Proxmire Assails CIA On Soviet Arms Cost

Faulty analysis by the CIA misrepresents increases in Soviet defense—spending, resulting in
exaggerated pressure to boost U.S.
military outlays, Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., charged yesteday.
In a speech on the Senate-floor,
Proxmire criticized as "a simple
fallacy" the CIA's use of dollar cost
analysis based on American-type
productivity. The method does not
consider pay differences or the
Soviet Union's lower economic efficiency, particularly in defense
production, he said.

"In truth," Proxmire said: "Soviet defense spending has been rising at a constant 3 percent and the Soviets do not outspend the United States by 30 to 50 percent as so often is reported in the press."

Proxmire chairman of a subcommittee dealing with Soviet and Chinese military spending made his attack one day after the CIA reported to Congress on Soviet defense spending.
