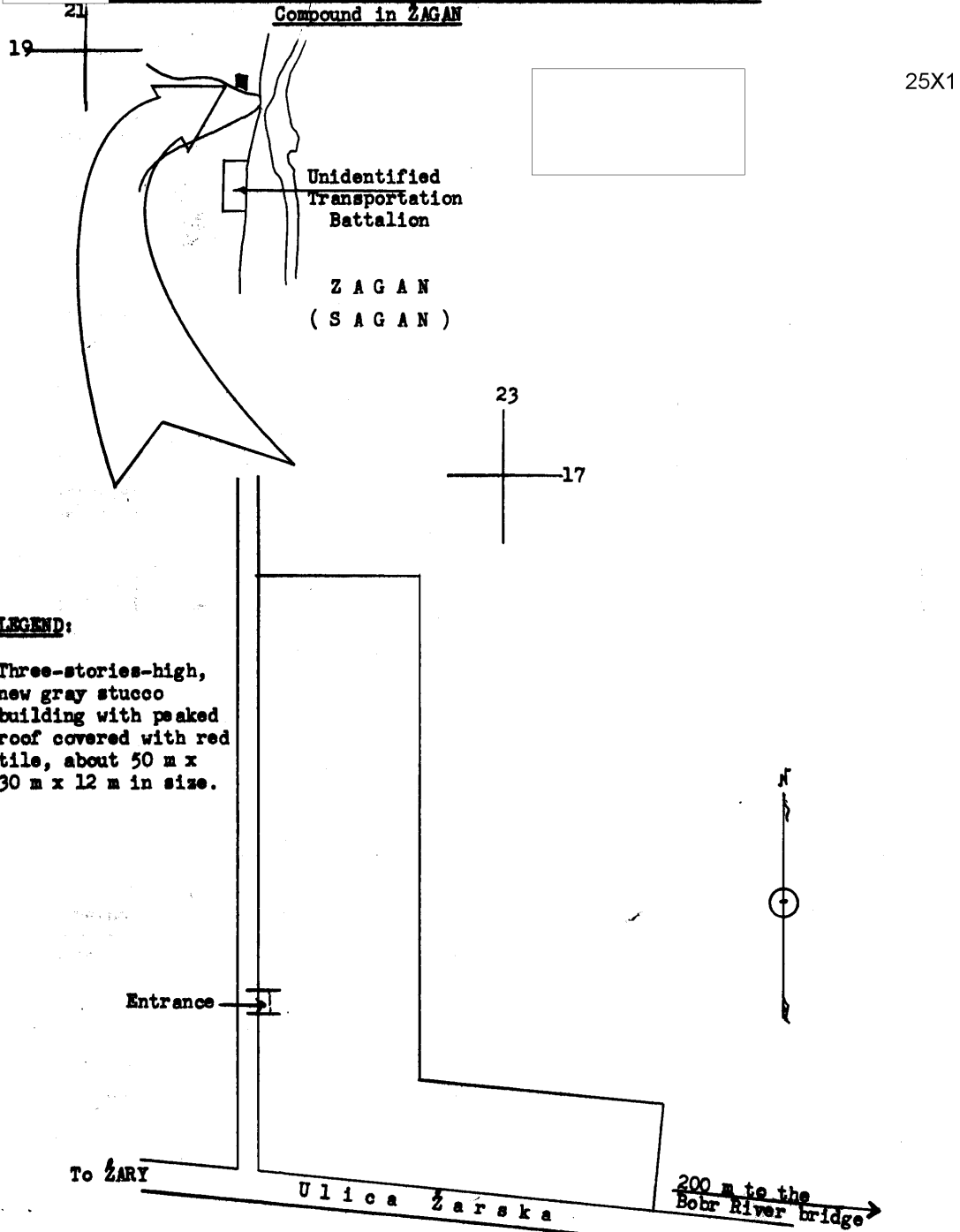

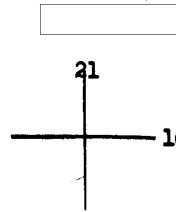

(Station of Elements of the 11th Armored Div)

