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14. [redacted] LIAISON Called Tom Crowley, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, and arranged for him to meet with [redacted] OP, at 2:00 p.m. tomorrow to discuss the grievances of former Agency employee [redacted] [redacted] has enlisted the support of Senator Daniel K. Inouye (D., Hawaii) in pursuing his claim.

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15. [redacted] LIAISON Called Stan Taylor, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, who promised to get me the room number for [redacted] OTR, briefing of a group of interns from [redacted] University which is scheduled for this Friday.

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16. [redacted] LIAISON Tom Moore, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, was at Headquarters and spent the entire day reviewing documents on Angola including documents from Executive Registry, the Comptroller, Africa Division, and all National Intelligence Daily reports from 1 July to 31 December 1975.

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17. [redacted] LIAISON Called Ed Levine, ~~Senate Select Committee on Intelligence~~ staff, and informed him that we would like the number of staff at this afternoon's briefing on the "spy war" limited to those who would be directly involved with this topic.

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18. [redacted] BRIEFING Accompanied [redacted] SE/DDO, Don Gregg, C/PCS/LOC, and Frederick Hitz, Legislative Counsel, plus numerous State Department and FBI representatives to a briefing of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence on the "spy war." (See Memorandum for the Record)

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19. [redacted] LIAISON Received a call from Dwayne Barnes, of the Library of Congress, who asked if the Agency had an unclassified report on a Soviet nuclear accident which occurred in 1957. After checking with CSS/NFAC, I called Mr. Barnes and told him that we did not have such a report.

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20. [redacted] LIAISON Talked to Donna Chrissman of the International Division, GAO, and requested a copy of a GAO report on South America (i.d. 77-19). She indicated that she would send it out to us right away. I advised [redacted] of the CIA library that it was on its way. The requestor of the report is [redacted] in OSR.

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21. [REDACTED] LIAISON Met with Representative William Armstrong (R., Colo.), to provide him with a suggested reply for a member of the family of [REDACTED] who currently resides in Armstrong's district. He allegedly was killed in Cuba while in the employment of CIA and the family was told that if anything happened to him, CIA "would take care of the family." I explained certain sensitive facts concerning this matter to the Congressman. He said he understood and appreciated us providing him with a suggested reply.

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22. [REDACTED] ADMINISTRATIVE DELIVERY Delivered to the office of Representative G. William Whitehurst (R., Va.), a suggested reply for a constituent involved in real estate. The constituent had written to the Congressman about a piece of land which he had for sale on the Perquimans River, Perquiman County, North Carolina. The Congressman was interested in knowing whether the Federal Government had any interest in purchasing the property.

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23. [REDACTED] ADMINISTRATIVE DELIVERY Called Elizabeth Daoust, Staff Coordinator-Protocol, House International Relations Committee, and told her that, per her request, I would drop off [REDACTED]

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24. [REDACTED] BRIEFING I attended a briefing of Representative Richard Schulze (R., Pa.) on Soviet and Cuban installations and personnel in Africa. The briefing was an unclassified version.

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25. [REDACTED] LEGISLATION I met with Stan Taylor, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, on S. 2236, the "Anti-Terrorism" legislation. We met in the C&R conference room from 3:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m.

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26. [REDACTED] LEGISLATION I called Mr. Mike Cardozo, Senior Associate Counsel to the President, to request a copy of the 14 July White House letter sent for Representative Jack Brooks (D., Texas), Chairman, House Government Operations Committee. Arrangements were made to have the requested material sent.

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17. [Redacted] LIAISON Spencer Davis, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, called referring to a story being done by Newsday on possible conflict of interest arising out of the current employment of [Redacted] Larry Devlin, Bill Colby, all former Agency employees, etc. I told Davis that CIA employees are subject to the conflict of interest statute and rules which apply to Government employees generally. I also reminded him of the DCI's action in terminating two employees as an indication that active employees are not to accord former employees any different treatment than would be afforded a general member of the public. Davis felt that he could use these arguments with Newsday and I made arrangements for the Office of Public Affairs to close the loop with Davis on this issue.

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18. [Redacted] LIAISON Called Howard Liebengood, in the office of the Senate Minority Leader, to set up a session with Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker (R., Tenn.) on [Redacted] related information. Liebengood wanted to know if this was newly discovered information and I said it was not, that it is information deserving of special handling and we wanted to be sure Senator Baker was aware of it.

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19. [Redacted] LIAISON Made arrangements with Bill Miller, Staff Director, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, for Bob Gambino, D/Security, and myself to see him on possible [Redacted] related information.

