There follows a summary of available information on the better known anti-Communist organizations in Chile formed by White Russians and anti-Communist satellite nationals.

I Russian

A. White Russian Groups

- 1. White Russian Union in Chile (Union de los Rusos en Chile, Hogar de los Rusos, Savez Ruso u Chileno)

Remarks: This organization is reportedly of a social and religious nature: a Russian Orthodox Church functions at the same location. It is believed to be completely anti-Communist, and an investigation of its Directorate reveals that it is composed of strongly anti-Communist individuals. The White Russian Union takes a militant and active anti-Communist stand, an example of which occurred at a meeting

called in November 1950 by Vadim Federov, president of the organization, and attended by anti-Communist Rumanians, Serbs, Yugoslavs, Poles, Hungarians, and Czechs. A program was devised whereby the anti-Communist representatives of all those nationalities might take a common position in the fight against Communism. A representative of Chilean "Investigaciones" was present. No effective results of this meeting were subsequently noted, but it appeared evident that the White Russian Union was the leader of the anti-Communist sections of the "Eastern" groups in Chile.

2. Union of the White Russian Youth (Udruzenje Ruske Omladine)

**Objectives:** This group promotes the study of Russian language, history, and geography. It also organizes sports and social events. It is closely allied to and under the control of the Solidarists, another anti-Communist group.

3. Cossack Union (Union de los Cosacos or Sociedad de los Cosacos en Chile)

**Membership:** 20 members

**Foreign Ties:** Connected with a similar organization in Buenos Aires and with its principal office in New York.

**Officers:**

<b>President:</b>	Jevdenije Balabin, elderly Russian, not very active
<b>Vice President:</b> 8	(fnu) Sevjakov, a wealthy pharmacist who was considered pro-Communist during World War II but is now believed to have changed.

Remarks: This organization is relatively inactive. Its president, Jevdenije Balabin, is also the president of other small, unimportant anti-Communist White Russian groups, such as the Union de los Invalidos, the Union de los Guerreros, and the Union de las Organizaciones Zaristas. The ultimate result of these small groups is a weakening of the effectiveness of the other anti-Communist Russian organizations.

## 4. Solidarists

Foreign Ties: This international organization does not exist legally in Chile, but Solidarist members there are in contact with the head office in Frankfurt, Germany, and with other branches. They anticipate an organization of the Chilean branch on a more practical basis soon. It is at present the most active and most anti-Communist of the Russian organizations in Chile.

There have been some indications that the Communists have penetrated this organization.

Membership: Limited, and consists solely of elderly pro-Czar Russians. A year ago it broke relations with its principal organization in Munich, Germany, and since that time the Santiago branch has been practically inactive.

All are considered to be anti-Communist.

Objectives: To help anti-Communist Czech immigrants to get settled in Chile. Otto Lang-Popper's wife has been active in this work. The group sometimes organizes social gatherings of its members at the Czech restaurant at Monjitas 583, Santiago.

History: The Czech Aid Society was founded in 1946 by the anti-Communist members of the National Czech Committee in Chile, which became pro-Communist. It had few members until 1948 when many anti-Communist refugees arrived in Chile from Czechoslovakia.

## B. Poland

## 1. Polish Union (Union Polaca)

Officials: President: Josef Poznanski  
Secretary: Wojciech Pszczolkowski

Remarks: This anti-Communist Polish group has made frequent attempts to repudiate the Circulo de Amigos de Polonia, the pro-Communist organization in Santiago.

## 2. Polish Ex-Combatants Association (Circulo de Ex-Combatientes Polacos)

Officials: President: Miroslav Dziekonski

Remarks: Another Polish anti-Communist group which works closely with the Union Polaca.

## C. Hungary

## 1. National Hungarian Committee

Chilean Representative: Col. Emeric Rokay Schmid

Remarks: This organization appears not to be active. It is said to be anti-Communist, and Rokay, together with his close associate, the former Hungarian diplomat, Francois Rosty-Forgach, appears to be anxious to fight Communism in Chile.

## D. Rumania

There is no known anti-Communist Rumanian organization in Chile. However, there are a number of anti-Communist Rumanians who are not organized.

## E. Yugoslavia

No Yugoslav anti-Communist organization, either anti-Stalin or anti-Tito, is known to exist in Chile.
