IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

MAY 22, 1985

Mr. WHITTEN, by direction of the Committee on Appropriations, reported the following bill; which was committed to the Committee of the Whole House on the State of the Union and ordered to be printed

A BILL

Making supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1985, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any money
4 in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to provide sup-
5 plemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September
6 30, 1985, and for other purposes, namely:

1 TITLE I

2 CHAPTER I

3 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

4 COOPERATIVE STATE RESEARCH SERVICE

5 For an additional amount for necessary expenses of
6 "Cooperative State Research Service", \$300,000.

7 For an additional amount for a grant under the Act of
8 August 4, 1965, as amended (7 U.S.C. 450i) to the New
9 Mexico State University to help relocate the Fort Stanton
10 Experimental Station to another site, thereby making avail-
11 able land needed for a new Ruidoso airport; \$1,200,000 to
12 remain available until expended, to be available only upon
13 the legislative transfer of the land from the Bureau of Land
14 Management to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission or the
15 Village of Ruidoso and upon the enactment of an amendment
16 to the law establishing the airport improvement fund which
17 will permit Airport Trust Funds to help reimburse New
18 Mexico for its investment.

19 ANIMAL AND PLANT HEALTH INSPECTION SERVICE

20 For an additional amount for the Federal share of the
21 cooperative boll weevil eradication program, not to exceed
22 \$650,000; and for an additional amount to restore funds bor-
23 rowed from other programs in order to conduct a grasshopper
24 control program, \$10,000,000.

1 ECONOMIC RESEARCH SERVICE

2 For an additional amount for the Economic Research
3 Service to determine the losses suffered by United States
4 farm producers of agricultural products during the last decade
5 as a result of embargoes on the sale of United States agricul-
6 tural products and the failure to offer for sale in world mar-
7 kets commodities surplus to domestic needs at competitive
8 prices for use in determining what part of existing indebted-
9 ness of farmers should be suspended as a result of such for-
10 eign policy, \$500,000.

11 STATISTICAL REPORTING SERVICE

12 For an additional amount for "Statistical Reporting
13 Service", \$1,560,000, for the Quarterly Farm Labor Survey.

14 AGRICULTURAL STABILIZATION AND CONSERVATION

15 SERVICE

16 Effective May 1, 1985, none of the funds in this or any
17 other Act shall be available to close or relocate any State or
18 county office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conserva-
19 tion Service.

20 FEDERAL CROP INSURANCE CORPORATION

21 SUBSCRIPTION TO CAPITAL STOCK

22 To enable the Secretary of the Treasury to subscribe
23 and pay for capital stock of the Federal Crop Insurance Cor-
24 poration, as provided in section 504(a) of the Federal Crop
25 Insurance Act of 1980 (7 U.S.C. 1504), \$50,000,000.

1 FEDERAL CROP INSURANCE CORPORATION FUND

2 For emergency borrowing authority as authorized by
3 section 516(d) of the Federal Crop Insurance Act, as amend-
4 ed (Public Law 96-365), \$113,000,000 shall be available to
5 the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

6 COMMODITY CREDIT CORPORATION

7 REIMBURSEMENT FOR NET REALIZED LOSSES

8 For an additional amount to reimburse the Commodity
9 Credit Corporation for net realized losses sustained, but not
10 previously reimbursed, pursuant to the Act of August 17,
11 1961 (15 U.S.C. 713a-11, 713a-12), \$3,935,790,000.

12 OFFICE OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT POLICY

13 Of the funds made available by Public Law 98-473 for
14 the Office of Rural Development Policy, \$209,000 shall
15 remain available until September 30, 1986.

16 FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION

17 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

18 For an additional amount for "Salaries and expenses",
19 \$17,000,000, to provide for the review of farm loans held by
20 the Farmers Home Administration to determine, on a case-
21 by-case basis, which borrowers are unable to continue
22 making payments of principal and interest due to circum-
23 stances beyond their control and, thereby, qualify for tempo-
24 rary deferral of principal and interest and the foregoing of
25 foreclosure as authorized by law. Upon presentation of sub-

1 stantial evidence to the Secretary that a borrower qualifies,
2 payment of principal and interest shall be suspended and the
3 Secretary shall forego foreclosure of loans owed to the Feder-
4 al Government, as authorized by law. Other creditors shall be
5 requested to postpone payments due.

6 LOAN PROGRAMS

7 Effective November 12, 1983, and thereafter, the inter-
8 est rate charged by the Farmers Home Administration to
9 housing, farm, water and waste disposal, and community fa-
10 cility borrowers shall be the lower of the rates in effect at
11 either the time of loan approval or loan closing and any
12 Farmers Home Administration grant funds associated with
13 such loans shall be set in amount based on the interest rate in
14 effect at the time of loan approval.

