OPERATIONS

1. A conference on foreign television monitoring called by FBID was attended by 27 representatives of USIB agencies and USIA on 20 November. A report of the meeting is being prepared for dissemination to all participants and solicitation of written requirements.

2. The Chief Monitor, Mediterranean Bureau tested 10 applicants in Tehran for the Kurdish monitor vacancy, but found none qualified. One prospect in England failed the London Bureau's test, as did a Washington candidate tested at ECB. JPRS also notified FBID its candidate did not test satisfactorily. Meanwhile recruiting leads were pursued vigorously through Contact Division, DD/P, and Office of Personnel. Arrangements are being made to contact additional prospects here and abroad and to test further candidates in Washington.

3. Far Eastern bureau recruiting of an Indonesian monitor for Saigon has been unproductive so far. The Chief, Saigon Bureau has been authorized to undertake a further search in Singapore and points in Malaya. He has also been requested to follow up the previous contact with Radio Malaya.

4. The Taiwan communications MINIMIZE was lifted in mid-month by the Army, and FBIS services to all Taiwan addressees were restored to normal levels.

5. The London Bureau Communications Officer visited ACOM theater headquarters in Germany and clarified procedures to be used should a MINIMIZE be invoked in Europe. He was advised that under MINIMIZE, one and possibly two of the three FBIS London-Washington allocated channels would be lost, with some limited provision of common-user facilities. It seems virtually certain that the highest-priority FBIS channel would never be taken over in a MINIMIZE. Strict censorship of common user traffic might, however, result in the moving of some of the FBIS file by airmail or other communications facilities.

6. At the request of G-2, Caribbean Command, following recent discussions with the Chief, FBID, during his Panama trip, the Latin American file of the East Coast Bureau is now wirefiled to that office.

7. Arrangements were made with the Executive Secretariat of the Department of State to transmit selected items from the FBIS Wire file to the U.S. delegation to the Colombo Plan conference in Seattle.

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✓ 8. The FBIS Wire Service, at the request of FDD, inaugurated on 21 November a service under which short items supplied by FDD are wire-filed to designate recipients at NSA, the Pentagon, and an Air Force component in Omaha, Nebraska.

✓ 9. At the request of the PP Staff of DD/P, the FBIS Wire serviced seven requests involving 19 items under the authority of "Spotlight Commentary."

✓ 10. The Office of Scientific Intelligence was added to the roster of recipients of the FBIS Wire file effective 17 November.

13. Radio Propaganda Reports:

a. "Peking Moderates Line on Advance Toward Communism In Face of New Signs of Soviet Misgivings." This report follows up a 31 October Propaganda Report on seeds of Sino-Soviet discord inherent in Peking's propaganda about communes. Copies of both studies were sent to the DD/I and to interested intelligence offices in and outside the Agency.

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- b. "Soviet Propaganda on Missile-Launching Submarines: Indications of Concern over U.S. Capabilities."
- c. "Meager Soviet Propaganda Support for Recent Cairo Charges Against Israel."
- d. "Moscow Radio Publicity for Soviet Credit Agreement with Argentina."

14. The 31 October Radio Propaganda Report on "CPR Claims to be Hearing Communism through Communes: Seeds of Ideological Discord with Moscow" drew compliments from the Chief, Senior Research Staff, and intelligence officers in OCI and ONE. The report was cited and its conclusions endorsed in a Staff Memorandum circulated by ONE.

