YUN Ki-hong Party organizer (Partorg) of the institute; age 34; later joined the army with the rank of lieutenant colonel.

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The Bacteriological Laboratory conducted research and prepared vaccines against typhus, typhoid, cholera, Japanese encephalitis, etc. The building and the work done there were closely guarded, and only personal friends of employees were admitted as visitors. The laboratory had branches at Sangju and Chongjin, and the Soviet professors who directed the laboratory used to make field trips of two or three months' duration to the branches. Personnel from other organizations, such as the Medical Institute, were sometimes transferred to the laboratory, usually on orders rather than as volunteers. One such transferred person, from the Medical Institute, was YANB Song-ha, a medical assistant, age about 29. Another employee of the laboratory was Professor HONG Sang-uk, a bacteriologist.

The Hygiene Laboratory took care of sanitary conditions in Pyongyang, its functions including testing drinking water, disposing of sewage, etc. The Soviet adviser was Nikolayenko.

The Epidemic Laboratory worked on disease prevention. Nikolayenko was also its adviser.

He was also adviser to the Ministry of Internal Affairs (police), to which several Soviet colonels were attached as advisers.

HAN, Valentina	Daughter of the chairman of the Korean Residents Committee in Manchuria; she escaped to Mongolia with her father.
Ignatiyev, Colonel	Deputy ambassador and probably also NGB officer for the Soviets in North Korea. He is rumored to have been killed by a shooting attack from UN planes as he was riding in a

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car on Pobeda, a road near Pyongyang, on 20 September 1950. The chauffeur of the car was wounded. He was taken to the Soviet Hospital in Pyongyang, and the book-keeper there, PAK Khang-hi, learned of the death of Ignatiyev. *****