15 FOOD AND NUTRITION SERVICE

16 FEEDING PROGRAM FOR WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN

17 (WIC)

18 The appropriation for the feeding program for women,
19 infants and children (WIC) contained in the conference
20 agreement on H.R. 5743 (House Report 98-1071), as en-
21 acted into law by reference in Public Law 98-473, is hereby
22 amended by striking out “, which shall be available only to
23 the extent an official budget request is transmitted to the
24 Congress”.

1 FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

2 For an additional amount for "Food stamp program",
3 \$318,856,000.

4 CHAPTER II

5 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

6 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8 (INCLUDING RESCISSION)

9 For an additional amount for "Salaries and expenses",
10 \$992,000, to remain available until expended.

11 Of available funds under this head, \$499,000 are re-
12 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
13 Act of 1984.

14 BUREAU OF THE CENSUS

15 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

16 (RESCISSION)

17 Of available funds under this head, \$241,000 are re-
18 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
19 Act of 1984.

20 ECONOMIC AND STATISTICAL ANALYSIS

21 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

22 (RESCISSION)

23 Of available funds under this head, \$433,000 are re-
24 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
25 Act of 1984.

1 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 (RESCISSION)

4 Of available funds under this head, \$120,000 are re-
5 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
6 Act of 1984.

7 INTERNATIONAL TRADE ADMINISTRATION

8 PARTICIPATION IN UNITED STATES EXPOSITIONS

9 (RESCISSION)

10 Of available funds under this head, \$6,000 are rescinded
11 pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction Act of
12 1984.

13 MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

14 MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

15 (RESCISSION)

16 Of available funds under this head, \$305,000 are re-
17 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
18 Act of 1984.

19 UNITED STATES TRAVEL AND TOURISM ADMINISTRATION

20 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

21 (RESCISSION)

22 Of available funds under this head, \$468,000 are re-
23 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
24 Act of 1984.

1 NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION
2 FISHERMEN'S CONTINGENCY FUND

3 For an additional amount for "Fishermen's Contingency
4 Fund", \$500,000, for carrying out the provisions of Title IV
5 of Public Law 95-372, as amended, to be derived from re-
6 ceipts collected pursuant to that Act, to remain available
7 until expended.

8 FISHERIES LOAN FUND
9 (RESCISSION)

10 Of available funds under this head, \$1,550,000 are re-
11 scinded.

12 FEDERAL SHIP FINANCING FUND, FISHING VESSELS

13 For necessary expenses of the "Federal Ship Financing
14 Fund, Fishing vessels", \$20,700,000, to remain available
15 until expended together with such sums as may be necessary
16 for the payment of interest, for payment to the Secretary of
17 the Treasury for debt reduction.

18 PATENT AND TRADEMARK OFFICE

19 SALARIES AND EXPENSES
20 (RESCISSION)

21 Of available funds under this head, \$1,472,000 are re-
22 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
23 Act of 1984.

1 NATIONAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND INFORMATION

2 ADMINISTRATION

3 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

4 (RESCISSION)

5 Of available funds under this head, \$183,000 are re-
6 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
7 Act of 1984.

8 PUBLIC TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES, PLANNING,

9 AND CONSTRUCTION

10 (RESCISSION)

11 Of the funds made available under this head, \$32,000
12 are rescinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduc-
13 tion Act of 1984.

14 RELATED AGENCIES

15 DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

16 MARITIME ADMINISTRATION

17 OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

18 (DISAPPROVAL OF DEFERRAL)

19 The Congress disapproves the proposed deferral D85-
20 54 relating to the Department of Transportation, Maritime
21 Administration, "Operations and Training" as set forth in the
22 message of February 6, 1985, which was transmitted to the
23 Congress by the President.

24 GENERAL PROVISION

25 None of the funds provided in this or any other Act shall
26 be used for the enforcement of any rule with respect to the

1 repayment of construction differential subsidy for the perma-
2 nent release of vessels from the restrictions in section 506 of
3 the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, as amended: *Provided*, That
4 such funds may be used to the extent such expenditure re-
5 lates to a rule which conforms to statutory standards hereaf-
6 ter enacted by Congress.

7 FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION

8 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

9 The Federal Communications Commission is authorized
10 to expend such funds as may be required in fiscal years 1986
11 and 1987 out of appropriations for fiscal years 1986 and
12 1987 for the Federal Communications Commission, not to
13 exceed \$5,000,000, to relocate its Fort Lauderdale, Florida,
14 Monitoring Station within the State of Florida, to include all
15 necessary expenses such as options to purchase land, acqui-
16 sition of land, lease-back of the present monitoring station
17 pending acquisition and construction of a new monitoring sta-
18 tion, architectural and engineering services, construction of a
19 new monitoring station and related facilities, moving ex-
20 penses, and all other costs associated with the relocation of
21 the monitoring station and personnel.

22 The Federal Communications Commission shall prompt-
23 ly declare the present monitoring station (including land and
24 structures which will not be relocated) excess to the General
25 Services Administration for disposition. The General Services

1 Administration shall sell such property and structures on an
2 expedited basis, including provisions for lease-back as re-
3 quired, and shall compensate the Commission from the pro-
4 ceeds of the sale all costs associated with the relocation of
5 the Fort Lauderdale Monitoring Station to another location,
6 not to exceed \$5,000,000.

