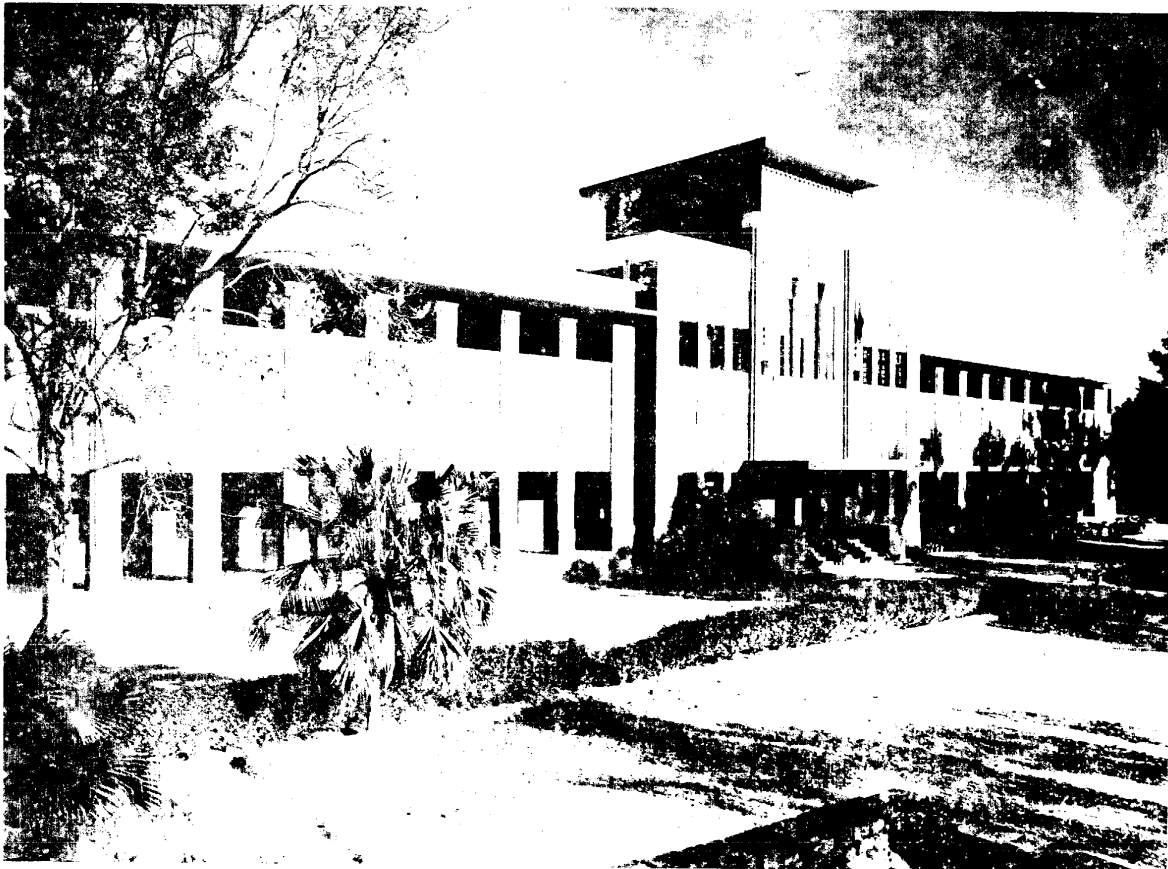

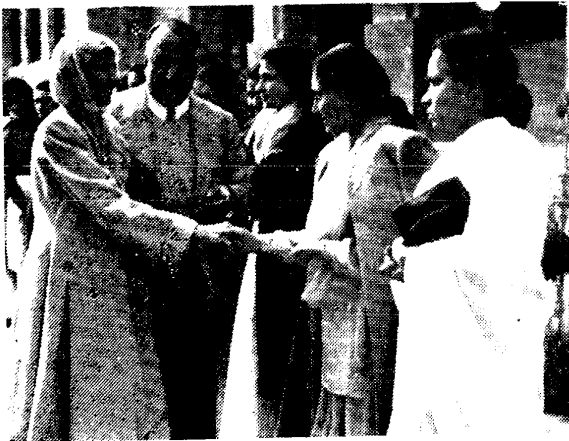

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FATIMA JINNAH MEDICAL COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

1. INTRODUCTION

The College was started in October, 1948. Before Partition there were two colleges in India exclusively meant for the training of women doctors. One was located in New Delhi (Lady Hardinge Medical College) and the other was at Ludhiana (Women's Christian Medical College). Both these institutions came to the share of the Indian Union. Soon after the establishment of Pakistan necessity was felt for the opening of a Women's Medical College at Lahore. Miss Fatima Jinnah in her speech on the occasion of the First Annual Prize Distribution of the College pointed to the necessity of a Women's Medical College in the following words :—

