the propeller at the engine was standing still, although the noise of the flying craft was heard. To other propeller was seen. (2)

- 4. Four four-engine bombers (Annex 2),flying in single file at an altitude of about 800 meters. The bombers were escorted by three or four conventional fighters.
- 5. About 27 twin-engine aircraft (Annex 3), flying in flights one after the other at an altitude of about 600 meters. The formation was escorted by six to eight conventional fighters.(3)
- 6. Forty to 50 jet planes flying in flights one after the other (Annex 4).
- 7. About 20 twin-engine aircraft towing one cargo glider each and flying in flights one after another (Annex 3). No details available on cargo glider.(3)
- 8. During the entire time jet planes were flying individually and in flights at various altitudes. The jet planes made dives, steep climb and acrobatics, also in flight formation. ______ all the jet planes were of a uniform type. No details available (Annex 4).
- 9. Descriptive data:

a. Four-engine bomber (Annex 2):

Four radial engines mounted in slim wings of large span, engines projecting rather far beyond leading edge of wings. Single rudder assembly. Blunt rear of fuselage. The very slim fuselage had a circular cross section. Lo clazing of nose noted, the nose was painted darker than the rest of the plane. Tortoise-shaped cockpit set on top of fuselage with struts. A rod atout 12 meters long, believed to be a flexible gun, projected from the nose. A hemispherical attachment, bainted darker than the fuselage, was distinctly seen under the fuselage. A rod of the same size as that observed a_t the nose and also believed to be a flexible gun projected to the fore. Another gun station with weapon pointing to the rear was on the fuselage.

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b. Twin-engine aircraft (Annex 3):

Two radial engines, low-wing monoplane without sweep-back or dihedral, leading edge of wings straight, trailing edge tapering, rounded wing tins. The fuselage projected a little over the tail assembly. Single-strut main landing gear with duals retracting rearward into the fuselage, faired with two covers attached to the fuselage. The tail wheel was not retracted during the flight. A short rod, possibly a flexible weapon, projected downward from the nose. Under the nose was a black circular body attached to a curved leg;

c. Jet planes (Annex 4):

No details available on the power plant; only a nozzle was seen at the rear of the fuselage. The tail assembly, attached to thin tail booms, was mounted high above the rear of the fuselage, sweptback elevator assembly, angular tips, no dihedral. Weapons or other attachments were not seen.

Comment:

fitted

- (1) The craft is a mine-locating plane/with a magnetic ring. Such aircraft were previously observed near Khimki and Stakhanovo . Near Khimki both Ju-52 (Mausi) and twin-engine planes were seen . In Stakhanovo Li-2 or IL-12 planes fitted with this magnetic ring were reportedly seen. If the observation concerning the double fuselage should be correct, type 23 may be assumed to be put to a new use.
- (2) The shoulder plane presumably is the diffective of this fitted with the M-11 engine. A biplane of this type is not known.
- (3) The duals of the main landing gear and the nose wheel of the twin-engine plane shown in Annex 3 indicate the IL-12 which was also used as a towing craft on the loscow Air show.
