



MARTIN: The U.S. used them in Grenada to rocket enemy positions. Pentagon analysts say the North Koreans could use them to infiltrate South Korea, which has 200 Hughes helicopters of its own. Painted to look exactly like the South Korean version, the North Korean helicopters could slip across the border and create havoc behind the lines. As a precaution against such an attack, sources say South Korea temporarily grounded all its Hughes helicopters.

The helicopters were smuggled into North Korea at a time when U.S. Intelligence has detected a major redeployment of North Korean troops within 75 miles of the DMZ.

But the North Korean military is not invincible. CBS News has learned that last Wednesday a North Korean submarine, like this one, sank with all hands aboard in 350 feet of water. A small flotilla of Soviet and North Korean ships is trying to raise the sub, but U.S. analysts believe the crew has perished by now.
