are required in Nanking prior to setting up the China bra th of the CCU, but regardless of the outcome of these negotiations, it is important to prepare a flexible organization in Shanghai to act as an auxiliary organ to the processed CCU branch, or to act independently as an export organ subject to CCU in Hoscow through the local Torgpredstvo or the Narodny Bank.

There were mixed reactions to this plan. Birbrayer and S lin were in favor; Chibunovsky was skeptical and believes that the proposed lan would mean snuggling probably from Hongkong to the USSR.

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- 3. One of the main tasks of Gosbes /MBB, Ministry of State Security / in China is the supplying of arms to the Chinese Communist Party, especially in South China. Transactions are made mostly through Chinese and foreign firms connected with Soviet trade establishments. Agents who actually conduct the smuggling are Chinese Communist Party members. The Soviet Hongkong trade representatives Sizov and Kovalenko organized the smugling of arms and wolfram sert from Hongkong to the USSR on Soviet ships.
- At the last meeting of the Shanghai representatives of Torgp. adstvo and the Narodny Bank it was decided to move the offices of the Sovie Citizens' Trade Association to 1 Avenus Edward VII (Chung Cheng Road, East. n) This was to be done so that Mineyev, reportedly head of the 1 conomic Section of the local Gosbez, might control the organization more efficiently. The Narodny Bank, Torgoredstvo Export Khleb, and the Intourist office are all at 9 Avenue Edward VII.
- The Soviets will set up a special section of the ar Eastern Information Burgary within the Shanghai TASS office. This section, headed by Lo ovsky, although independent of TASS will be officially a part of it. Appointecs will arrive in Shanghai on the next repatriation ship. A new USSR-China policy will be initiated after the return of Ambassador Petrov. Top Soviet Shanghai officials are prepared to send their families to the USSR.
- 6. The appointment of Lozovsky - Soviet Far East expert - to head the Information on Bureau in Irkutsk presents evidence of the importance of the Far East to Moscow. [50-7479]. Extending Lozovsky's activities to Shanghai by setting up a TASS Information Bureau Section indicates that Loscow is expecting a show-down soon in the Far East.
- The Soviet Far East from Irkutsk to Vladivostok is now under martial law; no one can travel through or remain in the area without special permission. Considerable movement of troops and materiel was seen along the railroads in this; area.

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- The following points are based on comments by Consul General Khalin.)
- (1) Through Ambassador Petrov, who will probably return to Manking at the end of October, there will be a decided attempt to settle urgent differences with Nanking before any radical change is made in the USSR-China Jolicy. Petrov hus instructions in regard to a settlement of the Dairen questic . Hoscow hopes that this approach will cause former pro-Soviet leftwing Kuc intang members to influence Nanking and public opinion to adopt a more friendl policy.

(2) The Nationalists know that they cannot gain control of North Manchuria; hase they will be compelled to accept mediation by the USSR. This must be preceded by an agreement on Dairen and an improvement of Sin -Soviet relations.

(3) Shanghai Soviets believe that although this course of action will be brief and unsuccessful, it will gain time for the final chan a in USSR policy and divide Kuomintang and Chinese public opinion toward the USSR.

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9. rumor

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According to rumor in Shanghai Soviet circles, Lozovsky visited North Korea and Marbin incognito. Following this trip there were furthe rumors to the effect that large-scale maneuvers will take place this autum on the Korean and Manchurian borders and that simultaneously there will be uprisings in the Ili River region in Sinkiang Province.

Shanghai Soviet leaders believe that repatriation must be accomplished quickly and that these rumors signify the beginning of a new era of "ino-Soviet relations where China will be forced to choose between the USSR and the United States.
