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SUPPLEMENT

ORIGIN
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- The Soviet 59 Air Force, stationed at Tamsog Bulak (117-35, 47-20), is presently training the air force of the Mongolian People's Republic. There are some qualified Mongol pilots, but the majority are Soviets. Half of the ground force and some of the crew members of the bombing planes are Mongols.

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Note: Similar information was previously reported by Mongols in Changchun.

- In the course of training, missions are flown northeast toward Hailar, south-east toward Wangyehmlao (122-01, 46-05) and south into Inner Mongolia.
- Headquarters of the Soviet 29 Army is at Urtuin [Ortöö Suma, 115-30, 46-05]. There is constant liaison between the 29 Army and the 59 Air Force. The 29 Army is training and equipping troops of the Mongolian People's Republic with captured Japanese and obsolete Soviet arms. There is an ordnance depot at Urtuin where arms are repaired before they are distributed to the Mongols. The airfield there was expanded by Soviet engineers and an ammunition factory was set up under the direction of Soviet technicians.
- There is an airfield and an ammunition factory at Ulan Bator (106-53, 47-55) both of which were expanded by Soviet technicians. From Ulan Bator an army (designation unknown) which was a combination of Mongol and Soviet troops, moved in three columns towards Delger Tsogtu (106-30, 46-20), Ikhe Lide (Wuteh) [? Dzamin Uude, also known as Wuteh, (111-14, 44-30)], and Daringanga [Shine Saringanga Suma] (113-40, 45-20). These troops were supposed to have garrisoned Dariganga in March 1946.
- At Ikhe Lide [?Dzamin Uude] there is an ammunition factory, but production figures and details regarding the types of ammunition made there are unknown. There is an ammunition factory at Khentai [Also known as Hentey Suma (109-30, 48-10)] and also one at Daringanga. These factories are run by citizens of the Mongolian People's Republic, perhaps with Soviet advisors.

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
