Just a short note to thank you for all your help on both providing a reading list for the course on the CIA and the final field trip to Washington.

The students were quite impressed with the whole thing. Impressed that is, in the usual New York tough guy, cynical manner. They believed some of what they saw and about half of what they heard. 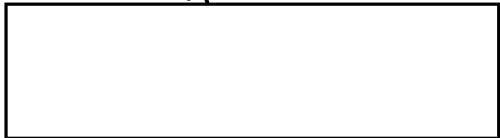

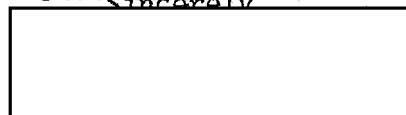