7 Any excess funds received by the General Services Ad-
8 ministration from the sale of the present property, less any
9 funds reimbursed to the Federal Communications Commis-
10 sion, and less normal and reasonable charges by the General
11 Services Administration for costs associated with the sale of
12 the present property, shall be deposited to the general fund of
13 the Treasury.

14 The authority under this Act with respect to the reloca-
15 tion of the Fort Lauderdale Monitoring Station shall (1)
16 extend through fiscal year 1987, and (2) be in addition to any
17 limits on expenditures for land and structures specified in the
18 Commission's appropriation for fiscal years 1986 and 1987.

19 FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION

20 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

21 For an additional amount for "Salaries and Expenses",
22 \$3,811,000, to remain available until September 30, 1986.

1 SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 (RESCISSION)

4 Of available funds under this head, \$27,601,000 are
5 rescinded.

6 BUSINESS LOAN AND INVESTMENT FUND

7 For additional capital for the "Business Loan and In-
8 vestment Fund", \$27,601,000, to remain available without
9 fiscal year limitation.

10 DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

11 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

12 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

13 (RESCISSION)

14 Of available funds under this head, \$166,000 are re-
15 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
16 Act of 1984.

17 WORKING CAPITAL FUND

18 (RESCISSION)

19 All funds made available under this head in Public Law
20 98-411 are rescinded.

21 UNITED STATES PAROLE COMMISSION

22 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

23 For an additional amount for "Salaries and Expenses",
24 \$100,000.

1 LEGAL ACTIVITIES

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, GENERAL LEGAL ACTIVITIES

3 (INCLUDING RESCISSION)

4 For an additional amount for "Salaries and expenses,
5 general legal activities", \$874,000.

6 Of available funds under this head, \$470,000 are re-
7 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
8 Act of 1984.

9 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, ANTITRUST DIVISION

10 (RESCISSION)

11 Of available funds under this head, \$65,000 are rescind-
12 ed pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction Act of
13 1984.

14 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, UNITED STATES ATTORNEYS

15 AND MARSHALS

16 (INCLUDING RESCISSION)

17 For an additional amount for "Salaries and expenses,
18 United States attorneys and marshals", \$11,003,000, of
19 which \$2,065,000 shall remain available until September 30,
20 1986.

21 Of available funds under this head, \$889,000 are re-
22 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
23 Act of 1984.

1 SUPPORT OF UNITED STATES PRISONERS

2 In Public Law 98-411 delete the appropriation lan-
3 guage under the heading "Support of United States Prison-
4 ers" and substitute the following:

5 For support of United States prisoners in non-Federal
6 institutions, \$53,240,000; and in addition, \$10,000,000 shall
7 be available under the Cooperative Agreement Program for
8 the purposes of renovating, constructing, and equipping State
9 and local correctional facilities: *Provided*, That amounts
10 made available for constructing any local correctional facility
11 shall not exceed the cost of constructing space for the aver-
12 age Federal prisoner population to be housed in the facility,
13 or in other facilities in the same correctional system, as pro-
14 jected by the Attorney General: *Provided further*, That fol-
15 lowing agreement on or completion of any federally assisted
16 correctional facility construction, the availability of the space
17 acquired for Federal prisoners with these Federal funds shall
18 be assured and the per diem rate charged for housing Federal
19 prisoners in the assured space shall not exceed operating
20 costs for the period of time specified in the cooperative
21 agreement.

22 FEES AND EXPENSES OF WITNESSES

23 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

24 For an additional amount for "Fees and expenses of
25 witnesses", \$1,300,000, and in addition, \$1,500,000 to be
26 derived by transfer from the Support of United States Prison-

1 ers: *Provided*, That of the amount appropriated under the
2 above head for fiscal year 1985, not to exceed \$850,000
3 shall be available for planning, construction, renovation, and
4 repair of buildings for protected witness facilities.

5 ASSETS FORFEITURE FUND

6 For expenses authorized by 28 U.S.C. 524, as amended
7 by the Comprehensive Forfeiture Act of 1984, such sums as
8 may be necessary to be derived from the Department of Jus-
9 tice Assets Forfeiture Fund: *Provided*, That in the aggregate,
10 not to exceed \$5,000,000 shall be available for expenses au-
11 thorized by subsections (c)(1)(B), (c)(1)(E), and (c)(1)(F) of
12 that section.

13 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, COMMUNITY RELATIONS

14 SERVICE

15 (RESCISSION)

16 Of available funds under this head, \$43,000 are rescind-
17 ed pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction Act of
18 1984.

21 For an additional amount for "Organized Crime Drug
22 Enforcement", \$635,000.

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 (INCLUDING RESCISSION)

4 For an additional amount for "Salaries and expenses",
5 \$2,900,000, to remain available until September 30, 1986:
6 *Provided*, That \$10,000,000 provided in Public Law 98-166
7 for the relocation of the Washington field office within the
8 District of Columbia shall remain available until expended.