“This institution is one of those in which I am keenly interested not so much because of its intimate or personal touch, but because of its efficacy and usefulness to Pakistan. It fulfils a sore need of Pakistan and its progress is, therefore, linked with the fulfilment of an important task of our people. Neglected for over centuries by the foreigners and ignored for about a quarter of a century by their officers and administrators, the progress of Muslims in the educational field was far from being satisfactory. No single branch of knowledge suffered so much from the dearth of qualified Muslims as the medical profession, and

the number of qualified Muslim women doctors was appalling and insignificant. After the establishment of Pakistan, Hindu lady doctors migrated from Pakistan according to plan. Their exit accentuated the existing need of medical aid for our women folk. This need was further enhanced when millions of our sisters reached Pakistan from beyond the borders. Medical aid became a crying need and there were no nurses to soothe their wounds. The acute shortage of doctors and nurses in an enlightened province like the Punjab emphasized the necessity of the establishment of an institution for training doctors and nurses.

“I have been keenly watching the progress that this College has made during the course of its first year and I have every hope that the Governing Body will leave no stone unturned to ensure a bright future for this important Institution, which is sure to leave an indelible mark on the pages of Pakistan's medical history. In a brief span of nearly two years, the progress which this Institution has achieved is remarkable. Though the Institution was started with modest beginnings, I can well notice the strides of progress which it is making in fulfilling the need not only of Pakistan, but, as the Principal says, it has attracted the attention of the Muslim World. I am happy to note that the staff of this institution has been devotedly striving to attain a premier position for their Institution. The present generation as much as posterity will bless them for their devotion to duty and humanity.”

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The College is situated in very healthy surroundings on Queen's Road about 3 miles from the Railway Station. It consists of an administrative block with four most up-to-date blocks of laboratories for the teaching of Physiology, Anatomy Pharmacology and Pathology. The laboratories are fully equipped with the latest apparatus and appliances.

The clinical training of the students is carried out at the Sir Ganga Ram Hospital situated across the road. It is a 150-bedded Hospital with most up-to-date wards, operation theatre and equipment. Attached to the College is a chain of Hospitals. The Gulab Devi Hospital for Tuberculosis is situated on the Lahore to Kasur Road, about six miles from the College. The Janki Devi Jamiat Singh Hospital for the treatment of diseases of women is located on Abbott Road. The Narain Das Mool Chand Hospital for Children is situated in the compound of the Sir Ganga Ram Hospital. The total number of beds available in all the four Hospitals is 340.

It is proposed to build five more wards in the Sir Ganga Ram Hospital and a modern out-patients department on the Mozang Road behind the Fatima Jinnah Medical College. With the addition of five more wards the number of beds available for the clinical training of the students will go upto 400.

Attached to the College is a Hostel for the students of the College. It is located in the building formerly occupied by the Lahore College for Women on Hall Road. A whole-time Lady Superintendent looks after the welfare of the students.

All students except those whose parents are actually living in Lahore must reside in the Hostel.

The College is, at present, affiliated to the Panjab University for the First, Second and Third Professional M.B.,B.S. Examinations. It will be affiliated for the Final M.B., B.S. Examination in due course. It affords instruction for (a) M.B.,B.S. degree of the Panjab University and (b) for the M.Sc. degrees in Physiology and Anatomy. The detailed regulations for these degrees are given in the Panjab University Calendar, which may be consulted for information whenever necessary.

The College was formally opened by His Excellency, Al-Haj Khwaja Nazim-ud-Din Governor-General of Pakistan (now Prime Minister) on the 30th March, 1949, in the presence of a distinguished gathering. On this auspicious occasion the Hon'ble Pirzada Abdus Sattar, the then Minister for Health of the Central Pakistan Government, was pleased to address the students of the College as follows :—

“You are pioneers in one of the most important field of national effort. You have the responsibility of laying down the traditions on which the future of the medical profession, so far as women are concerned, will depend. It is up to you to realize the greatness of this task. Only the highest traditions of the medical profession will enable you to go through the most difficult tasks that lie ahead of you. If you really want to serve our nation, the majority of you shall have to go to remote corners of our country, where you will not get those amenities of life

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which you find around you here to-day. You must prepare yourselves in such a way that when you are called upon to serve your people where your services are needed most you will not fail. You must be true medical missionaries and the ideal before you should not be self, but service—service to your afflicted sisters. I hope you will prepare yourselves to be not only efficient doctors, but real healers—of body and mind."

Alhaj Khwaja Nazim-ud-din whole-heartedly associated himself with the advice given by the Hon'ble Minister of Health and was pleased to address the students as below :--

"In you, young ladies, lies the hope of the nation in a very important sphere of human activity. The profession which you have chosen is among the most noble in the world—it is respected in every corner of the globe and it opens before you avenues of service in the purest and highest forms. The Fatima Jinnah Medical College is the only institution of its kind, not only in Pakistan but throughout the Muslim World. After you have completed your studies in this institution and have entered into your professional careers it will be for you to set a standard of devotion to duty, selfless service and high thinking which will bring honour to this College and create traditions worthy of Pakistan."

