

- 1. On 12 September a Hungarian Catholic movement was instituted in Paris under the leadership of the Reverend Joseph Kozi-Horvath. The plan for a Fungarian movement abroad had apparently been under discussion for some time; but it was only the arrival of Baron Apor from Rome which finally brought about the actual establishment of the movement. It is the opinion of many Hungarian; abroad that if a Catholic organization could be established "west of the iron curtain", this group might act as a couterbalance to the extremist movement headed by General Ferenc Farkas. Farkas has, in the past, openly boasted of the support of the Vatican. Cardinal Mindszenty in Hungary is expected to approve and he can point to the fact that a movement complised of Hungarian members of his own faith abroad exists.
- 2. The Reverend Kozi-Horvath, who recently arrived in Paris from Austria, has two peasant deputies and six members of the board of directors as follows:

Baron Apor, his cousin, is reported to have stressed to Palffy that the latter refrain from taking a leading role in the movement.

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