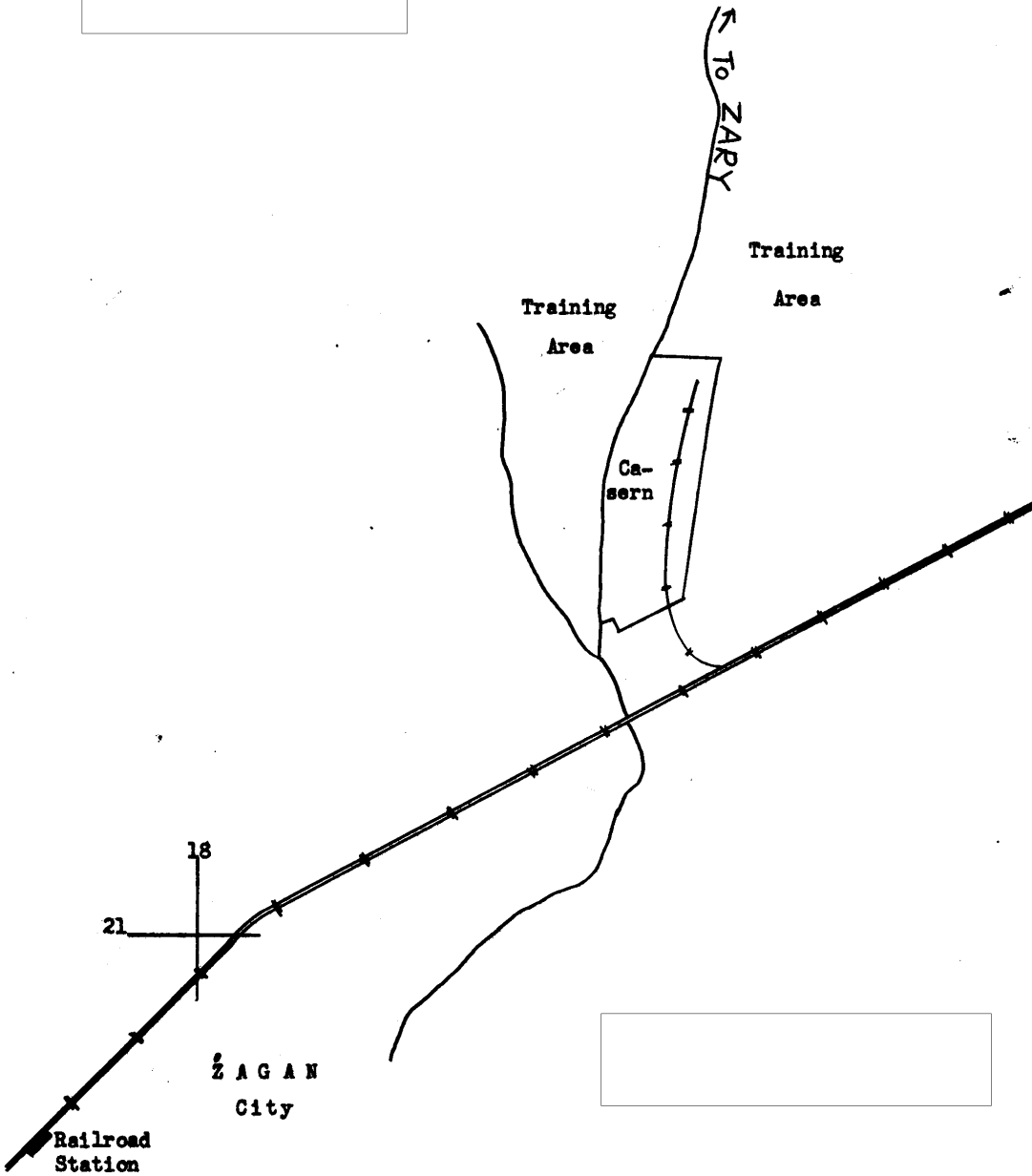

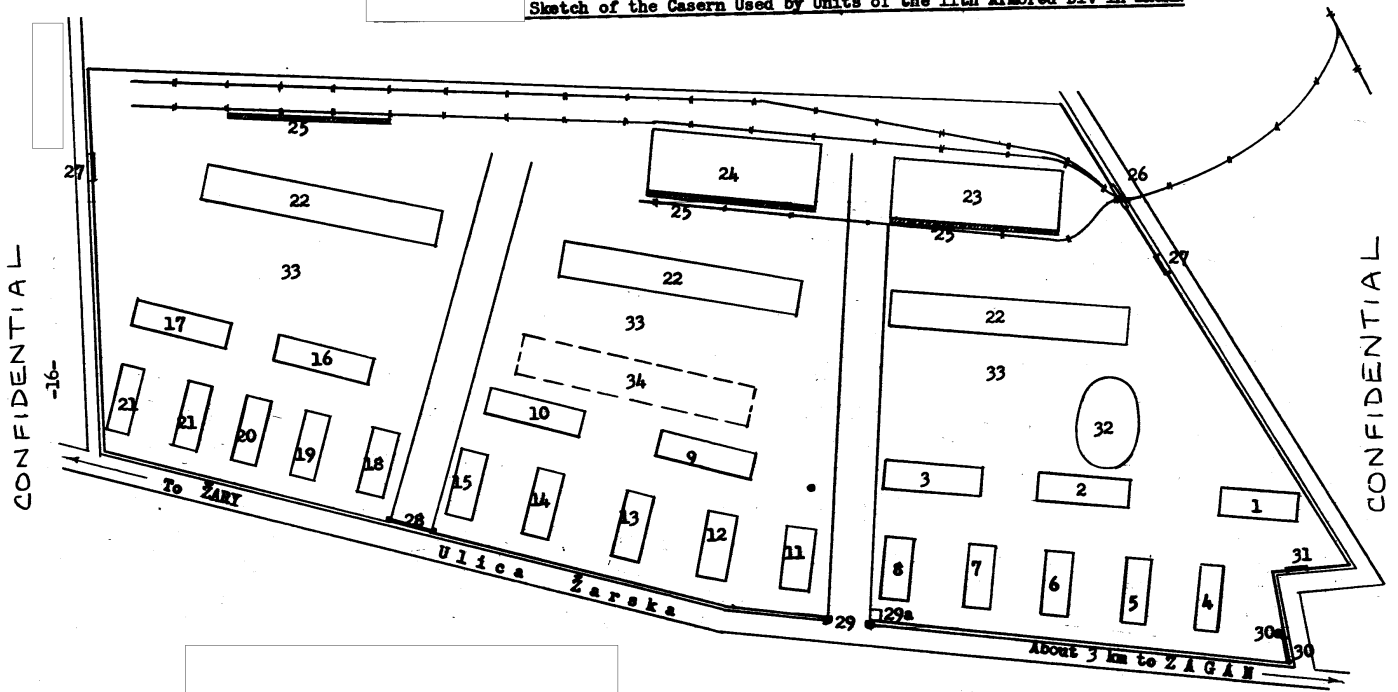

1. through 21. [redacted] each of these buildings was approximately 55 m x 12 m, three stories high, of gray stucco construction, and had a peaked roof covered with tin sheets. [redacted] all of these buildings had high roofs and the units' supply storage rooms were located in the attics. These buildings were used and occupied as follows:
1. **Headquarters and Barracks.** The first floor of this building housed the headquarters of the 8th Med Tk Regt and the regimental library. The second and third floors were occupied by troops of the headquarters platoon (administration and supply) and troops of the motorized infantry battalion, both of the 8th Med Tk Regt. Troops slept in double-decked beds.
2. **Regimental Mess.** The 8th Tk Regt mess was on the first floor, with storage rooms in the cellar. The dining room and additional ration storage rooms were on the second floor. The third floor housed the regimental tailor shop, shoe repair shop, and unidentified regimental store rooms.
3. **Regimental Headquarters and Mess.** Headquarters offices of the 17th Hvy SP Arty Regt, the regimental library, and the kitchen were on the first floor. The basement was used for rations and kitchen storage. The dining room and additional ration storage rooms were on the second floor. The third floor housed the regimental tailor shop, shoe repair shops, and unidentified supply rooms. Troops of the 23d School Bn also messed here.
