SUBJECT : Revised Draft of NSCID #5

1. The enclosed draft of NSCID #5 is the result of informal coordination with and contributions from the working level within the intelligence community; it is believed that we have achieved general agreement on its basic provisions.

2. There is also general agreement among those agencies operationally involved with the subject that detailed instructions for implementation of this NSCID #5 should be spelled out in one or more DCIDs, as may be necessary, the primary objective of the NSCID being to set forth the basic assignment of authority and responsibilities.

It is requested that the members of the ad hoc working group meet on 9 October 1957 at 2:15 P.M. in the DCI Conference Room (214 Administration Building) for a final group discussion of the paper with the objective of expediting the transmission of a coordinated draft to the Intelligence Advisory Committee.

NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCEL INTELLIGENCE DIRECTIVE NO. 5 U. S. ESPIONAGE AND COUNTER INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES ABROAD

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 102(d) of the National Security Act of 1947, as amended, the National Security Council hereby authorizes and directs that:

1. For the purpose of this directive:

a. <u>Espionage</u> is defined as those clandestine activities which are directed toward the acquisition of information through intelligence operations against a foreign power.

b. <u>Counterintelligence</u> is defined as that intelligence activity, with its resultant product, which is devoted to destroying the effectiveness of inimical foreign intelligence activities and which is undertaken to protect the security of the nation, and its personnel, information and installations abroad, against espionage, counterespionage, sabotage, and subversion. As an activity, counterintelligence includes the process of procuring, developing, recording, and disseminating information concerning hostile clandestine activity and of penetrating, manipulating, or repressing individuals, groups, or organizations conducting or capable of conducting such activity.

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2. To ensure centralized direction and prior, comprehensive and continuing coordination of all clandestine activities authorized herein, the Director of Central Intelligence shall:

a. Establish, in consultation with the Intelligence Advisory Committee, the procedures necessary to achieve such direction and coordination;

b. Coordinate all clandestine activities authorized herein and conducted outside the U.S. and its possessions, including liaison which concerns clandestine activities or which involves foreign clandestine services, except when the provisions of paragraph 8 apply; also coordinate clandestine activities with overt collection abroad;

c. Invite Departments and Agencies not permanent members of the Intelligence Advisory Committee which have clandestine counterintelligence responsibilities abroad to participate in the Intelligence Advisory Committee deliberations when clandestime counterintelligence matters affecting such responsibilities are under consideration;

d. Make mutually agreeable arrangements with Departments and Agencies for such cover support as may be needed by the Central Intelligence Agency, and coordinate arrangements for such cover support as may be required by other Departments and Agencies to carry out the clandestine activities authorized in paragraph 4 below.

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3. As the national clandestine service of the United States, the Central Intelligence Agency shall have primary responsibility for the following services of common concern:

a. The conduct of espionage outside the United States and its possessions in order to meet the intelligence needs of all Departments and Agencies concerned, in connection with the national security;

b. The conduct of clandestine counterintelligence outside the United States and its possessions;

c. The conduct of liaison with foreign clandestine services or concerning the above clandestine activities with foreign intelligence or security services.

d. The maintenance for the benefit of the intelligence community of central indexes and records of foreign counterintelligence information to which all Departments and Agencies shall contribute on a continuing basis all pertinent material collection by them.

4. Subject to the provisions of paragraph 2 above, other Departments and Agencies with commands or installations located outside the U. S. and its possessions may:

a. Conduct additional espionage in order to satisfy departmental intelligence needs;

b. Conduct clandestine counterintelligence activities necessary for the security of their personnel, commands, activities and installations;

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c. Conduct liaison with foreign clandestine services or concerning the above clandestine activities with foreign intelligence or security services.

5. Departments and Agencies shall assist the Central Intelligence Agency in its conduct of espionage by providing guidance in the form of continuous, timely and specific collection requirements and, as required, assessments of the information collected. They shall provide similar support to each other as required.

6. In a foreign area other than an active theater of war where U. S. forces are engaged, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U. S. representative appropriately advised of U. S. espionage and clandestine counterintelligence activities conducted in or from the area.

7. In a foreign area where major U. S. military commands are stationed, the designated representatives of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U. S. military commanders or their designated representatives, informed of the espionage and clandestime counterintelligence operations conducted by the Central Intelligence Agency in or from the area which provide information of significant importance to the missions of such commanders.