15. Special Propaganda Analysis Services:

a. Twelve analyses of Soviet propaganda bearing on the two Geneva conferences--on stopping nuclear tests and on measures to prevent surprise attack--were forwarded to OCI for incorporation in Agency support cables to the U.S. delegation staffs. Texts of key Soviet propaganda items were supplied to the delegations by the London Bureau. RPB filled two special requests from the delegations for analysis and research.

b. Statistics on the volume and target audiences of Moscow radio propaganda on East-West issues, data on Soviet propaganda concerning individual countries, and a list of major Soviet propaganda developments during 1958 were prepared in response to a request for contributions to USIA's annual unclassified book on communist propaganda.

c. Report No. 4 on Soviet broadcast exploitation U.S. press sources was issued in response to the Director's request for regular reporting on the subject. These reports will henceforth be issued semiannually.

d. Propaganda Analysis items on the Wire:

- (1) A final item on the Taiwan crisis (November 7)
- (2) Moscow's treatment of Polish Foreign Minister Rapacki's revised nuclear-free zone proposal

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- (3) Soviet propaganda's suppression of AEC's disclosure of two nuclear tests in the USSR since 31 October
- (4) Propaganda differences between Moscow and East Berlin concerning Khrushchev's proposal to end the Berlin occupation
- (5) Radio Moscow's treatment of East German Premier Grotewohl's remarks on the German question

FACILITIES

16. Exploration of the possibilities of a joint antenna field and operations building with OCIN continued. Minimum and maximum area designs for antenna fields have been plotted. The Shenandoah Valley area generally limited by Winchester, Va., and Charles Town, W. Va., will be reconnoitered by helicopter prior to ground surveys. Office of Communications is also interested in this planning.

17. A short wave multicoupler covering the range 2 to 32 megacycles manufactured by and borrowed from CGS Laboratories has been operationally tested at the East Coast Bureau. With this multicoupler, which has been produced under an Air Force developmental contract, it was demonstrated that weak signals could be heard better than with antenna alone. This is due to the multicoupler's gain in the presence of a very good signal to noise ratio. Discussions are in progress with the manufacturer relative to cost reduction for a suitable commercial model. Also under discussion is a long/medium wave unit to cover the frequency range of 100 kcs to 2000 kcs with operational characteristics comparable to the short wave model.

ADMINISTRATION

18. Orientation in FBIS:

The Chief, Bloc Foreign Affairs Section, RPB explained propaganda-analysis methods to ORR personnel enrolled in a course in intelligence techniques conducted by the Office of Training.

19. During November, four employees entered on duty and two were separated. On duty strength as of 30 November was including one employee on IWOP, one employee detailed to FE, one employee detailed to OCI and three employees assigned from clerical pool not to be counted against FBID ceiling. 50X1

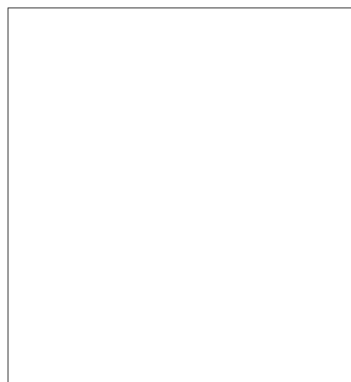

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FBI'S BIENNIAL PRODUCTION REPORT

1 November 1958

Revised reporting requirements, disseminated during August, were placed in use by all bureaus except two (noted within) where pouch communications were too slow to permit a change of method for the current period.

The new format substitutes "man-hours" of monitoring for broadcast "hours monitored", since the latter does not reflect differences due to language, reception, type of transmission, etc. It eliminates the "percent coverage", a figure which has had little real meaning due to broad difficulties in establishing the limits of significant material. There has been added a new column of "words filed per man-hour", obtained by dividing column two by column one. This ratio provides a significant index of productivity which henceforth will be used as a basis for detecting and investigating unproductive coverage categories. It will be evaluated not merely as an absolute index but also in terms of columns four and five.

Column five has been enlarged in scope to indicate other special uses than economic abstracts. The code for these uses is as follows:

1. RFB Requirement
2. BBC Requirement
3. Special Consumer Requirement
4. Roundup or Reaction Report Usage
5. Economic Abstract Source

It should be noted that figures on "words published" which occasionally exceed "words filed" are not discrepancies but the result of backlog liquidation during the sample periods.
