Organizational and Functional Breakdown of the Headquarters, 10th Volary Border Brigade of the Ministry of Interior

LEGEND:

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- Commanding Officer. The CO was responsible for the operation of the entire brigade and its subordinate units. The driver for the CO was:furnished by the Transportation Section.
- 2. Chief of Staff. The chief of staff was the brigade executive officer and the acting CO in the CO's absence. His driver was furnished by the Reserve Unit (See Anner C below),
- 3. 50X1
- Intelligence Section. The Intelligence Section, in addition to the personnel listed on the chart, had at its disposal two drivers: a corporal assigned to the Transportation Section, and a private assigned to the Reserve Unit (see Annex C below). The Intelligence Section was also designated as "1/2." all staff sections of brigade headquarters had 50X1
- such numerical designations in addition to their names. "1/2" for the Intelligence Section and "1/6" for the Counterintelligence Section (see point 4 below). Personnel in this section generally wore civilian clothes: they and "1/6" for the counterintelligence for the section (see point 4 below). 50X1 only wore uniforms if they had to carry out a mission along the border. The female NCO's had the same weapons as the male personnel of this section. 50X1

The 10th Volary Border Brigade was responsible for a 70 km sector of the Czechoslovakian/West German and/or Austrian Border. The length of this sector varied with different brigades according to the terrain. The depth of responsibility for each brigade stretched 50 km inland on the Czech side of the border and 50 km beyond the border into West Germany and/or Austria. About one half of the Intelligence Section staff concerned them-selves with the Czech side of the border, while the other half concerned themselves with the German and Austrian side. Both halves gathered intelligence and handled the agents from their halves gathered intelligence and handled the agents from their area of responsibility operating within that area.

- Counterintelligence Section. This section was also known as "1/6" (see item 3 above). It conducted background investigations amongst the officers and EM of the brigade. The staff of this section worked with the help of personnel planted covertly 4. throughout the brigade and its component units. These persons were not known to the remainder of the brigade personnel. The section reported both to the Brigade CO in person and to its PRAGUE Headquarters. information on it.
- <u>Political Section</u>. This section conducted political training for the personnel of brigade headquarters, the Reserve Unit and the 5+ NCO School. It also supervised political training conducted by battalion and company political officers. The driver for this section was furnished by the Transportation Section.

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6. <u>School and Training Section</u>. This unit supervised, organized and scheduled all training with the exception of political training for all personnel (officers, NCO's and privates) of the brigade and of its subordinate units. The female first sergeant was a secretary; she wore an NCO-uniform but had no weapons. (All female soldiers in the Brigade Headquarters, with the exception of the one assigned to the Intelligence Section, wore uniforms but were unarmed.)

- 50×1 10. Weapons Section. This unit repaired all weapons belonging to personnel of brigade headquarters, the NCO School, and the Reserve Unit. This section also supervised and organized all issuance of weapons to above personnel and to newly mobilized recruits assigned to the Brigade. The section also issued ammunition to above personnel. Once or twice a month the section inspected weapons of all brigade personnel, including that of all subordinate units, battalions and companies).
 - 11. <u>Transportation (automobile) Section</u>. This section furnished drivers to other sections of brigade headquarters. Only three drivers were directly assigned to this section (see items 1, 3, and 5 above). All other drivers were furnished by the Reserve Unit. The Transportation Section was responsible for the supervision, dispatch, and control of all brigade vehicles as well as for their maintenance. The driver attached to the Intelligence Section was the only member of the Transportation Section carrying an extra Model 52 pistol.

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13. <u>Rations Section</u>. This section supervised and organized the produrement and distribution of all food supplies for the entire brigade, down to and including companies.

14. <u>Supply Section</u>. This section supervised and organized prosurement and distribution of all clothing supplies for the entire brigade, down to and including companies.

15. <u>Building Maintenance Section</u>. This section supervised the construction of new buildings for the brigade and the maintenance of all buildings occupied by the 10th Volary Border Brigade in Volary

- 16. Secret Document Section and Message Center. This section issued all orders concerning promotions, transfers, disciplinary actions, etc., as requested by other sections. - 17. Engineer Technical Section. This section supervised the construction, maintenance, research on and development of all border guarding devices, observation towers, etc.. This section especially concerned itself with the maintenance and possible improvement of the electrically-charged barbed wire along the border.
- 18. Medical Section. This section staffed the brigade hospital

EXPLANATORY NOTES:

Mortar Platoon of the Reserve Unit (Zalozni

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It had a triple mission: training, support, and tactical. Concerning training, it trained its personnel in the use of all weapons (individual and crew-served) in this unit. In its support mission it furnished guards, drivers and other personnel for work details to brigade headquarters and to all other brigade installations located in Volary was to be sent to the border to reinforme Border Guard companies in cases of alerts along the border, border violations, etc.

Generally speaking all EM, evolusive of the first sergeant and the three heavy weapons platoon leaders, would alternately train one day and perform various details the next.

there was a distinction between the personnel of the two infantry plateons on one side and those of the mortar, HMG, and panzerfaust and rocket launcher plateons on the other. Personnel of the two infantry plateons comprised mostly personnel who had previously served on the border with Border Guard companies, had committed some sort of violation, and were therefore no longer considered entirely trustworthy. They were used to perform plain work details, although they also furnished a few drivers and guards. Personnel of the mortar, HMG, and panzerfaust and rocket launcher plateons, on the other hand, were reliable personnel specialized in the use of their heavy weapons. They furnished drivers and guards but did not go on work details.

The three platoon leaders of these three platoons were OCS candidates ("aspiranti"). They were usually former school teachers. After beinginducted and receiving three months of basic training, they would be sent to unidentified NCO schools where they would be trained in the use of heavy weapons. Then they received non-career (conscript) ratings of first sergeant or sergeant. After two years of service they either returned to civilian life and became reserve officers (usually second lieutenant, seldom lieutenant) or remained on active duty as second lieutenant (rarely lieutenant.)

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