8. In active theaters of war where U. S. forces are engaged, or when the President so directs:

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\*a. The entire Central Intelligence Agency organization assigned by the Director of Central Intelligence to a commander of a command established by the Joint Chiefs of Staff shall be established as a CIA Force and, through the CIA Commander thereof, shall provide espionage and counterintelligence support to military operations.

b. Such exceptional espionage and counterintelligence operations which, because of delicate political or diplomatic implications, are conducted independently by the Central Intelligence Agency shall be coordinated by the Director of Central Intelligence with the Joint Chiefs of Staff;

c. The Director of Central Intelligence and the Joint Chiefs of Staff shall establish procedures for the coordination of liaison on clandestine activities between U. S. military commanders and foreign services that engage in such activities.

9. In addition to the above, the Director of Central Intelligence, in consultation with the Intelligence Advisory Committee and other interested Departments and Agencies as provided in paragraph 2c above, shall:

\* Detailed arrangements concerning the command relationships between the CIA organization and the Armed Forces in active theaters of war where American forces are engaged are established by agreement between the Director of Central Intelligence and the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

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> a. Provide for adequate coordination of all U. S. counterintelligence activities abroad and for the coordination of such activities with the Departments and Agencies responsible for domestic counterintelligence, to the extent necessary to ensure conformity with policies enunciated by the National Security Council;

> b. Take such other action as may be deemed necessary to promote the overall effectiveness of the U.S. counterintelligence effort abroad.

b. Coordinate all clandestine activities authorized herein and conducted outside the U.S. and its possessions, including liaison which concerns clandestine activities <u>or which involves foreign clandestine</u> <u>services</u>, except when the provisions of paragraph 9 apply; also coordinate clandestine activities with overt collection abroad;

c. Invite Departments and Agencies not permanent members of the Intelligence Advisory Committee which have clandestine counterintelligence responsibilities abroad to participate in the Intelligence Advisory Committee deliberations when clandestine counterintelligence matters affecting such responsibilities are under consideration;

d. Make mutually agreeable arrangements with Departments and Agencies for such cover support as may be needed by the Central Intelligence Agency, and coordinate arrangements for such cover support as may be required by other Departments and Agencies to carry out the clandestine activities authorized in paragraph 4 below.

3. As the national clandestine service of the United States, the Central Intelligence Agency shall have primary responsibility for the following services of common concern:

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a. The conduct of espionage outside the United States and its possessions in order to meet the intelligence needs of all Departments and Agencies concerned, in connection with the national security;

b. The conduct of clandestine counterintelligence outside the United States and its possessions;

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c. <u>The establishment</u>, conduct, and <u>development</u> of liaison with clandestine services or concerning the above clandestine activities with foreign intelligence or security services.

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d. The maintenance for the benefit of the intelligence community of central indexes and records of foreign counterintelligence information to which all Departments and Agencies shall contribute on a continuing basis all pertinent material collected by them.

4. Subject to the provisions of paragraph 2 above, other Departments and Agencies with commands or installations located outside the U.S. and its possessions may:

a. Conduct additional espionage in order to satisfy departmental intelligence needs;

b. Conduct clandestine counterintelligence activities necessary for the security of their personnel, commands, activities and installations;

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c. <u>Conduct</u> liaison concerning the above clandestine activities with foreign intelligence or security services <u>or which involves clandestine</u> <u>services</u>.

6. Departments and Agencies shall assist the Central Intelligence Agency in its conduct of espionage by providing guidance in the form of continuous, timely and specific collection requirements and, as required, assessments of the information collected. They shall provide similar support to each other as required.

7. In a foreign area other than an active theater of war where U.S. forces are engaged, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U.S. representative appropriately advised

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of U.S. espionage and clandestine counterintelligence activities conducted in or from the area.