4. **Barracks and Company Orderly Rooms.** This building was occupied by troops of an unidentified signal battalion of the 11th Armored Div and by troops of the 8th Med Tk Regt. The signal battalion headquarters and company orderly rooms were also located in this building.
5. **Barracks.** This building was occupied by troops of the 8th Med Tk Regt.
6. **Headquarters and Barracks.** The headquarters and all students of the 23d School Bn were located in this building. The troops messed in the 17th Hvy SP Arty Regt mess hall, item 3, above.
7. **Barracks,** occupied by troops of the 17th Hvy SP Arty Regt.
8. **Barracks and Casern Barber Shop.** Troops of the 17th Hvy SP Arty Regt were billeted here. In addition, the only barber shop for the entire installation was located in a room on the first floor of this building. The barber shop was operated by three civilian barbers who resided in ZAGAN.
9. **Headquarters and Regimental Mess.** The headquarters offices of the 15th Mees Regt, the regimental mess, and the library were located in this building. [redacted] the rest of the building was utilized as in items 2 and 3 above.
10. **Headquarters and Mess.** The headquarters offices of the 13th AT Arty Bn and of an unidentified rocket launcher unit were located in this building. In addition, a regimental sized mess hall was also located here. [redacted] the rest of it was utilized as described in items 2 and 3 above.

