Cost of the National Security Act of 1947.

3 April 1947.

1. During the testimony this morning by General Morstad before the Senate Armed Services Committee, he was requested to furnish an over-all blueprint of the Office of the Secretary of National Defense, as well as a chart of the proposed organization of the Air Forces should the National Security Act be passed. The Army and Navy were asked to prepare estimates of the cost of the over-all bill. This would also include cooperative costs, showing the possible increases.

3. In view of the fact that the over-all cost of the bill would include a figure for the C.I.O., it is suggested that you contact General Morstad, so that he does not attempt to submit a figure for the C.I.O., and so that he will indicate to the Committee the problems arising from an on-the-record disclosure of our cost and size.

2. General Stilwell stated that the proposed amendment was submitted mainly to be used as the basis for negotiations. This proposal had been submitted to him by the Department of the Army, 130 Madison Avenue and the Bureau of the Budget.

In answer to the same question, General Morstad agreed that the amendment was originally to be hand written in, and that the one submitted by the War Department had had a hand in it or been made my suggestion. He stated, however, that he understood that no information would be furnished the White House.