8. 1. For the purpose of this directive:

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b. <u>Counterintelligence</u> is defined as "That phase of intelligence covering all activity devoted to destroying the effectiveness of inimical foreign intelligence activities and to the protection of information against espionage, personnel against subversion, and installations or material against sabotage."\* <u>Counterintelligence</u> is further defined as that intelligence activity, with its resultant product, which is undertaken to protect the security of the nation, and its personnel and installations abroad, against espionage, counterespionage, sabotage, and subversion. As an activity, counterintelligence includes the process of procuring, developing, and recording information concerning espionage, counterespionage, sabotage and subversion directed against the national security, and of penetrating, manipulating, or repressing individuals, groups, or organizations conducting or capable of conducting, such acts.

2. To promote the over-all interests of the U. S. intelligence community and to ensure comprehensive and continuing coordination of all clandestine activities authorized herein, the Director of Central Intelligence shall:

a. Establish, in consultation with the Intelligence Advisory SUCH Committee, the procedures necessary to achieve discutive coordination;

3. The Central Intelligence Agency as the national clandestine service of the United States shall have primary responsibility for the following services of common concern:

a. The conduct of espionage outside the United States and its possessions in order to meet the needs of all Departments and Agencies concerned, in connection with the national security;

8. In a foreign area where major U. S. military commands are stationed, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U. S. military commanders or their designated representatives, informed of the espionage and counterintelligence operations conducted by the Central Intelligence Agency in or from the area in direct support of the commanders.

9. In active theaters of war where U. S. forces are engaged, or when the President so directs:

a. All resources of the Central Intelligence Agency shall be included in a CIA Force assigned to the Senior U. S. Commander and,



through the CIA Commander thereof, shall provide espionage and counterintelligence support to military operations;

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 102(d) of the Estimated Security Act of 1947, as amended and with specific reference to paragraphs (4) and (5) thereof, the National Security Council hereby authorizes and directs that:

1. As comprehensive and continuing operainstion of U.S. espionage, counterintelligence, and related clandestine activities, including limison with foreign intelligence and security services on clandestine matters, can be more efficiently accomplished centrally, it shall be the duty of the Director of Central Intelligence:

a. To establish, in consultation with the Intelligence Advisory Committee, the procedures necessary to achieve such coordination and issue appropriate Director of Central Intelligence Directives as prescribed in Mational Decurity Council Intelligence Directive Ho. 1;

b. To coordinate all such activities, including the coordination of foreign clandestine intelligence collection with overt collection abroad, in all areas of the world outside the United States and its possessions other than active theaters of war where U. S. forces are engaged, in which case the provisions of paragraph 9. below shall apply;

c. To provide for their coordination with the Departments and Agencies responsible for domestic counterintelligence activities to the extent necessary to ensure conformity with policies enunciated by the Hational Security Council; Hational Security Council; Class. 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d. To invite Departments and Agencies not permanent membars of the Intelligence Advisory Committee which have counterintelligence responsibilities abroad to participate in the Intelligence Advisory Committee deliberations when counterintelligence matters affecting such responsibilities are under consideration.

2. The Central Intelligence Agency is the national clandestine service of the United States and as such has primary responsibility for the conduct of espienage, counterintelligence and related clandestine activities, as a service of common concern, outside the United States and its possessions, and for all liaison relationships with foreign intelligence and security services with respect to clandestine matters.

3. In agreement with the Director of Central Intelligence and subject to the coordination specified in paragraph 1 above, other Departments and Agencies may conduct, outside the United States and its possessions, espionage and such counterintelligence activities of a clandestime nature required for the execution of their assigned missions or for the security of their personnel, classified information, equipment or installations. Other Departments and Agencies may conduct counterintelligence activities of a non-clandestime nature, liaison with foreign intelligence and security services on non-clandestime matters, and liaison with such services on clandestime matters after coordination with the Director of Central Intelligence as provided herein.

4. The Central Intelligence Agency shall be responsible for maintaining as a service of common concern the central indices and records of foreign counterintelligence information. Other Departments and Agencies shall support this activity by contributing to the central file, on a continuing basis, all pertinent material collected by them.

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5. To increase the effectiveness of the Central Intelligence Agency's services of common concern in the espionage field, the members of the intelligence community shall furnish the Central Intelligence Agency, on a continuing basis, partiment guidance, specific collection requirements and assessments of the information collected.

6. To promote the efficiency of the U.S. clandestine affort, the Central Intelligence Agency, as a service of common concern, shall provide to Departments and Agencies engaged in elandestine activities authorized by this directive, such operational guidance and information, technical support and training programs as may be practicable.