- 18 and 19. Barracks, occupied by troops of an unidentified engineer (sapper) battalion and reconnaissance company.
- 20 and 21. Barracks, occupied by troops of the 22d Independent Tk Regt.
22. Three areas, each about 60 m x 15 m, containing an unknown number of gray stucco garages, capacity unknown.
23. Part of the Division Equipment Repair Shop. A one-story-high, gray stucco building, approximately 60 m x 30 m x 15 m in size.
24. Part of the Division Equipment Repair Shop. A one-story-high, gray stucco building, approximately 75 m x 30 m x 25 m in size, equipped with special overhead rail cranes, type and capacity unknown.
25. Three tank and heavy equipment loading ramps, each of concrete-steel construction, size unknown.
26. Steel gate used for railroad traffic only.

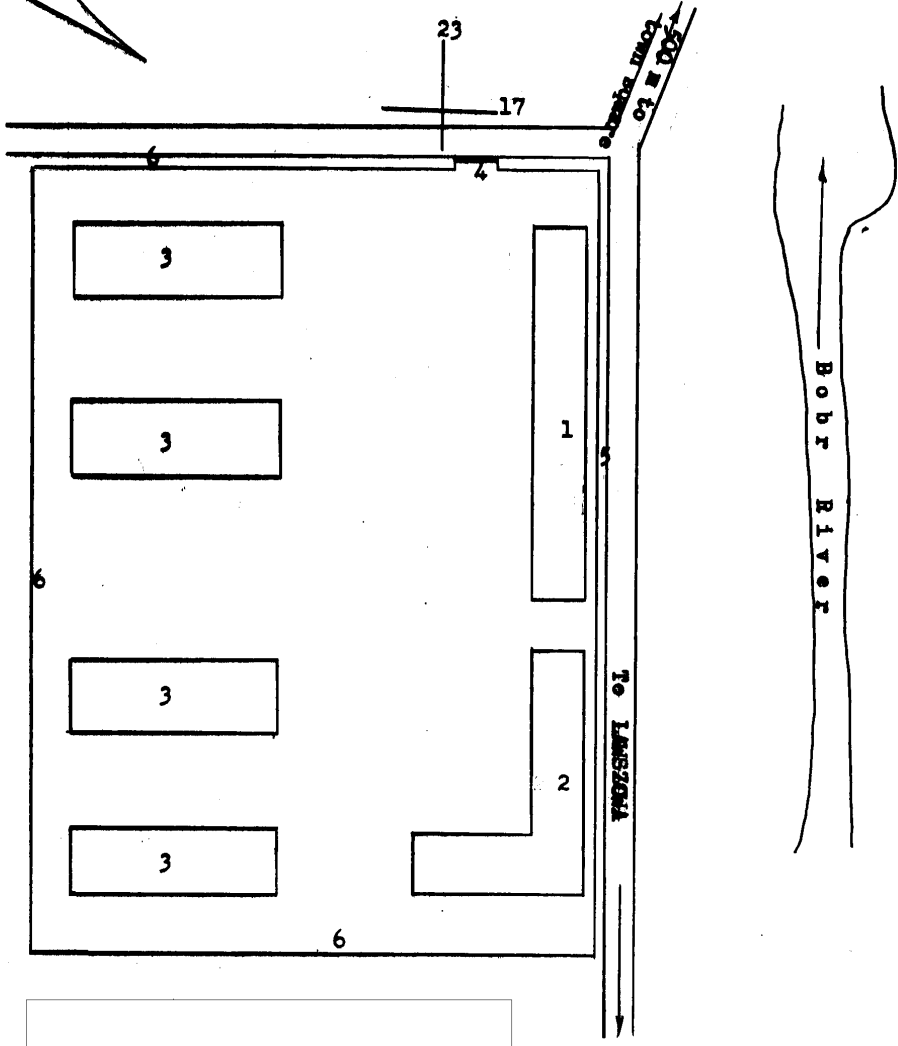

5. Gasoline station with two pumps. There was one underground tank and one tank above ground, capacities unknown.
6. Stables. A three-stories-high gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with gray tile, approximately 60 m x 10 m in size. An unknown number of horses were stabled in the cellar and straw and hay were stored on the first floor. The remainder of the building was without doors and windows and was not used.
7. Storage. A three-stories-high gray stucco building with a peaked roof covered with gray tile, approximately 60 m x 10 m in size. The basement and first floor were used for storage of rations and uniforms. The second and third floors were not used.
8. Garages. This was a one-story-high gray stucco building, approximately 30 m x 10 m in size, covered with a slanted tin sheet roof; the doors were made of steel. The capacity of this garage was unknown.
9. Two new buildings under construction; the ground was broken in the fall of 1954.
10. Pistol and SMG firing range with three firing points; it encompassed an area of about 60 m x 15 m in size.