His Excellency Mr. Ghulam Mohammed, Governor General of Pakistan, who visited this College on the 14th February 1952, has been pleased to convey the following remarks in a demi-official letter to the Principal :--

"I thank you for taking me round the Miss Fatima Jinnah Medical College for Women last evening. I was glad to see so many of our girls learning medicine and surgery with a view to take up the medical profession. I was particularly pleased to notice that these girls come from all parts of Pakistan and even from some foreign countries. Pakistan was established in order to enable the Muslims to give expression to their will to progress and to raise the standard of life of the common people. Efforts such as this Medical College for Women is making towards alleviation of human suffering give concrete shape to the objectives for which we struggled to achieve Pakistan. I wish the Institution success."

Note :— The provisions made in this Prospectus are liable to be varied from time to time and the students on the rolls of this College will be bound by such variations

3. THE COLLEGE SESSION

The College year consists of one long session embracing three terms commencing on the first working day in October each year and ending on the 15th of June.

First term—From the first working day in October to 31st December.

Second term—From 1st January to 31st March.

Third term—From 1st April to 15th June.

4. VACATION

From 16th June to 30th September.

Students doing Hospital duty will be divided into two batches. The first batch will do Hospital work in the first half and the second batch in the second half of the vacation.

5. CLASSES FOR M.B., B.S. DEGREE

Courses of Studies.

FIRST YEAR

PHYSIOLOGY

During the first year students attend systematic lectures on Physiology. In addition they work in the laboratories and attend classes in Histology and Biochemistry. The course of Histology comprises a thorough and comprehensive study of the microscopic structure of the cells of the primary

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tissues and of the architecture of the adult organs. In the Department of Biochemistry, the students have to perform tests on the principal constituents of foodstuffs and test the various enzymes present in the saliva, stomach juice and intestinal juices. Attempt is made to correlate the practical work with the theory taken up from day to day. In the Department of Experimental Physiology experiments are carried out on nerve, muscle and heart. Here, too, attempt is made to correlate the practical work with the theoretical teaching.

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ANATOMY

In addition to systematic lectures, the students work in the Dissection Hall and during the First Year they are required to dissect the upper and lower extremities, the thorax and the brain. Students are also required to attend tutorial classes in Anatomy where they are divided into small batches and instructions are given on the structure of the human body supplemented by the use of models and prepared dissections of various parts of the body.

SECOND YEAR

Systematic lectures on Physiology and practical work in the Departments of Histology, Biochemistry and Experimental Physiology. In the Department of Anatomy students are given a detailed study in the origin and development of the human body (Embryology). Dissection is performed on abdomen, head and neck.

First Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination in Anatomy and Physiology is held at the end of the Second Year.

THIRD YEAR

Students are given regular lectures in Pharmacology, Pathology, Minor Surgery, Clinical Methods in Medicine and Surgery and also lectures in Medicine and Surgery.

The practical classes include Pharmacy, Experimental Pharmacology, Morbid Histology, Clinical Pathology and Bacteriology.

Students attend the Hospital for clinical instruction.

Second Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination in Pharmacology and Materia Medica, including Pharmacological Chemistry, is held at the end of the Third Year.

FOURTH YEAR

Lectures—Pathology, Hygiene, Forensic Medicine, Medicine, Surgery, Midwifery and Diseases of Women.

Clinical instruction in hospital.

Demonstration in dead-house—Pathological and Medicolegal.

Ophthalmic Demonstrations.

Third Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination in Forensic Medicine, Hygiene and Pathology is held at the end of the Fourth Year.

* (i) A short practical examination in Vaccination will be conducted by the Superintendent, Punjab Vaccine Institute, Lahore, at the conclusion of the course and certificate granted to each successful student.

(ii) It will be necessary for each Fourth Year M.B.,B.S. student to have such a certificate before she will be permitted to appear in the Third Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination.

(iii) The course on Vaccination consists of three lectures and three practical demonstrations and is compulsory for a Fourth Year student.

6. ADMISSION

1. Candidates for admission to this College must complete the age of 17 years by the 31st of December of the year of admission.

2. Candidates must have passed the Intermediate Science Examination taking Medical Students Group of the Panjab University, Sind University or Dacca University or an equivalent examination of an Indian University or bodies recognized by the Panjab University.

3. Candidates must be physically fit and protected against smallpox and enteric group of fevers to the satisfaction of the Principal. Physical fitness will be determined by an examination conducted by a Board of Lady Doctors.

4. Admission to this College is open to candidates from all the Provinces in Pakistan including the States which have acceded to Pakistan. Candidates from the Indian Union are also eligible for admission.

5. Applicants seeking admission to the College should apply on the Descriptive Roll Form (obtainable from College Office) and furnish the following certificates :-

- (a) A certificate of having passed the qualifying examination as noted in Rule 2 above.
- (b) A certificate from the Registrar, Panjab University, or of another University, showing the total number of marks allotted and obtained in each subject of the F.Sc. (Medical Group) or B.Sc. Examination passed.

(c) A certificate of good conduct and character from the Principal of the College the candidate attended last.

(d) A certificate of the date of birth.