9 Of available funds under this head, \$3,505,000 are re-

12 United States Prisoners”.

13 Of available funds under this head, \$451,000 are re-
14 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
15 Act of 1984.

23 Of the unobligated funds available under the “Justice
24 assistance” account for the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency
25 Prevention Act, \$800,000 shall be made available for Emer-
26 gency Federal Law Enforcement Assistance authorized by

1 Public Law 98-473, notwithstanding the provisions of sec-
2 tions 222(b), 223(b), and 228(e) of title I of the Juvenile Jus-
3 tice and Delinquency Prevention Act, as amended.

5 COMMISSION ON THE BICENTENNIAL OF THE UNITED
6 STATES CONSTITUTION

7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8 For necessary expenses of the Commission on the Bi-
9 centennial of the United States Constitution, authorized by
10 Public Law 98-101 (97 Stat. 719-723), \$331,000 to remain
11 available until expended: *Provided*, That the Department of
12 Justice shall be reimbursed for all salaries and other expenses
13 incurred by the Department directly related to the establish-
14 ment of the Commission.

15 COMMISSION ON CIVIL RIGHTS

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 In the appropriation language under the above head in
18 Public Law 98-411, the amounts earmarked are revised as
19 follows: hearings, legal analysis and legal services are in-
20 creased to \$2,063,000; publications preparation and dissemi-
21 nation is decreased to \$747,000; Federal evaluation is de-
22 creased to \$1,011,000; and, the clearinghouse library is de-
23 creased to \$397,000.

9 Of available funds under this head, \$2,432,000 are re-
10 scinded pursuant to section 2901 of the Deficit Reduction
11 Act of 1984.

12 ACQUISITION, OPERATION, AND MAINTENANCE OF

13 BUILDINGS ABROAD

14 For an additional amount for "Acquisition, Operation,
15 and Maintenance of Buildings Abroad", \$167,579,000, to
16 remain available until expended.

17 ACQUISITION, OPERATION, AND MAINTENANCE OF

18 BUILDINGS ABROAD

19 (SPECIAL FOREIGN CURRENCY PROGRAM)

20 For an additional amount for "Acquisition, Operation,
21 and Maintenance of Buildings Abroad (Special Foreign Cur-
22 rency Program)", \$2,000,000, to remain available until
23 expended.

EMERGENCIES IN THE DIPLOMATIC AND CONSULAR
SERVICE

3 For an additional amount for “Emergencies in the Dip-
4 lomatic and Consular Service”, \$2,000,000, to remain avail-
5 able until expended, for rewards for information concerning
6 terrorist acts in accordance with section 86, State Depart-
7 ment Basic Authorities Act of 1956, as amended (Public Law
8 98-533).

9 PAYMENT TO THE FOREIGN SERVICE RETIREMENT AND
10 DISABILITY FUND

11 For an additional amount for “Payment to the Foreign
12 Service retirement and disability fund”, \$5,399,000.

13 RELATED AGENCIES

14 ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT AGENCY

15 ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT ACTIVITIES

16 For an additional amount for “Arms Control and Disar-
17 mament Activities”, \$3,946,000.

18 BOARD FOR INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING

19 GRANTS AND EXPENSES

20 For an additional amount for the Board for International
21 Broadcasting, "Grants and Expenses", \$13,753,000: *Pro-*
22 *vided*, That notwithstanding section 8(b) of the Board for
23 International Broadcasting Act of 1973, as amended, the
24 amounts placed in reserve, or which would be placed in re-
25 serve, in fiscal year 1985 pursuant to that section, shall be
26 available to the Board for carrying out that Act until Sep-

1 tember 30, 1986, of which (1) \$4,900,000 shall be for the

23 Funds appropriated under this head in the Second Sup-
24 plemental Appropriations Act, 1984 (Public Law 98-396),
25 for the installation of security systems, shall be made avail-
26 able also for the acquisition and installation of additional

1 communications equipment by the Office of the Marshal, Su-
2 preme Court of the United States: *Provided further*, That
3 said equipment shall be under the jurisdiction of and main-

14 the Government to construction), to remain available until
15 expended, \$148,500,000 of Construction, General funds and
16 \$1,500,000 of Flood Control, Mississippi River and Tributary
17 ies, Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Mis-
18 souri, and Tennessee funds; of which \$23,000,000 shall be
19 derived from the Inland Waterways Trust Fund; except that
20 the Chief of Engineers is directed to proceed with planning,
21 design, engineering, and construction as described in the ac-

