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SUPPLEMENT TO REPORT NO.

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1. In July labor on the road from Kashgar (75-58, 39-29) to Tibet was being pushed forward. It was reported that the airfield in Tibet¹ was ready for use.
2. In August every civilian in Kashgar was ordered to take five days of military training for emergency purposes. Military personnel and police were conducting searches of the houses of the civilian population in order to assess the amount of property possessed by the owners. Farmers were told not to harvest their crops until the police had come to make an assessment.
3. During the month of July 50 camel-loads of ammunition reached P'uli (75-11, 37-47). Near P'uli, on the road to the USSR via Saingon Nullah² a new military post, large enough for a garrison of 300 men, was under construction.
4. The population in the border area had been pleased by being allowed to build Jamat Khanas³, and by the distribution of seeds and cloth, which was made for purposes of propaganda.
5. A boundary marker which had been erected by Pakistan representatives near Kilik Pass (75- , 37-) was destroyed by some of the Chinese Communist soldiers who crossed the border about 1 August 1951⁴. The visit of the Pakistan group at the border and the erection of a boundary marker gave rise to rumors in Sinkiang that Pakistan was building a motor road to the border, and that tanks and American soldiers were in position on the Pakistan border. As a result daily patrols of the border area were made, though the border garrisons were not increased.
6. At a small Soviet post between Kyzyl Rabat (74-45, 37-15) and Murghab (73-57, 33-10), named Ghanji Bai,⁵ the normal strength of 7 men was increased to 150. Arms and ammunition were being supplied the post at the rate of seven horse-drawn cartloads per day. An underground post, capable of holding 3,000 men, which was established at Alichur⁶,

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






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near Murghab, during World War II was recently repaired.