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20. [Redacted] LIAISON Spoke with Dick Perle, on the staff of the Senate Governmental Affairs Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, about his interest to see NIE 11-3-8, indicating I hoped we could resolve this issue as we had in the past through briefings but since we cannot I asked him to give me some time before we go to issue on this because of the absence of clear precedents of handling NIE's on the Hill. Perle said he would be more than willing to give me whatever time I needed.

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21. [Redacted] LIAISON Ed Levine, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, called on the Committee [Redacted] report, indicating that the copy of the report we had was missing a page and that he would send it to us. This page will deal with what we learned through [Redacted] a gap in the report which I had earlier called to his attention.

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22. [redacted] LIAISON [redacted] NFAC, attended a Senate Select Committee on Intelligence informal meeting with Ambassador Elliot, former U.S. ambassador to Afghanistan, regarding the Afghanistan coup earlier this year.

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23. [redacted] LIAISON Received a call from Mike Galacek, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, who said he had attempted to find other staff members who needed an orientation briefing on CIA but was unsuccessful. I said I would go ahead and try to schedule his briefings for next week. Galacek also said that he was handling some correspondence for Senator Joseph Biden (D., Del.) and would like to talk to me about it before it was sent to the Agency. I told him I would meet with him on this tomorrow.

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24. [redacted] LIAISON Talked with Tom Moore, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, about the status of his follow-up requests regarding the Committee report on Angola.

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25. [redacted] BRIEFING Accompanied [redacted] [redacted] NED/OSI/NFAC, to a briefing of Senator John Glenn (D., Ohio), Chairman, Senate Governmental Affairs Subcommittee on Energy, Nuclear Proliferation and Federal Services, plus Subcommittee staff members Leonard Weiss, Staff Director, and Leonard Spector. The briefing concerned an accident [redacted] 1950s. The Senator as well as the two staff members were very interested in the subject and indicated they would like additional briefings on nuclear-related topics such as nuclear waste disposal. Spector indicated he would call me regarding the Subcommittee's specific desires sometime next week.

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26. [redacted] BRIEFING Accompanied [redacted] Assistant NIO/Africa, [redacted] OER/NFAC, and [redacted] CSS/NFAC, to a briefing of Senator Jake Garn (R., Utah) and Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff member Stan Taylor on Rhodesia. The discussion was wide-ranging including the military, political and economic situation. Senator Garn, who is taking a very strong line in support of the transitional government in Rhodesia, did not agree with the Agency's assessment of the Rhodesia situation. After the briefing, Stan Taylor said that Senator Garn's personal staff member Dave Fitzgerald, who had just returned from Rhodesia, thought he had been followed while there, possibly by CIA. I told Taylor that this was ridiculous but that I would confirm my views at the Agency and get a firm answer back to him shortly.

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27. [redacted] LIAISON Tom Crowley, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, met with [redacted], OP, to discuss the grievances of former Agency employee [redacted]

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28. [redacted] ADMINISTRATIVE DELIVERIES Delivered to Allan Spence, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence staff, personal notes from review of Angola papers for Tom Moore, also of the Committee staff.

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29. [redacted] LIAISON Sent a copy of the Agency publication entitled "Communist Aid to the Less Developed Countries of the Free World, 1976" to Bob Sutter, Library of Congress, per his request.

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30. [redacted] LIAISON Winslow Wheeler, who is on the staff of Senator Jacob K. Javits (R., N.Y.), called in behalf of two members of the Public Broadcasting Service in New York, Herbert Danska and Shiela Page. He said that they were planning to do a TV program for a presentation in the Miami area on the subject of how the Freedom of Information Act operates. As part of that, they were seeking interviews with a number of Government agencies including the CIA. They told him they had been turned down by our Public Affairs office for an interview and had called Wheeler to see whether we would be willing to reconsider. I checked with [redacted] Public Affairs, who said that we had agreed to meet with Danska, but not to permit him to film the interview. Our reasoning was that the filming would not be in our best interest. [redacted] reiterated our offer to meet with Danska. I called Wheeler back, related the information to him suggesting that if Danska wanted to meet with our people, he should call [redacted] whose number I provided. I was later informed by [redacted] that Danska did not call.

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31. [redacted] LIAISON A current intelligence briefing by NFAC representatives was presented to Representatives Edward J. Derwinski (R., Ill.), William F. Goodling (R., Pa.), George M. O'Brien (R., Ill.), and Robert Lagomarsino (R., Calif.). The subjects covered included North and South Yemen, Afghanistan, Mauritania, Chad, Ethiopia, Angola, and the Western Sahara. Thomas R. Smeeton, who is on the House Committee on International Relations staff, arranged the briefing and sat in as did two cleared members of Representative Goodling's staff, Jeff Salmon and Gardner Peckham.

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