7. The Director of Central Intelligence shall make arrangements with other Departments and Agencies for such cover support as may be required by the Central Intelligence Agency to conduct its empionage and counterintelligence activities with the maximum of effectiveness, and shall coordinate the arrangements for cover support required by other Departments and Agencies conducting clandestine activities under the provisions of this directive.

8. In a foreign area other than an active theater of war where U.S. forces are engaged, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U.S. representative appropriately advised of U.S. espionage and counterintelligence activities conducted in or from the area.

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9. In a foreign area where major U.S. military commands are stationed, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U.S. military commanders informed of the explorage and counterintelligence operations conducted by the Central Intelligence Agency in or from the area in direct support of the commanders.

10. In active theaters of war where U. S. forces are engaged or as the President may so direct:

a. All resources of the Central Intelligence Agency shall be included in a CIA Component Force and, through the CIA commander thereof, shall provide espionage and counterintelligence support to military operations in accordance with the requirements of the U.S. Military Theater Commander or the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

b. Such exceptional employage and counterintelligence operations as may be conducted by the CIA Theater Force in support of mational requirements as distinguished from those operations conducted in support of the Military Theater Commander shall be coordinated by the Director of Central Intelligence with the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

c. The Director of Central Intelligence and the Joint Chiefs of Staff shall establish procedures for the coordination of lisison between U.S. military commanders and foreign services concerning clandestine matters.



# 11. For the purpose of this directive:

a. Explorage is defined as those clandestine activities which are directoward the acquisition of information or toward the performance of intelligence operations against a foreign power.

b. # EATIONAL SECURITY COURCIL INTELLIGENCE DIRECTIVE NO. 5 ESPICEAGE AND COUNTERINTELLIGENCE

Fursuant to the provisions of Section 102(d) of the National Security Act of 1947, as amended, the National Security Council hereby authorizes and directs that:

1. For the purpose of this directive:

a. Espionage is defined as those clandestine activities which are directed toward the acquisition of information or toward the performance of intelligence operations against a foreign power.

b. <u>Counterintelligence</u> is defined as "That phase of intelligence covering all activity devoted to destroying the effectiveness of inimical foreign intelligence activities and to the protection of information against espionage, personnel egainst subversion, and installations or material against eabotage." (Dictionary of United States Military Terms for Joint Usage). <u>Counterintelligence</u> may also be defined as that intelligence activity, with its resultant product, which is undertaken to protect the security of the nation, and its personnel and installations abroad, against espionage, counterespionage, sabotage, and subversion. As an activity, developing, and recording information concerning espionage, counterespionage, sabotage and subversion directed against

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the national security, and of penetrating, manipulating, or repressing individuals, groups, or organizations conducting or capable of conducting, such acts.

2. The Central Intelligence Agency is the national clandestine service of the United States and as such shall have primary responsibility for:

a. The conduct of espionage outside the United States and its possessions in order to meet the needs of all Departments and Agencies concerned, in connection with the national security;

b. The conduct of counterintelligence outside the United States and its possessions;

c. The establishment, conduct, development and coordination of liaison concerning clandestine matters, with foreign intelligence and security services;

d. Maintaining for the benefit of the intelligence community as a service of common concern the central indices and records of foreign counterintelligence information.

> NOTE: The revised text above combines paras. 1, 2 and 4 and 11 in part of the 9 July draft, establishes CIA as the national clandestine service, deletes the term "agreed activities" and devotes itself entirely to what the Agency will do.

3. Departments and Agencies with personnel, commands, or installations located outside the U.S. and its possessions are responsible for the execution of their respective missions and for the security of their personnel, commands, and installations.

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#### T-O-P- S-E-C-R-E-T

4. In agreement with the Director of Central Intelligence and in conformity with coordination indicated herein, the Departments and Agencies may, in areas outside the U.S. and its possessions:

a. Conduct espionage in order to satisfy additional departmental intelligence needs;

b. Conduct counterintelligence activities of a clandestine nature necessary for the security of their commands, activities and installations;

c. Conduct liaison with foreign intelligence and security services on non-clandestine matters without reference to the provisions of this directive, and on clandestine matters after coordination with the Director of Central Intelligence as provided herein.

