Soviet Signal Unit In Wloclawek.

1. Only individual Soviet soldiers were seen in Wloclawek (Q 53/J 73) up to March 1951. They were generally believed to belong to a telephone construction and maintenance group. Soviet soldiers constructed an overhead line with four wires along the Chodecz (Q 53/J 60)-Przedecz (Q 53/J 50)-Klodawa (Q 53/O 59) road in the fall of 1950. The group had 3 or 4 trucks. \*

Ammunition Depot near the Bolechowo Railroad Station.

25X1 2. In May 1950, [redacted] a large Soviet ammunition depot with spur track to the station was just southwest of the Bolechowo (P 53/X 27) railroad station. The installation had housed a German ration supply depot during the war. [redacted] low wooden buildings, low permanent structures, and bunkers, some of which were still under construction. The northern section of the depot was a wooded area. The depot was surrounded by a barbed wire fence, 2.5 meters high, with observation towers. 25X1 [redacted] Polish and Soviet soldiers guarding the installation. Polish sentries still wore the traditional four-cornered service caps.

3. Commanding officer of the depot was Soviet Captain Mazurenko (fnu) (phonetic spelling). Additional Soviet officers and a number of Polish officers, Polish soldiers and 25X1 civilians were employed at the depot.

25X1 4. Large canvas-covered piles of boxes were seen in the depot. [redacted] who was friendly with a Soviet officer and entered the installation several times, that ammunition of various types was stored there. The ammunition arrived by rail. A train of 25 or 30 cars arrived at the depot weekly and, for a period, even daily. Boxes, about 100 x 70 x 70 cm, which six laborers were hardly able to lift were seen being unloaded. The material was picked up by trucks which left in the direction of the Biedrusko (P 53/X 27) troop training grounds or toward Poznan (P 53/X 26). \*\*



5. A barracks installation quartering Soviet troops was observed for the last time in May 1950 on the edge of woods about northeast of the Czerwonak (P 53/X 27) railroad station. The installation consisted of 3 or 4 four-story buildings and one small three-story building. [redacted] a Soviet unit was located in Glowna (P 53/X 26). \*

6. [redacted] the villages in the area of Czarnkow (P 53/R 91)~ Chodziej (P 53/S 12) were not occupied in 1950. Only MO headquarters were located in Czarnkow and Chodziej. The MO detachments in small villages were subordinate to those MO headquarters.

\* [redacted] Comment: Probably a signal squad to perform maintenance work on Soviet telephone lines.

\*\* [redacted] Comment: No previous information on this depot has been received. Nor were any joint Polish-Soviet supply depots reported. Further information is needed.
