motor vehicles of the above
tank unit were seen to be re-
fueled there.

The regiment was referred to as
"heavy tank regiment" by sol-
diers and civilians.
A motion picture of the Moscow
May Day Parade showed a unit of
about 100 tanks about as long
and wide as a T34 tank, but
essentially lower. From the
side, the tanks had the shape
of hemispheres streamlined to-
wards the bottom, without a
visible turret. The tanks were
armed with a long gun mounted
in the upper third of the hemi-
sphere. The tank commander was
visible in a hatch on top of the
hemisphere. The tanks were called
"turtles" by PWs.

Numerous officers were observed. Company commanders were field officers. The regiment was equipped with more than hundred JS-3 tanks.
Description of tanks:
Hull: About 6 meters long, 1.30 meters high, about 2 meters wide, including road clearance.
Tracks: Plate-shoes, each shoe being about 25 cm long, width of track: 50 to 60 cm; track pins with "clamping teeth" between the shoes.
Turret: Mounted somewhat ahead of center, projecting far to the front over the circular track which is about 125 cm in diameter; the interior of the turret is about 140 cm in diameter.
-ngine: Diesel of unknown horsepower performance.
Armament: One 105-mm gun with muzzle brake, about 40 cm long. Other weapons had been removed. The number of machine guns was unknown.
Features distinctive from the Stalin I tank: More projecting bow, presumably provided with heavier armor; two triangular noses, bent downwards to the front, on the bow near the towing hooks; the front driving sprocket is covered by a disk.
Five-man crew:
Driver (left in front), radio operator (right in front), gunner, assistant gunner and tank commander (an officer)

Radio equipment:

Although no antenna was visible the two tank radio sets were simultaneously in operation (as soldiers said). The first radio set was directly in front of the radio operator, the second set to the right of the radio operator on the wall.

Apertures: Hatch on the rear wall of turret, observation lid on top of turret, two protected vision slits for driver and radio operator on the bow.
