officers that the headquarters of the GOFG would move to an undetermined location in one or two days. The headquarters personnel had been ordered to be ready for the evacuation.

3. On 27 May, 45 boxcars were loaded at the Wildpark railroad station with billeting equipment from the Kriegsschule in Potsdam. Another train was loaded on 28 May. During the period from 25 through 27 May, four vehicular convoys of the 56th Motor Transport Regiment of the GOFG, loaded with billeting equipment, arrived in Potsdam every morning. They came from the direction of Lange Bruecke and proceeded to the barracks installations in Wildpark-West.\*

4. On 27 May, seven 7.62 cm AA guns were observed on Doeberitz airfield.\*\*

headquarters of the GOFG is moving from Babelsberg to Wuensdorf. It is not clear whether all sections of the headquarters, particularly the headquarters of the chief of rear services in the Adolf Hitler Kaserne, will be affected by this move. The headquarters, headquarters' units and the signal elements of the 3rd Guards Mechanized Army will remain in Wuensdorf. The officers' courses of the GOFG [ ] will move from the Hindenburg Kaserne in Wuensdorf to the Bornstedt Kriegsschule in Potsdam. The 56th Motor Transport Regiment of the GOFG is moving from the Cambrai Kaserne in Wuensdorf to the barracks installation in Wildpark-West. Elements of the 62nd AAA Division located in the Lutz Kaserne, are moving, possibly only temporarily, to the Gardelegen area, giving them the opportunity to use Letzling Heath for summer training. There is no doubt that Soviet troops and headquarters south and west of Berlin have been decentralized since mid-May. It remains to be seen whether these measures are designed to provide billeting space for the Volkspolizei.

25X1A \*\* [ ] Comment: On 2 May, medium AA guns, probably of the 31st AAA Division, were observed for the first time on Doeberitz airfield. The information on the presence of heavy AA guns is new. Shipments of heavy and medium AA guns to Soviet occupied airfields, which started in mid-April, are continuing. Up to the present, AA guns have been observed on nine fields. The airfields occupied by bomber units southeast of Berlin were the first installations provided with AA guns. These were followed by Laerz, Koethen and Doeberitz. A device believed to have been an anti-aircraft director was observed with a 137 mm AA battery. AA directors were not previously seen in the Soviet Zone of Germany. If, as expected, directors become standard equipment of medium AA units, their fire power will be considerably increased. It is believed that orders have been given to have AA guns emplaced at all airfields in the Zone. This measure, in itself not unusual, deserves special attention as it coincides with a period of East-West tension.
