25X1X 25X1X [redacted] between Nicholas Sainov and two unspecified Soviet envoys to the Near East, it was said that "imminent events" are to take place in Macedonia, with partisan groups from Bulgaria inciting riots in Yugoslav Macedonia. The object is to create a new Macedonian Revolution to enable the Soviet Union to present an international problem (presumably before the United Nations) and call for the autonomy of all Macedonia (Yugoslav, Bulgarian and Greek).

25X1A [redacted] Comment: [redacted] a certain Alexander Sasonov, Soviet diplomatic employee, was expected [redacted] from Moscow about the middle of February 1948.
