ADDENDUM TO JOURNAL

STAT 1. [REDACTED] LIAISON Called Col. Steve Harrick, DoD Congressional Liaison Office, to request that he extend for one day the 19 January deadline for return of the transcript from the 3 August 1977 hearing on NATO Posture and Initiatives. Our analysts in NFAC/OSR requested this extension and are finding the transcript particularly useful. Col. Harrick indicated that this extension would be fine with him.

STAT 2. [REDACTED] CONSTITUENT Called Debbie Bittner, in the office of Senator Dewey Bartlett (R., Okla.), in response to the Senator's endorsement of the Tulsa Council of the Navy League's invitation for the Director to address their annual dinner-dance in October 1978. I told her that we appreciated the Senator's interest, but that the Director had already informed the sponsors that his schedule precluded his being able to attend their commemoration of Navy day.

STAT 3. [REDACTED] BRIEFING I attended the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, Program and Budget Authorization Subcommittee, pre-budget orientation briefings on FBI intelligence and counterintelligence activities, Department of Defense counterintelligence activities, Department of State intelligence activities and Department of Energy intelligence activities. (See Memorandum for the Record.)

STAT 4. [REDACTED] LIAISON Per [REDACTED] request I forwarded to Mary Dooley, of the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Criminal Laws and Procedures staff, two copies of "A Dollar Cost Comparison of Soviet and U.S. Defense Activities, 1967-1977."

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25X1 11. [] LIAISON Attended the first meeting of the White House Liaison group for the second session of the 95th Congress at the White House this afternoon. The meeting was principally concerned with preparations for budget submissions and the group was addressed by James McIntyre, Director of OMB.

25X1 12. [] LIAISON Spoke with Fred Barron, in the Attorney General's office, and Mike O'Neil, Chief Counsel, House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, in the interest of assuring that the loop was completely closed on the subject of further dealings with the House International Relations Subcommittee on International Organizations.

25X1 13. [] EMPLOYMENT Received a call from Mary Kay Anderson, in the office of Representative Andrew Jacobs (D., Ind.), who requested that an employment package be sent to their Indianapolis district office for a constituent. OLC Registry will handle.

25X1 14. [] LIAISON Received a call from Steve Emerson, Senate Foreign Relations Committee staff, who asked when his subscription to the [] Daily Report on the Middle East would begin. After checking with [] Liaison, I called Emerson back and told him it would be 24 January.

25X1 15. [] LIAISON Met with John Atkisson, General Counsel, House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Subcommittee on Investigations and Oversight, and showed him a Secret intelligence report of 1972 dealing with an international meeting concerning the establishment of a uranium cartel. I told Atkisson that the report would have to be sanitized if he wished CIA to make a formal response to Chairman John E. Moss' (D., Calif.) request for such material. Atkisson said he was not interested in the details of how the material was acquired and would be very happy to have a sanitized version. He understands that even the sanitized version will be classified. Atkisson indicated a deep knowledge in the meeting which was the subject of the report. He also said that the State Department and the Department of Energy have been asked to report to the Committee on this subject but have not to date.

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25X1 20. [] LIAISON Jack Blake, A/DDCI, called to advise me of a conversation with John Ahearne, Department of Energy. Ahearne told Mr. Blake that in a meeting with DOE representatives today, Representative John D. Dingell (D., Mich.) commented that he was not happy with our letter concerning access to [] materials and that he might find it necessary to resort to subpoenas. I told Mr. Blake that I found it difficult to believe that Mr. Dingell would escalate that matter to the subpoena level without communicating with us further but I could not guarantee it. I discussed this letter with [] EA/DCI; he agreed with my suggestion that we do nothing on this for the moment and await further contact from Mr. Dingell recognizing that the possibility that Mr. Dingell could resort to the subpoena process without prior notification even though we thought it unlikely. 25X1

25X1 21. ([] LIAISON Talked with Bill Miller, Staff Director, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, regarding the status of charter legislation. I informed Miller, in general, of conversations which took place on this subject at the DCI's meeting today and efforts we were making to move forward on this issue with the Committee. I did ask, however, if he thought it would still be meaningful to get together this afternoon since I understood from [] EA/DCI, that he (Miller) planned to draw up a new draft of the charter legislation which would be made available to us on Monday. Miller encouraged us to meet this afternoon for further dialogue and I told him that [] would head up our team that would be meeting with him, Elliot Maxwell, also of the Committee staff, and representatives of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence. 25X1

25X1 Miller advised me that after consulting with Senator Birch Bayh (D., Ind.), who is expected to be the new Chairman of the Select Committee when the second session of the 95th Congress convenes, it had been decided to move Ambassador Carlucci's nomination confirmation hearings up to Friday the 27th of January for the open session and reserving Monday the 30th for executive session if it appears necessary for the hearings to run two days. This information has been passed on to Ambassador Carlucci as well as the DCI and A/DDCI.