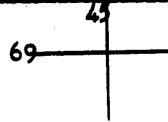

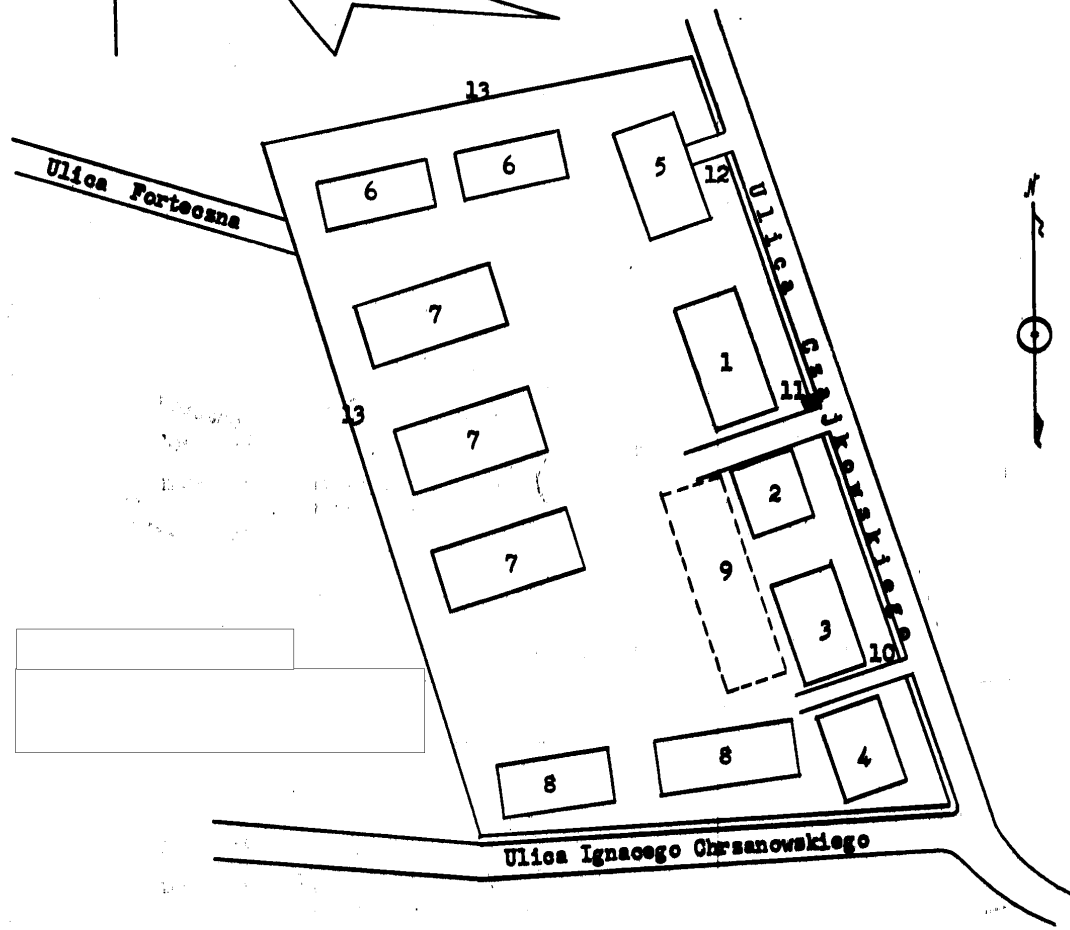
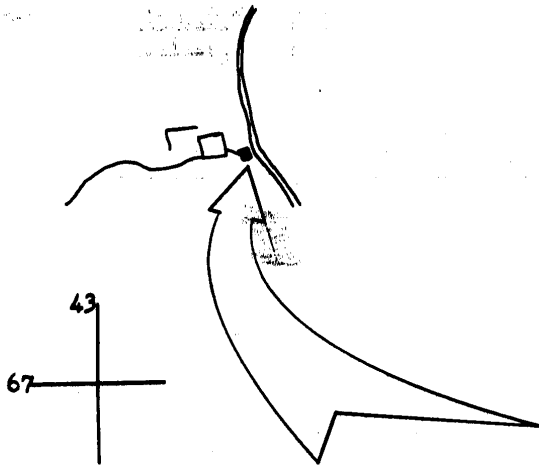