(e) A certificate signed by the Tehsildar of the District in which the candidate is residing and countersigned by the Deputy Commissioner or Collector of that District showing that she is either a bonafide resident or has, after migration from the Indian Dominion, on Partition, permanently settled in the District.

(f) A certificate from a registered Medical Practitioner showing that the candidate is physically fit and has been (i) inoculated against the enteric group of fevers within the preceding six months and (ii) vaccinated against smallpox within the preceding three years.

6. Candidates from the North-West Frontier Province, Sind, Karachi, Baluchistan, East Bengal and the States should apply to the Secretary to Government, Pakistan, Ministry of Health and Works (Health Division) Karachi, through their respective Governments or Administration. Candidates from the Indian Union should apply to the Secretary to Government, Pakistan, Ministry of Health and Works (Health Division) Karachi, through the High Commissioner for Pakistan in India New Delhi, India.

7. Applications from candidates must reach the office of the Principal by the 10th of September of the year of admission.

8. Applications received after the date specified will not be considered. No candidate's name will be registered for admission whose papers are incomplete.

9. It shall be understood that an application for admission supported by the required certificates does not, in itself, confer a right to be admitted to the College.

10. The Principal will summon candidates for interview on a date in the end of September and shall decide which of the candidates shall be admitted.

11. In the selection of candidates for admission the Principal will ordinarily give preference to candidates in the following order :—

(i) B.Sc. First Class, provided they have passed the F.Sc. (Medical Group) Examination.

(ii) F.Sc. (Medical Group) First Class.

(iii) B.Sc. Second Class, provided they have passed the F.Sc. (Medical Group) Examination.

(iv) B.Sc. Third Class, provided they have passed the F.Sc. (Medical Group) Examination in Second Class.

(v) F.Sc. (Medical Group) Second Class.

Ordinarily, Third Division candidates will not be eligible for admission but the Principal will have discretion to admit Third Division candidates if a sufficient number of First or Second Division candidates are not available. He will also have discretion to refuse any candidate who seems to him, for one reason or another, unsuited or unlikely to make a good doctor.

12. Students are not permitted to migrate from one College to another, without the previous permission of the Principals of both the Colleges.

13. Selected students who passed the F.Sc. (Medical Group) Examination from Universities other than the Panjab University should arrange to produce, to this College, their migration certificate, otherwise they shall not be allotted the registration number by the Panjab University and they shall not be eligible to appear in any Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination. Students who passed F.Sc. (Medical Group) from Indian Universities should particularly note this.

*Note :—*Any attempt on the part of a candidate, or her relatives, to canvass or to bring influence upon the Principal directly or indirectly will be a disqualification for admission to the College.

7. FEES AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

1. All newly admitted students to the First Year Class shall have to pay the following fees, which must be paid on the day of admission or within one week. No student's name will be entered in the attendance register unless she has paid her fees.

Note.—Caution—money not claimed within three years after leaving the College will be credited to College Funds as unclaimed.

2. In addition to the fees prescribed above, an admission fee of Rs. 10/- per head will be charged from all new entrants to the 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th Year M.B.,B.S. classes and from all students who leave the College and are re-admitted afterwards.

3. A remanded student in any class including Fifth Year will be charged a fee of Rs. 50/- for one subject plus Rs. 10/- for each additional subject which she is required to attend under the College rules or University regulations for the period of remand. In addition to this fee she will be charged a practical class fee of Rs. 15/- per subject in which she has to appear in subsequent examinations and a hospital fee of Rs. 20 - if required to do hospital work.

4. Students who attend classes, other than those laid down in the Prospectus for their particular year, will be required to pay a fee of Rs. 23/- p. m. for each subject.

5. Science students of other colleges and medical graduates wishing to take a course of lectures in any subject or wishing to do practical work in a laboratory or dissection room will be admitted on payment of the following fees provided accommodation is available :—

Rs. 50/- for a course of 50 lectures.

Rs. 100 - for a course of 100 lectures.

Rs. 100/- for work in a laboratory or dissection room for a period of four months.

Note.—Students who take up two or more subjects at a time are required to pay full rates for one subject and half the prescribed rates for each additional subject.

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6. Any student who leaves the College with the object of continuing her studies elsewhere may receive certificates of attendance at lectures on payment of fees at the following rates :—

- (a) In the case of registered students who have passed the University Professional Examinations in the subjects for which certificates are required, Rs. 35 for a combined certificate embracing all subjects and Rs. 10 for a certificate for one subject.
- (b) In the case of registered students who have failed to qualify in University Professional Examinations, Rs. 35 for each course of lectures or each period of hospital instruction.

7. Students must attend at least 75 per cent of lectures and practical classes to the satisfaction of the College authorities to enable them to obtain a certificate of attendance.

Deficiency in the attendance below the required percentage of class meetings will entail forfeiture of the certificate of attendance.

8. It shall be understood that the Principal is not bound to supply any information as to the number of lectures, hospital practice or demonstrations.

