MOSCOW - A U.S. SENATE RESOLUTION CALLING FOR THE RELEASE OF THE IMPRISONED SOVIET HUMAN RIGHTS CAMPAIGNER ANATOLY SHCHARANSKY WOULD NOT BENEFIT HIM AND WOULD NOT IMPROVE SOVIET-AMERICAN RELATIONS, ACCORDING TO THE TASS NEWS AGENCY.

THE KREMLIN NEWS SERVICE IMPLIED MONDAY THAT THE RESOLUTION WAS A PLOY BY THE CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY "TO COME TO THE RESCUE OF THEIR AGENT." IT IS INAPPROPRIATE FOR THE SENATE TO INVOKE THE HELSINKI ACCORDS OF 1975, TASS SAID.

SHCHARANSKY, 32, WAS CONVICTED ON CHARGES OF ESPIONAGE IN 1978 AND WAS SENTENCED TO THREE YEARS OF PRISON AND 10 YEARS IN A LABOR CAMP.

A TASS COMMENTARY SAID HE WAS "PUSHED TO THESE CRIMES ... BY NONE OTHER THAN THE U.S. SPECIAL SERVICES." THE NEWS AGENCY SAID HIS GUILT WAS "IRREFUTABLY PROVED" AND THE SENATE RESOLUTION IS AN ATTEMPT TO INTERFERE IN DOMESTIC SOVIET AFFAIRS.

"TO PUT IT STRAIGHT," THE COMMENTARY ADDED, "THIS DOES NOT IN THE LEAST HELP TO IMPROVE SOVIET-AMERICAN RELATIONS AND, BY THE WAY, DOES NOT BENEFIT SHCHARANSKY HIMSELF."

SHCHARANSKY'S MOTHER TOLD WESTERN NEWSMEN IN MOSCOW LAST MONTH THAT HE HAD BEEN PLACED IN SOLITARY CONFINEMENT AT HIS LABOR CAMP IN THE URALS. HE IS NOT ALLOWED TO HAVE ANY VISITORS THIS YEAR.

HIS MOTHER SAID THE AUTHORITIES SEEM BENT ON HIS MORAL AND PHYSICAL DESTRUCTION.
