1. On 15 June 1951, 78 IL-10s were parked in two rows on the northern edge of Doberitz airfield. All the planes had white numbers on their fuselages and the previously reported red stripes on their rudder assemblies. At least 43 IL-10s were parked on the southern edge. The hangars were closed. There was no flying between 4 and 5:30 p.m., although the weather was good. Between 9 a.m. and 10:40 a.m., on 19 June, 78 IL-10s with red stripes on their rudder assemblies were again counted on the northern edge of the field. Forty-six planes of the same type were seen on the southern edge. *

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2. Intensive night flying started at the field about 9 p.m. on 21 June. It was still going on at midnight. Some of the planes had their landing lights switched on, others flew with their running lights. Based [REDACTED] only local flights were made.

3. About 100 ground attack planes were seen at the field at 11 a.m. on 15 June. There was no flying. Passenger car [REDACTED]

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[REDACTED] were observed at the field. At 9:30 a.m. on 22 June, about 40 ground attack aircraft were parked in two rows on the northern edge of the field. All the planes had a red stripe on the leading edges of their rudder assemblies and white numbers on their fuselages. The numbers 1, 12, 16, 27, 36, and 43 were seen on six planes. About 40 to 50 ground attack aircraft were parked on the southern edge of the field. * No markings were identified on those planes because of the distance. An individual radio mast, which was braced and had a radio truck beside it, was seen in line with a radio installation with four masts west of the field. **

25X1A* [REDACTED] Comment. The airfield is still occupied by two ground attack regiments and a ground attack division headquarters. The two regiments are equipped with a total of about 125 IL-10s. 25X1A

25X1A* [REDACTED] Comment. [REDACTED] the radio installation with four masts is an Adcock DF station. The installation with one mast is possibly a landing beacon.

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
