18th Leader of Yale

Angelo Bartlett Giamatti

NEW HAVEN, Dec. 20—A new legend is now under looms over the dining hall at Ezra Stiles, one of Yale's oldest graduate colleges. The aged old mouse head has been decorated for the holidays with lights and tinsel garlands wound through its 15-point antlers. It is the only decoration on the walls of the dining hall, and below it is a brass plaque explaining its presence. It is the "A. Bartlett Giamatti Memorial Moose," according to the polished plaque, and it stands as proof that in its selection today of a new president, Yale has not followed a stereotype of electing stuffy, blue-blooded leaders.

When the students at Ezra Stiles found out in 1972 that their master was departing with orders that his picture not be hung at the college, as had been the tradition with the master in every college, they unearthed the mouse head as a replacement, to the delight of Professor Giamatti.

In his 11 years as professor here, Yale's 18th president, one of the country's leading scholars in English and comparative literature, has captured the respect of faculty and students, not only for his academic excellence, but also for his style.

Never an athlete himself, Mr. Giamatti is an avid sports fan with undying loyalty to the Boston Red Sox. At the Connecticut hotel where he often picks up his daughter, Elena, from classes, he is a familiar figure in his Red Sox cap.

He is one of the founders of the ballet company and is currently cast along with his daughter and one of his two sons in "The Nutcracker Suite." In a nondancing role, he plays a dashing version of Herr Drosselmeir, the rymaker. Having previously declined other roles with the ballet, he made his debut in New London, Conn., earlier this month and is scheduled for three more matinees next week.

Much fuss is likely to be made over Angelo Bartlett Giamatti for being the first "ethnic" president of Yale, as well as its youngest, but his mother is Anglo-Saxon, and he was raised in classic Ivy League fashion. Born in Boston on April 14, 1938, he is the son of Mary Claybaugh Walton and Valentine Giamatti, Yale Class of 1932 and now professor-emeritus of Italian at Mount Holyoke College.

"He came by his interest in literature naturally," Dr. Giamatti's father said. "We talked about 'The Divine Comedy' over dinner, and it was clear from the

president is going to have to initiate some cost-cutting measures, which will inevitably lead to bitterness in some corners.

'Medicine' From 'One of Our Own'

"It's going to be much easier to take this medicine from one of our own," a faculty member said, noting his pleasure that Yale presidency was given to a Yale man "than to have it forced on us by an outsider."

"I'm glad the Yale Corporation picked someone a little independent, a little impudent, a little brusque," said Romona Pena, an associate Roman Catholic chaplain at Yale. "It's good to have someone who really cares about students."

When he officially takes over the university next July, Dr. Giamatti and his wife, Toni, and their three children—Marcus, 16; Elena, 13 and Paul, 11—will move their family across town from their modest gray frame house to the lavish brick Yale presidential residence on Hillhouse Avenue. According to his father, Dr. Giamatti is agonized with the decision to give up his writing and teaching to take on the demanding job of administering the university.

"I certainly didn't want to push him into it," Dr. Giamatti's father said of his conversation with his son yesterday. Clearly pleased at the decision he added with a chuckle that "when he was working his way through the university during the depression, he never believed I would have a so chosen as president of Yale."

Proposed Plan of the Renaissance

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"A human being as president of a university—my God what will that be like," quipped Donald Kagan, a history professor and master of another college, when he learned yesterday of Dr. Giamatti's pending appointment.

As a scholar, his main interest is in the Renaissance, with emphasis on the literature of Italy and England, specifically in Spenser and Renaissance epic poetry, and in medieval literature, particularly Provençal poetry and Dante.

And although he is a senior professor and lecturer of the humanities division of the faculty of arts and sciences, he takes great pride and enjoyment in teaching an introductory literature course for freshmen.

Maldwin Drummond, a freshman enrolled in one of Mr. Giamatti's courses, says:

"I've been educated in London and Paris, and he's the best English teacher I've ever had. He makes you excited about the subject even if you're not."

Many students refuse to take his course for credit because he is known as such a tough marker. However, his classes are always filled with people auditing the course.

His Writings Vary

His varied interests are demonstrated most clearly in his writings. For Harper's magazine he has discoursed on Muhammad Ali. His first book "The Earthly Paradise and the Renaissance Epoch," was followed by "Play of Double Senses: Spenser's Faerie Queene." He was the general editor for the three-volume anthology "Western Literature," and he felt compelled to join the public furor over Tom Seaver's

beginning that he had a tremendous aptitude for languages and literature."

While his father was on sabbatical in Italy, Angelo Giamatti attended the International School of Rome. And he is a graduate of Phillips Academy at Andover, Mass. He was graduated magna cum laude from Yale in 1960, and in 1964 received his Ph.D. in comparative literature from the university.

After graduation, he taught Italian and comparative literature at Princeton, and in the summer of 1966 he was a visiting professor of comparative literature at New York University. In 1967 he joined the Yale faculty as an assistant professor of English and a year later he was promoted to associate professor. From 1970 to 1972 he was master of Ezra Stiles College, and now holds the John Hay Whitney professorship. **1 11 18:2**

He is a conservative man, a "supreme skeptic," as one friend labeled him. Only this trait led to the slightest criticism of him today on the Yale campus, where his appointment has generally been greeted with glee.

While some members of the faculty have praised his proposal several years ago to abolish a senior program, which brought in such visiting lecturers as Howard Cosell, the sports broadcaster, and use the money instead for intensive writing courses, others have used that proposal as an example of his educational conservatism, which they fear will lead during his presidency to an end of experimental or innovative programming.
