## **New Major Snowfall Covers D.C. Region**

Storm Dumps Inches on Top of Icy Roads

The second major snowstorm in four days blanketed the Washington area yesterday, burying roads anew, snarling traffic and spoiling Super Sunday parties.

The metropolitan area awoke Sunday to light flurries, the precursor to an anticipated all-night snowfall that created a five-day weekend for thousands of area workers and schoolchildren.

National Weather Service forecasters predicted that snow would fall heavily throughout the night and taper off this morning, with accumulations of up to 12 inches. By 10 p.m., three inches had fallen in Washington and heavy snow continued to fall.

Schools will be closed in most jurisdictions throughout the area today.