4 San Luis Rey River, California; Fountain Creek at Pueblo,
5 Colorado; Dade County, North of Haulover Beach Park,
6 Florida; Tampa Harbor, Branch Channels, Florida; Tampa
7 Harbor East Bay Channel Maintenance, Florida; Savannah
8 Harbor Widening, Georgia; Kahoma Stream, Hawaii; Locks
9 and Dam No. 26, Alton, Illinois and Missouri Second Lock,
10 including Environmental Management; Moline, Illinois; Falls
11 of the Ohio National Wildlife Conservation Area, Indiana and
12 Kentucky; Des Moines Recreational River and Greenbelt,
13 Iowa; Atchafalaya Basin, Louisiana; Mississippi River Ship
14 Channel, Gulf to Baton Rouge, Louisiana; Pearl River, Sli-
15 dell, St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana; Revere Beach, Massa-
16 chusetts; Town Brook, Quincy and Braintree, Massachusetts;
17 Baltimore Harbor and Channels, Maryland and Virginia;
18 Jonesport Harbor, Maine; Bassett Creek, Minnesota;
19 Chaska, Minnesota; Gulfport Harbor, Mississippi; Missouri
20 National Recreational River, Nebraska and South Dakota;
21 Barnegat Inlet, New Jersey; Liberty State Park Levee and
22 Seawall, New Jersey; Ardsley, New York; Ellicott Creek,
23 New York; Kill Van Kull, Newark Bay Channel, New York
24 and New Jersey; Moriches Inlet, New York; Port Ontario,
25 New York; Randleman Lake, North Carolina; Cleveland

1 Harbor, Ohio; Geneva-on-the-Lake, Ohio; Red River Chlo-
2 ride Control, Oklahoma and Texas: *Provided*, That Section
3 201 of the Flood Control Act of 1970, as amended by Sec-
4 tion 153 of the Water Resources Development Act of 1976,
5 is amended by striking out the last sentence under the head-
6 ing "Arkansas-Red River Basin"; Parker Lake, Oklahoma;
7 Bonneville Navigation Lock, Oregon and Washington; Bon-
8 neville Power Units, Oregon and Washington; Monongahela
9 River, Point Marion (Lock No. 8), Pennsylvania and West
10 Virginia; Cowanesque Lake Modification, Pennsylvania;
11 Monongahela River, Grays Landing (Lock No. 7), Pennsylva-
12 nia; Tamaqua, Pennsylvania; Ponce Harbor, Puerto Rico;
13 Clear Creek, Texas; Colorado River and Tributaries, Boggy
14 Creek at Austin, Texas; Freeport Harbor, Texas; Lake
15 Wichita, Holliday Creek at Wichita Falls, Texas; Town Bluff
16 Hydropower, Texas; Little Dell Lake, Utah; Norfolk Harbor,
17 Virginia; Richmond, Virginia, Local Protection Project; Vir-
18 ginia Beach Streams, Canal No. 2, Virginia; Gallipolis Locks
19 and Dam, West Virginia and Ohio (Ohio River). Initiation of
20 construction of these projects is subject, where appropriate,
21 to enactment of needed authorizing legislation. In the event
22 the Ninety-ninth Congress enacts legislation specifying the
23 requirements of local cooperation for water resources devel-
24 opment projects under the jurisdiction of the Department of
25 the Army, such requirements shall be applicable to projects

1 for which funds are herein provided, notwithstanding any
2 agreement for local cost sharing in excess of amounts speci-
3 fied in the relevant project authorizations. The initiation of
4 inland waterways projects identified for planning, design, en-
5 gineering, and construction in this Act may be funded from
6 sums available in the Inland Waterways Trust Fund, estab-
7 lished by the Inland Waterways Revenue Act of 1978 (Title
8 II of Public Law 95-502), notwithstanding the second sen-
9 tence of Section 204 of such Act.

10 GENERAL INVESTIGATIONS

11 For an additional amount for "General Investigations",
12 to remain available until expended, \$1,200,000 with which
13 the Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engi-
14 neers, is directed to undertake studies of the Buffalo Harbor,
15 New York; St. Petersburg Harbor, Florida; Tangier Island,
16 Virginia; South Kohala water supply, Hawaii; West Onslow
17 Beach and New River Inlet, North Carolina; Meredosia,
18 Willow Creek, and Coon Run Drainage and Levee District,
19 Illinois, (AE&D); and a reconnaissance study of the feasibili-
20 ty of making the Wabash River navigable under the author-
21 ized Wabash River Basin Comprehensive Study; and in addi-
22 tion, the Secretary of the Army is directed to proceed with
23 the feasibility phase of the Brunswick Harbor, Georgia, study
24 at full Federal expense, using funds made available in Public
25 Law 98-360; and in addition, the Secretary of the Army,
26 acting through the Chief of Engineers, is directed to conduct

1 and complete the feasibility phase of the Red River Basin,
2 Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma Comprehensive
3 Study and the Arkansas River and Tributaries, South Cen-
4 tral and Southeast Areas of Oklahoma Comprehensive Study
5 in accordance with the directives contained in Public Law
6 98-63 and the House report accompanying this bill.

