"In order to unify further the program of studies for engineers in  
Poland, the Wyższa Szkoła Inżynierska im. Wawelberga i Rotwanda (Higher  
Engineering School of Wawelberg and Rotwand) will be combined with the  
Politechnika Warszawska (Warsaw Polytechnical School). It will constitute  
the largest technical school and will have a student body of 9,000."

"In 1950 the Uniwersytet Torunski im. Mikołaja Kopernika (Torun  
University of Mikolaj Kopernik) graduated 3,000 students...The Akademia  
Gorniczo-Hutnicza (Academy of Mining and Metallurgy) in Krakow, which  
had 500 students and 26 faculty members during the prewar days, now has  
2,800 students and 61 staff members."

"The Six-Year Plan has set its objectives to prepare over 54,000 engineers of various specialties, 8,000 agricultural specialists having higher education, over 20,000 economists, financiers, etc." p. 20

"During the Six-Year Plan, the higher school staff must educate over 45,000 new specialists in the technical field, which should cover about 85 percent of all needs." p. 21.

16. The following OO-W's contain information on higher schools:

OO-W-10760 - Shortages in various professional personnel, such as engineers and technicians for 1950 are given by percent.

OO-W-10526 - Over 700 students applied for Evening School of Engineering in Wroclaw for 1950.

OO-W-6998/49 - There were 79,287 university students in 1947/48; during 1948/49, 92,444; students attending Polish universities. Higher degrees were conferred to 327 graduates. Warsaw had an attendance of 20,363 students in higher schools and Krakow 22,303.

OO-W-17410 - The Ludwik Warynski Slask Academy of Medicine in Roknica had a total registration of 225 in 1948, 378 in 1949, 500 in 1950. By 1955 the Department of Medicine will accommodate 1,500 and the Department of Stomatology, 800. In 1950 there were 1,083 students in both departments.

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
