MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief of Operations, DD/P

SUBJECT:

Operational Use of Chemical Agents

1. The committee appointed by you in the above-captioned matter recommends the following policy:

"In certain operational situations which warrant the employment of extraordinary measures to attempt to obtain an objective not obtainable by ordinary means, the use of chemical agents is permissible. It is the policy of CIA not to use any chemical agents to secure information against the will of a subject where it may reasonably be expected to cause the subject lasting mental or physical harm as contrasted to possible temporary discomfort. Chemical agents may be used only after certification by the Chief of Operations that their use is in the national interest. A permanent supervisory committee composed of a representative of the Medical Staff, Office of Security, TSS, FI Staff and CI Staff shall consider each use of chemical agents and will in each case make appropriate recommendations to the Chief of Operations for his assistance in making the decision relative to the use of chemical agents. Except for medical reasons, as chemical agents will be used on any staff officer or employees of CIA or U.S. employees of any other agency without (a) the consent of the employee. (b) a certification by the Chief, Medical Statt, that the chemical agent

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will not cause any mental or physical damage to the employee,

(c) after (a) and (b) are completed, the recommendation will be
submitted to the advisory committee for consideration and recommendation through the Chief of Operations to the DDCI, and (d)
approval by the DDCI.

"Since chemical agents are still in an experimental stage

as to the scope of their ultimate use, the recummendation for use in

any particular case should be made on the basis of need and national interest. The cost factor in this experimental phase is of secondary consideration.

"The permanent advisory committee will make recom||LLEG||B|
mendations to the Chief of Operations for his assistance in determining
whether research should be conducted. While it is the policy of
the Agency to determine the best chemical agents which may be
used to accomplish these extraordinary operational objectives, all
such research must first be approved by the Chief of Operations."

2. It is recommended that the Director issue the above policy statement to you in one copy which will constitute your Agency charter and responsibility for chemical agents.

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- 3. A memorandum from the DCI to you in original only is attached for your convenience in the event that you concur in this recommendation.
- 4. It is recommended that you issue the following directive to each Division Chief:

"Attemporary committee composed of a representative of the Medical Staff, Office of Security, TS3, FI Staff, and chaired by the Deputy Chief, Counter Intelligence Staff, is established for the purpose of recommending to me concerning the use of chemical agents for the purpose of obtaining information or attaining operational objectives. All requests for the use of chemical agents will be submitted to the chairman of this committee. The committee will then recommend to me as follows:

chemical agents

- "a. Whether or not/wags should be used; chemical agent
- "b. The specifid sixing to be used which is most likely to accomplish the desired results;
- "c. The estimated risk factors, if my, involved in its use;
- "d. The procedure and circumstances under which the chemical agent is to be administered; and
  - in making a decision that the use of the managementical agent is in

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the national interest. The committee will not attempt to judge
the value of the results expected as a result of the use of the
chemical agent, but only the likelihood of achieving these results.

"The use of chemical agents is very sensitive. It is requested that you brief appropriate senior members of your staff only of the fact that this committee has been created and that any request for the use of chemical agents will be submitted to the chairman of the committee, who will furnish guidance as to procedures and information necessary for the committee to make recommendations to me.

"Since chemical agents are still in an experimental stage as to the scope of their ultimate use, a recommendation for use in any particular case should be made on the basis of need and national interest. The cost factor in this experimental phase is of secondary consideration."

5. The committee recommends that you instruct the Cable Secretariat to automatically distribute to the chairman of this committee a copy of all cable communications which discuss or recommend the use of chemical agents in connection with operations. In the event you concur, a memorandam to the Cable Secretariat is attached for your convenience.

- 6. In order for the committee to properly consider the operational use of chemical agents, it is believed necessary that we review the results of each past use by this Agency either operationally or experimentally. Both TSS and the Office of Security feel that your authority is required before this information can be released to the committee. A letter of authority is attached for your consideration.
- 7. For your information, the committee at future meetings, in addition to the action indicated previously in this memorandum, intends to review the research which has been conducted to date in the chemical agent field to consider what, if any, new research may be desirable in order to determine if there may be chemical agents adaptable to operational use which are not currently being used by CIA. TSS is somewhat concerned that this committee will overlap and duplicate the work of other committees with the result that they will have more than one channel of guidance in the chemical agent field. It is recommended that you issue the following guidance to this committee:

"In your consideration of the elements outlined by me in paragraph 2 of my memorandum of 14 March 1958 in the above-captioned matter, you may disregard any existing committee for having current jurisdiction or authority in the chemical agent field.

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Your final recommendations should include either the abolishing of present overlapping committees or the creation of a new committee, or the placing of authority in one existing committee. It is my desire that you make such recommendations as you feel appropriate which will best accomplish the objectives of the committee as set out in the memorandum referred to above."

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Work with some of the psychochemicals was reported. It was indicated that the major emphasis at the present them is on studying reactions of individuals to drugs rather than the drug itself. Work is continuing on trying to learn more about how to manage, emploit, and utilize reactions for purposes pertinent to the Agency.

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Interest in interrogation techniques was discussed. The specific project in this area is the Letroit Project which was reported in previous mostings. This is a study to attempt to get guarded information from individuals which they ordinarily refuse to reveal. It was indicated that this program was getting along fairly well and that we were in about the middle of it.

Dr. Gottlieb indicated that the experimental design had been appleted. Twenty-eight individuals had been systematically statisfied by participating paychiatrists and a series of structured quantions relating to each individual had been completed. Some of the actual interviewing had begun. However, no preliminary findings have been reported.

QXN/LLEOP Charter, proposals had been made to expand the overt restarch foundation. 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