7 CONSTRUCTION, GENERAL

8 For an additional amount for "Construction, General",
9 to remain available until expended, \$7,500,000 for the con-
10 struction, at full Federal expense, of facilities at the Mill
11 Creek recreation area of the Tioga-Hammond Lakes project
12 in Pennsylvania which would typically be cost shared,
13 making a special effort to adapt such authorized facilities to
14 the specific needs of the handicapped, provided that local in-
15 terests develop specialized facilities to include buildings,
16 lodges, demonstration centers, and non-water oriented equip-
17 ment, and accept full responsibility for operation and mainte-
18 nance of the entire recreation area which must be made
19 available to the general public: *Provided*, That the Secretary
20 of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers, is au-
21 thorized and directed to utilize funds heretofore appropriated
22 for Construction, General to carry out engineering and design
23 and acquisition of land for Gallipolis Locks and Dam, Ohio
24 and West Virginia; Locks and Dam 26, Illinois and Missouri
25 Second Lock; Monongahela River, Grays Landing (Lock No.
26 7), Pennsylvania; Monongahela River, Point Marion (Lock

1 No. 8), Pennsylvania and West Virginia; William Bacon
2 Oliver Lock and Dam, Alabama; Bonneville Navigation
3 Lock, including necessary relocations, Oregon and Washing-
4 ton; and Winfield Lock and Dam, West Virginia.

5 FLOOD CONTROL AND COASTAL EMERGENCIES

6 For an additional amount for "Flood Control and Coast-
7 al Emergencies", \$25,000,000, to remain available until
8 expended.

9 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, GENERAL

10 For an additional amount for "Operation and Mainte-
11 nance, General", to remain available until expended,
12 \$2,600,000 with which the Corps of Engineers is directed to
13 construct recreation facilities at Sepulveda Dam, California.

14 GENERAL PROVISIONS

15 The Secretary of the Army is directed to construct
16 recreation facilities at the Ouachita and Black Rivers, Arkan-
17 sas and Louisiana; New Melones Lake, California; Saylorville
18 Lake, Iowa; Copan Lake, Oklahoma; and Sardis Lake, Okla-
19 homa, projects at full Federal expense, in accordance with
20 Public Law 98-360 (H. Rept. 98-866) using funds hereto-
21 fore or hereafter provided.

22 Within available funds, the Secretary of the Army,
23 acting through the Chief of Engineers, is authorized and di-
24 rected to perform necessary channel and associated work in
25 connection with the Turtle Creek, Pennsylvania, local pro-
26 tection project; and shall take such action as may be neces-

1 sary to remove accumulated snags and other debris blocking
2 the channel of the Hatchie River and its tributaries in the
3 vicinity of Bridge Creek and the Little Hatchie River in Mis-
4 sissippi; and shall take such action as may be necessary to
5 perform necessary channel and associated work in connection
6 with the Glencoe, Alabama, flood control project.

7 Notwithstanding any existing agreement, within funds
8 otherwise available for the Yazoo Basin, the Corps of Engi-
9 neers is directed to operate and maintain the McKinney
10 Bayou Pumping Plant in accordance with the provisions of
11 Public Law 678 of the Seventy-fourth Congress, approved
12 June 15, 1936, as amended by Public Law 526 of the Seven-
13 ty-ninth Congress, approved July 24, 1946, effective after
14 the date of enactment of this Act.

15 Section 105 of Public Law 98-360 is amended by strik-
16 ing the words "at a cost not to exceed \$450,000", and in-
17 serting in lieu thereof, the words "at an estimated cost of
18 \$735,000".

19 The Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of
20 Engineers, is directed to construct the beach erosion control
21 project for Langdon Park, Wilmette, Illinois, under the au-
22 thority of Section 103 of the River and Harbor Act of 1962,
23 as amended, and in accordance with the cost-sharing provi-
24 sions in the Final Detailed Project Report, dated September
25 1983, at a total estimated cost of \$270,000.

1 Section 14 of the Act of March 3, 1899 (30 Stat. 1152;
2 33 U.S.C. 408), is amended by inserting a colon in place of
3 the period at the end of the section and inserting thereafter:
4 *"Provided further, That the Secretary may, on the recom-*
5 *mendation of the Chief of Engineers, grant permission for the*
6 *alteration or permanent occupation or use of any of the afore-*
7 *mentioned public works when in the judgment of the Secre-*
8 *tary such occupation or use will not be injurious to the public*
9 *interest and will not impair the usefulness of such work."*

10 The Secretary of the Army is directed to initiate Con-
11 tinuation of Planning and Engineering studies for the
12 Maumee Bay State Park, Ohio, project at full Federal ex-
13 pense, using funds made available in Public Law 98-360.