9. Students of Second 'Third' Fourth and Fifth Year classes must pay their fees at least 15 days before the commencement of the Session or such other date as may be fixed by the

Principal for this purpose. If the fees are not paid as above, the defaulting student's name will be struck off the College rolls and re-admission will only be allowed on payment of a re-admission fee of Rs. 10, in addition to the College fees and other dues.

10. Fees once paid shall not be refunded but in the case of students who are prevented by illness or for other reasons beyond their control from attending the College in the year for which they paid the usual fees, the Principal may direct that the whole or part of the amount of fees shall not be again paid for the year in which such student rejoins the College.

11. Remission of the whole or half of the College fees will be allowed by the Principal in the case of deserving students.

12. Applications for remission of fees must be submitted by candidates along with their admission papers, accompanied by a statement from the Deputy Commissioner of the District to which the candidate belongs, stating the financial circumstances of the applicant's parents or guardians.

13. The grant of such remission will rest with the Principal and will depend upon the circumstances of a student, her general conduct and the progress made by her in her studies. Absence from or failure in a professional or house examination, breach of discipline, neglect of duties, shall entail the withdrawal of this concession.

14. If two sisters are studying in this College, the younger one will get the remission of half College fees.

8. EXAMINATIONS

1. Examinations are of two kinds—House and University.

2. House Examinations.

(a) These are held twice a year : (i) at the end of the first term; and (ii) at the end of the third term for First Year students and at the end of the second term for other classes. The examinations are both written and practical.

(b) These examinations are compulsory for all the students. Students failing to appear in or pass the examination will be regarded as students whose course of instruction is incomplete and unsatisfactory and will be liable to be debarred from promotion to the next class in the case of First Year students or will be debarred from appearing in the University Professional M.B.,B.S. examination in the case of Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Year students. Also concessions of fees or scholarships will be withdrawn if a candidate fails to appear in or pass the house examinations.

(c) The marks awarded in these examinations will form the basis for the award of medals and prizes.

3. University Examinations.

(a) First Professional Examination for the degree of M.B.,B.S. is held at the end of the Second Year.

(b) Second Professional Examination is held at the end of the Third Year.

(c) Third Professional Examination is held at the end of the Fourth Year.

(d) Fourth Professional Examination is held at the end of the Fifth Year.

4. Students who fail in the Professional Examination will not be promoted to the next higher class until they have passed that examination.

5. The name of students who fail four times in the First Professional Examination of the University of the Panjab, will be removed from the College rolls.

9. SCHOLARSHIPS

1. The following merit scholarships are sanctioned by the Governing Body for students in the College :—

One scholarship for Second Year students at ... Rs. 25 per mensem

One scholarship for Third Year students at ... Rs. 25 per mensem

One scholarship for Fourth Year students at ... Rs. 25 per mensem

One scholarship for Fifth Year students for eight months only at Rs. 25 per mensem

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The scholarship for Second Year students will be awarded by the Principal on the results of the First Year Class examinations and the scholarship for Third, Fourth and Fifth Year students, will be awarded by the Principal on the results of the First, Second and Third Professional Examinations, respectively. Each scholarship will be tenable for one year only.

2. The grant of these scholarships will be dependent on the student's general conduct and assiduity. Absence from, or failure in, professional or class examination, breach of discipline, neglect of duties or reprehensible conduct, etc., may entail the forfeiture of a scholarship.

3. These scholarships are open to all students on the rolls of the College irrespective of the fact whether they are or not receiving stipends or scholarships from other sources.

4. Scholarships are also awarded to the poor and indigent students, whether refugees or not, from various sources, viz :-

10. PRIZES AND CERTIFICATES OF MERIT

I. *Prizes* are awarded on the combined results of the House Examinations.

2. *Certificates of Merit* are awarded to all students who gain 75% of marks or more in a subject of the class examinations of their Years provided not less than 33% of marks are gained by them in the other subjects of the examination.

11. GENERAL DISCIPLINARY RULES

(A) CLASSROOM

1. Every student is required to attend punctually at the hours notified for lectures and practical classes.

2. No pupil is allowed to leave the lecture room without the permission of her Lecturer or until the class is dismissed.

3. Immediately after assembly of the class the roll will be called and presence or absence of students noted. A student coming late in the classroom will be marked absent unless her excuse is accepted by the Professor.

4. Students must attend at least 75% of the lectures and practical classes to the satisfaction of the College authorities to enable them to obtain a certificate of attendance. Deficiency in attendance below the required percentage of class meetings will entail forfeiture of a certificate of attendance.

5. Students are not permitted to remain in the lecture rooms except at the prescribed hours for lectures.

(B) LEAVE

1. All leave of absence from the College (with the exception of sick leave) will be without scholarship.

2. Sick leave will only be granted on production of a medical certificate from a registered medical practitioner in case of day-scholars. Students residing in the Hostel must produce a certificate from the Medical Officer in charge of the Hostel.

3. In the case of scholarship-holders the sick leave will ordinarily be restricted to six days with scholarship but in the case of those who are admitted for treatment in the Sir Ganga Ram Hospital, or in any other hospital recognized

by the Principal, sick leave with scholarship may be extended up to three weeks on the production of a certificate from the Medical Officer concerned that the extension of leave is absolutely essential in the interest of the student's health.

