EM strength fluctuated between 385 and 390.
For example, tea was issued on a basis of one gram per man per day.

Periodical linen and underclothing exchange issue and issue of matches and tobacco were made on a basis of 115-120 25X1 men per company. (See Annex A.)

 - (a) There were no officers assigned to this plateon. However, for command purposes, it was subordinate to the battalion Supply Off.

- (b) The unit had a total of 18 EM including NCOs. Of this number, five were "sverkhsrochniki" (regular army enlistees) with the following rank and duties:

- (d) With the exception of the "sverkhsrochniki", the men were armed with the 7.52-mm M1944 Mossin-Nagant carbine.

 - (b) There was one officer, the Plat. Ldr., Lt. (fnu)MARKOV.
 - (c) In addition, there were the following EM:

 - (d) All EM were armed with the 7.62-mm M1944 Mossin-Nagant carbine

 - (b) With the exception of the first sergeants of the 1st and 2d Cos., and the Medical Aid Man, 1st Co., who were armed with 7.62-mm TT-M33 Tokarev pistols by virtue of "sverkhsrochnik" status, all EM in the guard platoons were armed with the 7.62-mm PPSh SMG.
 - (c) Each LMG squad had five 7.62-mm DP Degtyarev LMGs. One private served as gunner and another private, armed with a 7.62-mm PPSh SMG, served as assistant gunner.
 - (d) The HMG Sqd. contained either three or four 7.62-mm M1943 Goryunov HMGs. Each HMG was serviced by three privates the gunner, assistant, and ammunition bearer. The assistant and the ammunition bearer were armed with 7.62 mm PPSh SMGs.

- (b) Eight privates were assigned daily from the duty company to pull KP for the entire battalion.
- (c) The battalion had a field kitchen (type unknown)
 parked in one of the motor pool sheds for stand-by
 purposes. the kitchen could not
 have serviced the entire battalion in an emergency.
- (d) At the time of the 17 June uprisings in Berlin, EM who were armed with the SMG were issued two drums each containing 72 rounds of ammunition. After the emergency was declared over, the ammunition was returned.

 | it was returned on or after 28 June.
- (e) Individual EM arms were kept in a rack, under lock and key, in the billets of each Gd. Co. The company CQ had the key to the rack at all times. EM individual weapons of EM in the MT and Housekeeping Plats. were kept in a rack at the MT Plat. billet. The platoon CQ had the key to the rack at all times. Officers' pistols were locked in an arms room at the Bn. HQ building.

 the condition of weapons in the battalion was fair to good.
- (f) A German concern in Potsdam handled the battalion laundry.

 all Soviet units in Pots-25X1 dam turned in laundry at the same point. Regulations called for linen and laundry exchange every 10 days for EM of Gd. Cos. and every week for EM who were technical workers (i.e. mechanics, drivers, etc.)

 Occasionally, the period was extended several days because laundry from the previous period had not been returned to the unit in time.

		In the event of hostilities, "sverkhsrochniki" would have to turn in their pistols and draw their normal T/O weapons.
SMG, 7.62-mm PPSh	211	T/O weapon for all EM in the battalion except machine gunners and "sverkhsrochniki". In February 1954 EM of the Housekeeping Plat. and MT Plat. turned in their SMG's and drew 7.62-mm M1944 Mossin-Nagant carbines. No reasons were given for the exchange.