14 The Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of
15 Engineers, shall grant, within ninety days of enactment of
16 this Act, to the University of Alabama at Huntsville the
17 funds appropriated to the Secretary of the Army pursuant to
18 Title I of Public Law 98-50 for the design and construction
19 of a Corps of Engineers learning facility at Huntsville, Ala-
20 bama. This grant shall be made to the University of Alabama
21 at Huntsville subject to the conditions that the University
22 will convey the grant funds to the Chief of Engineers to
23 design and construct the learning facility on lands owned by
24 the University of Alabama and the completed facility is to be
25 owned and maintained by the University and be operated by

1 the University and the Corps as a joint use facility, all ac-
2 cording to such specifications, terms, and cost sharing ar-
3 rangements for operation and maintenance as the University
4 of Alabama at Huntsville and the Secretary of the Army,
5 acting through the Chief of Engineers, may agree. The Sec-
6 retary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers,
7 shall report to the Committees on Appropriations of the
8 United States House of Representatives and the United
9 States Senate on a monthly basis on the status of the re-
10 quired agreements and the construction of the learning facili-
11 ty until such time as the facility is constructed and operation-
12 al at the University of Alabama at Huntsville.

13 The authorization for the Sardis Lake project, Oklaho-
14 ma, contained in Section 203 of the Flood Control Act of
15 1962, as amended by Section 108 of the Energy and Water
16 Development Appropriation Act of 1982 is hereby amended
17 to authorize and direct the Secretary of the Army, acting
18 through the Chief of Engineers, to plan, design, and con-
19 struct access road improvements to the existing road from the
20 west end of Sardis Lake to Daisy, Oklahoma, at an estimated
21 Federal cost of \$10,000,000 and the State or political subdi-
22 vision shall agree to operate and maintain said facilities at
23 their own expense.

24 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Secre-
25 tary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers, is

1 hereby authorized to enter into a purchase contract for the
2 acquisition of new buildings and appurtenant facilities for the
3 United States Army Engineer District, Walla Walla, Wash-
4 ington. Such buildings and facilities shall be constructed on a
5 suitable site in the Walla Walla, Washington area, which the
6 Chief of Engineers is authorized to acquire for that purpose.
7 The contract shall provide for the payment of the purchase
8 price, which shall not exceed \$12,000,000, and reasonable
9 interest thereon, by lease or installment payments over a
10 period not to exceed 25 years. The contract shall further pro-
11 vide that the title to the building and facilities shall vest in
12 the United States at or before the expiration of the contract
13 term upon fulfillment of the terms and conditions of the
14 contract.

15 The Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of
16 Engineers, is authorized to design, construct, operate, and
17 maintain a Federal project for reduction of both flood damage
18 and navigation maintenance on the Toutle, Cowlitz and Co-
19 lumbia Rivers, Washington. Specifically, the Secretary of the
20 Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers is authorized to
21 construct a single stage retention structure near the conflu-
22 ence of the Toutle and Green Rivers with such design fea-
23 tures as the Chief of Engineers determines to be advisable,
24 including justified measures to mitigate for adverse environ-
25 mental impacts associated with the project; except that,

1 based on the results of Continuation of Planning and Engi-
2 neering studies, the Secretary of the Army may select and
3 implement a staged sediment retention structure at the con-
4 fluence of the Toutle and Green Rivers or dredging alterna-
5 tive on the Toutle, Cowlitz and Columbia Rivers if he deter-
6 mines that continuing monitoring of sedimentation and fur-
7 ther analysis of benefits and costs provide compelling and
8 convincing new evidence to justify selection of a staged re-
9 tention structure or dredging alternative.

10 Prior to initiation of measures authorized by this sec-
11 tion, non-Federal interests shall agree to:

12 (1) convey or otherwise provide to the United
13 States, all lands, easements, and rights-of-way which
14 the Chief of Engineers determines to be necessary for
15 project construction and maintenance, including borrow
16 sites for the removal of material needed for retaining
17 works and disposal sites for the disposal of excavated
18 material;

19 (2) accomplish any alteration or relocation of
20 buildings, roads, bridges, or other structures or utilities
21 which the Chief of Engineers determines to be neces-
22 sary in connection with implementation of the project;

23 (3) in the event local interests are unable to
24 comply with requirements (1) or (2) above in a timely
25 manner, provide a cash contribution to the United

1 States, at such times and in such amounts as the Chief
2 of Engineers determines to be necessary to allow ac-
3 quisition of the property by the United States in ac-
4 cordance with project construction schudules;

5 (4) hold and save the United States free from
6 damage due to design, construction, operation, and
7 maintenance of the project except damages due to the
8 fault or negligence of the United States or its
9 contractors;

10 (5) operate and maintain any Federally undertak-
11 en mitigation project which the Chief of Engineers de-
12 termines to be justified; and,

13 (6) maintain all dredged material disposal sites.

14 All items of local cooperation shall be provided at the
15 time needed, as determined by the Chief of Engineers, and
16 without cost to the United States; except in the event the
17 Secretary of the Army selects a staged sediment retention
18 structure or dredging alternative rather than the single stage
19 sediment retention structure, any increase this selection
20 causes in the cost of local cooperation requirements, as deter-
21 mined by the Secretary of the Army, will be reimbursed by
22 the Federal Government.