4. In all cases leave taken will be at the student's own risk so far as the percentage of attendance is concerned, and even a medical certificate will not condone a deficiency in attendance.

5. Students must not leave the station without the permission of the Principal.

6. A student who is absent without leave continuously for a period of 4 weeks will be struck off the College rolls. In the case of a newly admitted student the seat will be declared vacant and filled by another candidate on the waiting list.

(C) CORRESPONDENCE.

1. Students are forbidden to address any member of the Governing Body direct. Any communication intended for such higher authority must be submitted through the Principal, who will forward it if he considers it desirable.

2. Every student desirous of addressing the Principal by letter must do so separately. Joint applications are entirely prohibited and will not receive attention.

3. Any student wishing to make a representation on any subject has the right of direct access to the Principal at any time during College hours.

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4. The Principal and Professors of the staff are accessible at any time for the consideration of difficulties and grievances of students and will be always pleased to hear them and to give advice.

(D) GENERAL

1. Students are required to observe "order and quiet" at all times in the College.

2. No game of any sort is to be played during the College and Hospital duty hours.

3. Any student breaking or damaging any College property shall be required to pay the cost of repair or replacement. In case of wilful damage she shall be punished as the Principal may deem fit.

4. All irregularities, neglect of duties and breaches of discipline are to be brought to the notice of the Principal by the Professors under whom the student is working.

5. In dealing with any offence occurring in the College, the Principal may decide whether it is to be met with :-

- (i) an apology, verbal or witten,
- (ii) fine,
- (iii) suspension of scholarship,
- (iv) suspension from the College, or
- (v) dismissal from the College.

The Principal is competent to remit the fine imposed by him.

6. The decision of the Principal is, in all cases, to be considered as final.

7. Students are required to wear simple white dress in the College and Hospital. Use of gaudy coloured dress is strictly prohibited.

8. All students must provide themselves with washable white coats which shall be worn while working in the College Laboratories and Hospital.

12. COLLEGE SPORT

The following games are provided in the Hostel for the students :-

- (1) Basket-ball.
- (2) Volley-ball.
- (3) Badminton.
- (4) Tennis.

All students of the college must take part in any one or more of these games according to their choice. Students playing tennis will have to pay Rs. 3 p. m. in addition to the yearly subscription.

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13. RULES FOR THE FATIMA JINNAH MEDICAL COLLEGE LIBRARY

1. The Library shall be under the control of a member of the teaching staff nominated by the Principal.

The Library will be opened on all working days from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., except on Fridays when it will be closed at 12 noon. During summer months the time will be from 7 a. m. to 12 noon.
2. Silence and order must be maintained in the Library at all times. Any infringement of this rule will be punished by a fine.
3. Any person who loses, defaces, or otherwise seriously damages a book, shall be liable to pay the cost of replacement, and, in the event of the book being one set or series, the cost of the whole set or series will be charged.
4. The following shall be entitled to use the Library :—
 - (a) Members of the Staff of the College and allied hospitals.
 - (b) Students of the College.
5. Books that are required for occasional reference, such as encyclopaedias, dictionaries, etc., and books of great value or rarity, shall not be removed from the Library.
6. Books borrowed from the Library are not transferable.
7. Books are issued strictly according to the priority of demand or request.
8. A Suggestion Book is kept in the Library in which suggestions for new books are invited.
9. Not more than two books may be taken out from the Library at any time.
10. No book shall be kept by any student for more than fourteen days. For each succeeding day that a book is kept there shall be a fine of one anna. Issue of books shall be stopped till the fines are paid and the book returned to the Library.
11. Text-books prescribed by the University or Faculty shall not be issued to the students.
12. (a) Every borrower will be supplied with a Borrower's Card which shall be stamped by the Librarian every time a book is issued or returned. A fine of eight annas will be inflicted for the loss of the card.

(b) The Librarian will maintain a register containing the names of all borrowers. He will maintain another register in which details of the books issued will be entered and the borrower will sign the register in the place provided for the purpose in acknowledgement of the receipt of the book. When a book is returned an entry will be made in this register and initialled by the Librarian and also by the borrower.

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13. The Book Card placed in the pocket at the end of the book must be delivered to the Librarian before the book is taken away and the borrower must have his own card stamped.

14. The borrowers' cards are not transferable.

15. During stock-taking, which will be notified, all books taken out must be returned to the Librarian.

16. Periodicals, magazines and newspapers received for the Students' Section are placed on the table for the use of students and must not be defaced or be taken away under any circumstances.

17. Books required by the Professors, if taken out by any other member must be returned on receipt of a notice from the Librarian.

18. The Librarian shall inform the Professors and members of the teaching staff of the receipt of all new books which shall be kept in a separate almirah for a fortnight before being issued.

19. Current number of journals shall be kept in the Library Reading Room and left there till the next issue is received when the back issue will be circulated, preference being given to the Department to which primarily the journal is of interest. They will only be circulated to such Professors as have intimated a wish for the particular journal, in a book kept for the purpose.

