Reference is made to the conversation of January 6, 1946, between Golonel William H. Harris, and Lieutenant Golonel Glande D. Barton of the Gentral Intelligence Group and Mr. G. G. Gallan of this Bureau. Mhen arrangements were made between the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Gentral Intelligence Group for this Bureau to conduct inquiries concerning persons under consideration for employment by GIG, it was understood that these investigations would be referred to this Bureau at the rate of approximately one hundred a month.

On that basis, it was someonplated that they would be completed in approximately two weeks. Since the inception of the program, the number of cases referred to us have averaged almost twice this number.

In view of the fact that the number of investigations is considerably more than was originally contemplated, it is suggested, as mentioned by Mr. Gallan to Gelenel Herris, that the original agrangement be changed to provide that these investigations will be completed and the Gentral Intelligence Group advised of the results within thirty days after receipt of the requests to souch at the investigation by this Hursan. It is felt that such an errongement would constitute a much more practical basis of relationship between the Gentral Intelligence Group and the Federal Burean of Investigation conserving this motor.

Tour comments concerning this suggestion would be greatly appreciated.