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25X1 23. [] LIAISON Larry Epstein, in the
office of Representative Donald Mitchell (D., N. Y.), called with a
25X1 request for background material on Kenya for Mr. Mitchell. After
checking with [] NFAC/CSS, I said that we would pull a
package together and send it to the Congressman's office in care of
Carl Sahre per his request.

25X1 24. [] LIAISON Called Susan Dine, in
the office of Representative Les Aspin (D., Wisc.), and asked her
if she had an extra copy of Mr. Aspin's twenty-six page paper on SALT II
and whether we could have a copy of it (for [] in OSR, per
25X1 [] NFAC/CSS). She said that she would send it over, but
I requested that they hold it for our courier to pick up.

25X1 25. [] ADMINISTRATIVE - DELIVERIES
Sent via courier to Ralph Preston, on the staff of the House Appropriations
Defense Subcommittee, the "International Defense Review" magazine,
December, 1977 issue.

25X1 26. [] LIAISON Called John Ahearne,
Department of Energy, by way of follow-up to a call he had placed to
✓ Jack Blake, A/DDCI. In response to his question, I told him we had
briefed Representative Morris Udall (D., Ariz.) on [] on 26
August 1977. We talked about the response which DOE would make to
an inquiry from Mr. Udall for copies of our [] documents in their
25X1 possession. I suggested (as I have done with several other DOE
representatives) that they indicate that in accordance with the third
agency rule, any request for documents which DOE has obtained from
CIA should be addressed to the Agency. Ahearne (as other DOE repre-
sentatives) expressed a reluctance to make any reference to the third
agency rule. They feel that referring to this rule is tantamount to invoking
executive privilege. He said they are merely indicating to Mr. Udall
that [] documents in their possession include some CIA material
and that requests for access to those materials should be addressed
25X1 to the Agency. I said this was acceptable to us.

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26. [Redacted] LIAISON/FOIA I called and spoke with Mr. Walter Ramsey, Administrative Assistant to Senator Harrison A. Williams, Jr. (D., N.J.), concerning the release of the Senator's name in a Privacy Act request. I briefly described the six or seven letters involved in the release and Mr. Ramsey voiced no objection, but thanked me for informing him. I also mentioned that the letters were being released to [Redacted] attorney, who is with the ACLU, and not directly to her.

27. [Redacted] LIAISON/FOIA I called and spoke with Ms. Frances Henderson, Administrative Assistant to Senator Clifford P. Case (R., N.J.), concerning the release of the Senator's name in a Privacy Act request. I briefly described and gave dates for the two documents containing the Senator's name. She vaguely recalled the name of [Redacted] and said she would make a note in her file of my call.

28. [Redacted] LIAISON I returned a call to Lee Martin, Department of Energy, Current Assessments Branch (Intelligence), who indicated that the GAO was investigating the [Redacted] matter within the Department of Energy and that the GAO investigators wanted access to classified files possibly relating to the [Redacted] affair which had been generated by Dr. Charles Reichart, former Director of Intelligence, AEC. I asked Mr. Martin to have his historian Xerox all of the material in question and courier it to me. I would then assume responsibility for any necessary review of the material for CIA originated documents or documents containing identifiable CIA information. He indicated this would be an acceptable procedure and the files measured approximately eight inches thick.

29. [Redacted] LIAISON Took a call from Tommi Williams, office of Representative Paul N. McCloskey (R., Calif.), who inquired on behalf of a constituent [Redacted] wrote to the Director of CIA requesting information regarding the current role of HEW in conducting human behavior research. I indicated to Miss Williams that [Redacted] was corresponded with on 28 December 1977 by [Redacted] DCI/PA, and that nine other members of Congress had been corresponded with from the Office of Legislative Counsel regarding the same matter. These interim responses would be followed by a more complete response when the information becomes available. She urged us to respond as quickly as we could to the substance of [Redacted] letter. I indicated that we would.

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