20. Professors are allowed to keep a Departmental Library of reference books pertaining to their subjects. But these Departmental Libraries are open to the members of the staff and no book wanted by a student shall be supplied to her by the Librarian from the departmental libraries.

14. THE COLLEGE HOSTEL RULES.

(I) GENERAL

1. The College is running a Hostel which is situated on Hall Road.

2. All students with the exception of those whose parents or near relatives are actually living in Lahore, must live in the Hostel.

3. Seats shall be allotted by the Warden in order of seniority which will be determined by the year of study and by the marks gained at the last University Examination. In the case of Second Year students the marks obtained at the House Examinations in the First Year also will be taken into consideration.

4. No boarder is allowed to change her seat without special permission of the Warden.

5. Applications for admission to the Hostel should be made to the Principal of the College.

6. The Principal may refuse admission or eject any student if he is satisfied that she is not a desirable person to live in the Hostel.

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7. Use of electric heaters, stoves, ironing machines or any such appliances as are worked by electricity, except the electric fans and lights, is strictly prohibited in the hostel. Any student found making use of these appliances will be reported to the Principal for such action as deemed fit.

(2) DISCIPLINE

1. The Warden and the Superintendent of the Hostel are responsible for discipline in the Hostel and are authorised to admonish students for any irregularities, neglect of duties or breach of discipline. Admonitions will be recorded in writing and noted by the student. Three admonitions in a session and serious offences will be brought to the notice of the Principal for necessary action.

2. Appeals from the order of the Warden shall be made to the Principal.

3. No gathering or meeting of boarders shall be allowed in the premises of the Hostel without previous sanction of the Principal. In applying for such permission the object of the meeting may be specified and the application signed by three boarders.

4. Every part of the Hostel premises shall be freely open to inspection by the Principal, Warden and Superintendent at any time.

5. All damages shall be repaired at the expense of the boarder responsible.

6. Furniture must not be removed from one room to another.

7. No boarder shall indulge in any amusement which disturbs other boarders.

8. Every boarder shall answer her name at the evening roll-call, the time for which will be notified by the Superintendent from time to time. Boarders are prohibited from leaving the Hostel after the roll-call. Absence from the roll-call is a serious offence.

9. Applications for withdrawal from the Hostel should be submitted to the Warden through the Superintendent for the Principal's orders.

11. Any boarder wishing to go to a place other than the College or Hospital shall inform the Superintendent previously and the full address of the place where going entered in the book kept for this purpose. The student will sign and enter the time of return to the Hostel.

12. No boarder shall stay out for the night or spend the week-end without previously obtaining permission of the Warden.

13. All cases of sickness must be reported to the Superintendent at once for necessary action.

14. The College is not responsible for loss of any property of the boarders.

15. Boarders are warned against interfering with the electric fittings.

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16. Students must keep their rooms neat, clean and tidy. The bed should be properly arranged and a bed cover used. Dirty clothes should be stored separately and removed at once.

(3) VISITORS

1. At the time of the admission to the Hostel every boarder shall hand in a letter from her parents containing names and addresses of friends and relations who can meet them in the Hostel or with whom they allow their daughter to go outside the Hostel or to spend the night and weekend. Whenever such addresses of the friends and relations are changed, the parents shall kindly inform the Principal of the College. No visitor will be admitted whose name is not on the list.

2. Students may receive authorised visitors between the hours specified by the Hostel Superintendent from time to time. At other hours visitors may be received only with the written permission of the Hostel Superintendent.

3. No stranger shall be admitted inside the Hostel premises without the permission of the Superintendent.

4. No guest shall be allowed to reside in the Hostel.

5. Any request from girls for shopping, etc., should be made to the Superintendent.

(4) MESS RULES

1. Members elect their own Manager and the cost of living depends on the taste and wishes of the students themselves. The

average cost of diet per student comes to about Rs. 40 per mensem.

2. The general management of the mess will be in the hands of a Committee of three members, one of whom shall be the Manager by election. The Committee will be elected by the members of the mess.

3. The Manager shall, subject to the control of the Committee, keep the accounts, supervise the work of the servants and see that the kitchen and utensils are kept clean and tidy.

4. All members of the mess shall control cooking by turn.

5. Meals must be served in the dining rooms and must not be taken in the living rooms.

6. Members intending to be absent from a meal must notify the Manager at least six hours previously otherwise they will be charged for it.

7. All servants of a kitchen shall be under the control of the Manager who shall have power to dismiss them subject to the sanction of the Superintendent of the Hostel. The punishment of the servants will be entirely in the hands of the Superintendent and all complaints against them shall be dealt with by her.

8. Members will pay their mess fees in advance on or before the 10th of each month, after which the Manager may debar any member from the use of the mess till the latter has paid the fees.

9. Members inviting local guests should intimate the fact to the Manager at least six hours before the meal is to be served to them.