23 Any goods and services purchased by the United States
24 in connection with the project authorized pursuant to this
25 section shall not be subject to the tax imposed by Chapters

1 82.04, 82.08, and 82.14 of the Revised Code of Washington
2 and made applicable to contractors of the United States
3 pursuant to Section 82.04.190(6) of the Revised Code of
4 Washington.

5 The Corps of Engineers is authorized and directed to
6 initiate Continuation of Planning and Engineering for the
7 Virginia Beach, Virginia beach erosion and hurricane protec-
8 tion project, using available funds.

9 From funds available to the Corps of Engineers such
10 sums as may be required shall be made available to complete
11 the recreation facilities on the northern part of the Tennes-
12 see-Tombigbee navigation project as described in Volume 2,
13 Appendix D of the Final Supplement to the Environmental
14 Impact Statement provided to the Environmental Protection
15 Agency and the United States District Court but under the
16 same terms and conditions as those initiated prior to fiscal
17 year 1983.

18 From Construction, General funds heretofore or herein
19 appropriated, the Secretary of the Army, acting through the
20 Chief of Engineers, shall pay the judgment and any associat-
21 ed interest, resulting from the decision of the Engineer Board
22 of Contract Appeals in ENG BCA Docket Number 4815
23 (April 16, 1985), notwithstanding the limitation on allotment
24 of Section 107 of the River and Harbor Act of 1960 (Public
25 Law No. 86-645), as amended (33 U.S.C. 577). Nothing in

1 this provision affects the obligations of the non-Federal spon-
2 sor to the United States of America for the work involved.

3 The Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of
4 Engineers, is directed to construct the Miami Harbor, Bay-
5 front Park, Florida project under the authority of Public
6 Laws 98-50 and 98-360 except that the east-west connec-
7 tor, known as the promenade, which is necessary for park
8 development, shall be at Federal expense.

9 DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

10 BUREAU OF RECLAMATION

11 CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

12 For an additional amount for the "Construction pro-
13 gram", to remain available until expended, \$20,850,000; of
14 which \$1,550,000 shall be available for transfers to the
15 Upper Colorado River Basin Fund as authorized by section 5
16 of the Act of April 11, 1956 (43 U.S.C. 620d): *Provided*,
17 That of the total appropriated, the amount for program ac-
18 tivities which can be financed by the Reclamation Fund may
19 be derived from that Fund: *Provided further*, That of the
20 total appropriated, \$8,300,000 is appropriated pursuant to
21 the Snyder Act (25 U.S.C. 13), to be expended by the
22 Bureau of Reclamation for the purpose of designing and initi-
23 ating construction of the Headgate Rock Hydroelectric
24 project, Arizona: *Provided further*, That none of the funds
25 made available by this Act may be obligated or expended for

1 construction of the Animas-LaPlata Participating Project,
2 Colorado-New Mexico until: (1) an agreement has been exe-
3 cuted between the Secretary of the Interior and non-Federal
4 entities in Colorado and/or New Mexico providing for such
5 non-Federal entities to contribute a reasonable portion of the
6 total project costs; and, (2) such agreement has been submit-
7 ted to the Congress and 120 calendar days have elapsed. The
8 authority of the Secretary of the Interior to obligate or
9 expend the funds made available for the Animas-LaPlata
10 Project in this Act shall lapse if the agreement required by
11 this paragraph has not been reached by September 30, 1986.

12 INDEPENDENT AGENCY

13 TENNESSEE VALLEY AUTHORITY

14 TENNESSEE VALLEY AUTHORITY FUND

15 There is appropriated an additional \$5,000,000, to
16 remain available until expended, for the "Tennessee Valley
17 Authority Fund" for the conduct of a demonstration project
18 for the construction of a main water transmission line.

19 DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY

20 The Congress finds that the timely construction, oper-
21 ation, and use of a third 500 kV AC transmission line be-
22 tween the Pacific Northwest and California in accordance
23 with the Memorandum of Understanding for the California-
24 Oregon Transmission Project dated December 19, 1984, as
25 approved and conditioned by the Secretary of Energy's

1 Memorandum of Decision dated February 7, 1985, and by
2 the Secretary's letter to the Chairman of the House Appro-
3 priations Subcommittee on Energy and Water dated May 20,
4 1985, and a May 4, 1985 letter from the Energy Department
5 Acting General Counsel (the "Memorandum"), will be of sig-
6 nificant benefit to both regions and is just and reasonable and
7 in the public interest. However, neither this Act nor the
8 Memorandum shall in any way affect the authorities or poli-
9 cies of the Bonneville Power Administration regarding
10 wholesale power rates, transmission rates, or transmission
11 access.

12 Sections 4, 4C, and 16 of the Clayton Act, as amended
13 (38 Stat. 730), shall not apply to the Memorandum. Further-
14 more, there shall be no modification under the Federal Power
15 Act, as amended (40 Stat. 1063), of the Memorandum or of
16 mutually agreed upon contractual provisions which imple-