> NOTE: This is a new paragraph 2. designed to spell out in positive terms the extent to which the other Departments and Agencies may engage in the clandestine activities covered by this directive - with the exception of the words applying to agreement with the DCI and conformity with coordination, I have used, to the greatest extent possible, the words contained in the Army draft paper - as with reference to CIA, both espionage and counterintelligence are treated in a single paragraph. It does not seem necessary to state that the Departments and Agencies are responsible for counterintelligence protection of their people, etc., as that is a basic responsibility. This para. also covers liaison as set forth in the last two sentences of pars. 11 of the 9 July draft.

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5. To promote the over-all interests of the U.S. intelligence community by ensuring comprehensive and continuing coordination of all the clandestine activities suthorized herein the Director of Central Intelligence shall:

a. Establish, in consultation with the Intelligence Advisory Committee, the procedures necessary to achieve effective coordination, and publish appropriate Director of Central Intelligence Directives as prescribed in National Security Council Intelligence Directive No. 1;

b. Coordinate all such clandestine activities, including the coordination of foreign clandestine collection with overt collection abroad, in all areas of the world outside the United States and its possessions other than active theaters of war where U. S. forces are engaged, in which event the provisions of para. 10 shall apply;

c. Invite Departments and Agencies not permanent members of the Intelligence Advisory Committee which have counterintelligence responsibilities abroad to participate in the Intelligence Advisory Committee deliberations when counterintelligence matters effecting such responsibilities are under consideration;

d. Provide for the coordination of these activities with the Departments and Agencies responsible for domestic counterintelligence activities to the extent necessary to ensure conformity with policies enunciated by the National Security Council; -T-O-P S-E-C-R-E-T

e. Make arrangements with the appropriate Departments and Agencies for such cover support as may be needed by the Central Intelligence, and coordinate any arrangements for such support that may be required by other Departments and Agencies to carry out the clandestine activities authorized in para. 2 above.

> NOTE : The above paragraph and sub-paragraphs combine the substance of paras. 5, 6, and 8 of the 9 July draft but is designed to spell out more clearly the DCI actions involved, i.e., coordination, establishment of procedures, inviting of non-IAC members to sit in when matters of concern to them are under consideration, and arrangement of cover. It also applies the feature of "consultation with the IAC", only to the act of establishing procedures for coordination as it should be obvious that the DCI is not expected to consult with the IAC every time he takes some action to carry out the coordination for which the MSC has made him responsible.

6. In support of the services of common concern provided by the Central Intelligence Agency, the Departments and Agencies shall:

a. Contribute on a continuing basis to the central indices and records of foreign intelligence information maintained by the Central Intelligence all pertinent material collected by them;

b. Assist the Central Intelligence Agency in its conduct of espionage by providing continuous and timely guidance, specific collection requirements, and assessments of the information collected.

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ECTE: This paragraph is designed to combine the substance of the last sentence of para. 4 and of para. 7 in the 9 July draft as they are responsibilities of the other Departments and Agencies in support of CIA. 7. To promote the efficiency and effectiveness of the U. S. clandestine effort, the Central Intelligence Agency as a service of common concern shall provide to Departments and Agencies engaged in clandestine activities authorized by this directive, such operational guidance and information, technical support and training as may be practicable.

> NOTE: This is to further establish the CIA as the national clandestine service by giving it a specific responsibility to actively support the other Departments and Agencies to the end that their clandestine activities will be carried out with the same high degree of efficiency and effectiveness as our own.

8. In a foreign area other than an active theater of war where U. S. forces are engaged, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U. S. representative appropriately advised of U. S. espionage and counterintelligence activities conducted in or from the area.

9. In a foreign area where major U. S. military commands are stationed, the designated representative of the Director of Central Intelligence shall keep the senior U. S. military commanders informed of the espionage and counterintelligence operations conducted by the Central Intelligence Agency in or from the area in direct support of the commanders.

> EOIS: The above paragraphs are identical with paras. 9 and 10 of the 9 July draft except that in line 2 of old para. 9 I have removed the words "in combat" as being unnecessary and further to make the text comparable with that appearing in the command relations agreement between the DCI and the JCS.

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10. In active theaters of war where U. S. forces are engaged, or when the President directs:

a.