10. Appointments of kitchen servants shall be made by the Manager subject to the approval of the Superintendent.

11. Only resident students will be eligible for membership.

12. Any member may forfeit her rights of membership if her conduct is found unsatisfactory or if she does not abide by the rules of the mess, provided that no member shall be dismissed without consulting the Principal.

(5) HOSTEL FEES AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

(a) The following fees and subscription for the Hostel are payable by the students for full session of the College (October to end of June) along with the College fees: -

(b) Fees and subscriptions once paid cannot be refunded either in full or in part.

(c) Students failing to pay the required fees and subscriptions by the date fixed will be charged a penalty of Re. 10- per head per day in addition and ejected from the College if their accounts are much overdue.

(d) The Fifth Year and remanded students appearing in the Final Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination to be held in January and April are required to pay Hostel fees from the date of joining the Hostel up to the end of January and April respectively. Students who fail in the Final Professional M.B.,B.S. Examination in April will be charged Hostel fee for the actual period they reside in the Hostel after April. Students of other classes joining the Hostel after general allotment will be charged from the date of joining till the end of June at the rates prescribed in para. (a) above.

(e) If any student leaves the Hostel without settlement of Hostel dues, the amount outstanding against her will be recovered from her security deposit and the student fined Rs. 5- in addition.

(f) A penalty of Rs. 10- will be charged from the student who does not occupy the seat allotted to her at the time of general allotment.

- (g) Students who occupy the seats allotted to them but leave them afterwards will be charged full Hostel fees and subscriptions for full session of the College.
- (h) Fees and subscriptions for full session are to be paid in the Principal's office along with the College fees on the dates fixed by the Principal, while those for broken periods and for summer vacation will be realised in advance by the Superintendent of the Hostel where the students are living. Students failing to pay these fees in advance to the Superintendent will be charged a penalty of Re 1 - each in addition, and ejected from the Hostel if the accounts are much overdue.
- (i) Students staying in the Hostel during summer vacation for hospital work will be charged the same fees and subscription as laid down in paragraph (a) above. Students living in the Hostel for 15 days or less in any month will be charged fees and subscription at half rates and those living for more than 15 days at full rates.
- (j) From the 15th April to the 15th October when ceiling fans are used, the occupants of each room will have to pay Rs. 10 per month. This amount will be divided on the students living in each room.
- (k) Fan charges are payable in advance per month to the Hostel Superintendent who will remit the amount to the Cashier and get an official receipt for it. For the

purpose of the payment of fan charges 15 days or less are equal to half month whereas more than 15 days will be regarded as full month.

15. PHYSICAL TRAINING COURSE FOR M.B.,B.S. STUDENT.

RULES

1. The course extends over a period of 2 years comprising the following attendances:—

- (a) First Year. A course of 55 attendances including 10 lectures on postural defects, their causes and remedial exercises and 45 periods of physical training activities.
- (b) Second Year. A further course of 20 attendances in physical activities.

2. Compulsory attendance is required by :

First Year students	Maximum 80 periods. Minimum 55 periods.
Second Year students	Maximum 30 periods. Minimum 20 periods.

3. Every student is required to put in one hour of physical training three days in the week, and the period set apart for this work carries the same value as an ordinary College period in the matter of discipline.

4. Students will attend the classes wearing long shirts, pyjamas and canvas shoes.

5. Attendance of students of both the classes is compulsory and any student failing to put in the required attendance shall be required to make up the deficiency in her next year with an additional course of 10 attendances in case of First Year students and 15 attendances in case of Second Year students.

6. The following are the activities approved by the Panjab University for physical training.

- (1.) Physical Exercises (with apparatus and freehand).
- (2.) Athletics. (running, broad jump, high jump, javelin throw, discus throw, putting the shot, relay races and sprinting).
- (3.) Games (net-ball, volley-ball, badminton, deck tennis and tennis).
- (4.) Swimming (elementary and advanced).

16. TUTORIAL SYSTEM

The College students are divided into groups, every group being made up of a proportion of students from each year.

2. A student once placed in a group will remain in that group until she leaves the College. Under no circumstances will transfer of a student from one group to another be permitted.

3. The tutors in charge of the groups will meet their respective groups of students as occasion arises.

4. The object of the tutorial group system is to keep the staff and students in touch with one another and to promote mutual good feeling and understanding.

5. Each tutor is *in loco parentis* as regards her group and all points of difficulty, which students must have individually or collectively, may be referred to her for opinion and advice.

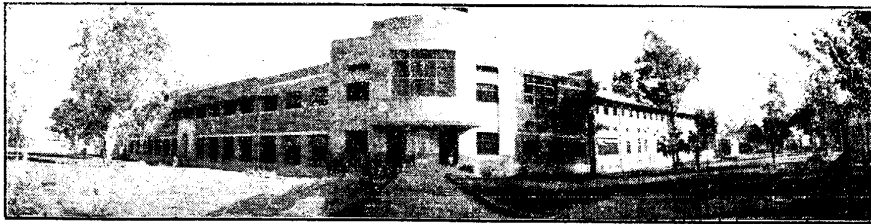
