

RECORDED (Date 7-22-1944)

The Cuban Volunteers from the 50th of November Unit will be assigned to the task of receiving, in intense and concentrated special training, several leading men of the Cuban resistance. This special training will be to prepare all personnel for an extremely difficult mission that is based on a broad, realistic plan that considers the political, administrative, and military phases of land and air operations. This unit will be organized in order to initiate the primary phase of operations. In this primary phase, disregarding the present status of other available units, it will be the main force of guerrilla operations. The assigned mission for the unit once trained and indoctrinated is to serve as a mobile reception committee for the channeling of supplies and information to the better guerrilla bands and resistance groups operating within the unit's area of action. It is imperative that all airdrops and landings be under the control and supervision of specially trained personnel that have been indoctrinated physically by this Army. This is due to the time that is required to train participants from the committee personnel to a point of being fully indoctrinated before they can be used. In a more advanced phase, the unit will be able to move independently, following its own initiative and communication specialists, due to the fact that after the initial period of serving as a mobile reception committee, the unit will be able to maintain contact with the guerrilla elements as their only contact with the outside world. After this initial period of making a sustained effort to bring about the participation of the Cuban resistance in operations in proximity, if it is possible, at a certain point in time, the unit will become the headquarters element that directs all actions and operations throughout for the entire force.

Included in the mobile unit's mission is the protection of Cuban territory so as to serve as refuge to the newly recruited elements that will be organized into the unit. It is in a secure and effective operational status. The unit will be in a position

state of readiness to never contact with one guerrilla unit so that it may serve as a recognized committee for another more distant unit.

Inability after being infiltrated into China, the unit will proceed to conduct numerous reconnaissance patrols of the area in which it plans to conduct future operations.

Among the numerous objectives of the reconnaissance patrols is intelligence relating to:

- (1) Enemy methods of operation
- (2) Attitudes of local inhabitants
- (3) Infrastructure of the terrain
- (4) Current political situation
- (5) Current economic conditions
- (6) Ideological qualities of enemy leaders
- (7) Enemy capabilities
- (8) Presence of friendly guerrilla forces and resistance movements
- (9) Health and sanitation data
- (10) Natural geographical boundaries
- (11) Routes of communications

Once the unit has performed a suitable operation map of its area, it will proceed to gather, prepare, and transmit intelligence to the agency command.

The unit will continue conducting no more than patrols as security duties or until all personnel are once, likely familiar with the units area of operations. If possible, all available local radio sites will be plotted and an aircrew or codice will be recruited prior to contacting local resistance elements. This is to allow the unit to stockpile rescue supplies that can't be brought in when initially infiltrated. Then, if contact with resistance elements occurs in belligerent, the unit will have sufficient material if forced to operate as a personal guerrilla column. The duties of the unit will depend on a mobile reception condition are necessary. Primary is the evaluation of the guerrilla unit to gather, determine its potential, operational effectiveness, ability to use the supplies received, and insure their knowing the mounting factors concerning selection of contacts.

All personnel involved in this operation are native to the area in which they

are to operate. The primary factors being considered concerning this mission are

- (1) Transportation and security of the unit while infiltrating Cuba.
- (2) The support of this unit once inside Cuba, and the tactical support once they are engaged in decisive operations.

- (1) Detailed list of the material that will be used to sustain the unit in operational status.
- (2) Detailed description of the training site.
- (3) Description of the zone in which the unit will operate.
- (4) List of the personnel involved in the operation.

EXERCISE SITE

The personnel selected for specialized training will be transferred by vehicle or airways to the AFSC FAIR AIR FORCE BASED 2020, MacDill, Florida. This area is located approximately 100 six miles North Northwest of the city of Miami, Florida.

Through the entire area is established a hunting range and under U.S. Government control only, the South Southeast corner of the reservation is used as such. The personnel involved will, of course, be restricted from entering the larger area.

As this is U.S. Government property, civilian personnel do not frequent the area. U.S. Air Force personnel rarely tour the areas not included in the hunting range target area of the U.S.A. center of the site. They are restricted from entering most the other areas due to the fact of one a single facility. The area is completely inaccessible by either air or land.

This area is extremely suitable and highly desirable due to the following:
- good hunting.

- (1) Good hunting areas and its proximity.
- (2) Good access to the Island of Cuba.
- (3) Good communications (air and sea) to the Island of Cuba.

- (6) Close proximity of civilians.
(7) The area is under control of the U.S. Government, thus anyone observing our personnel in training will assume that they are U.S. Air Force elements undergoing survival training.

Due to the character of this mission, the training site must be secure from civilian observation and it's existence must be maintained SECRET from all other organizations. To insure security, all personnel will be strictly prohibited from exiting the training area.
