

MEMORANDUM (CONFIDENTIAL)

The Cuban volunteers from the 50th of November Revolutionary Movement will be receiving in instance and concentrated special training period lasting several weeks. This special training will be to prepare all personnel for an extremely important mission that is based on a broad, realistic plan that encompasses the political, administrative, and military phases of contemplated operations. This training was conducted in order to initiate the primary phase of subversive operations, i.e., disregarding the present status of other anti-Soviet movements and conducting guerrilla operations. The assigned mission for the unit once trained and mobilized is to serve as a mobile reception committee for the channeling of supplies and equipment to the better guerrilla bands and resistance groups operating within the unit's zone of action. It is imperative that all airdrops and airdrops be under the control and supervision of specially trained personnel that have been infiltrated previously for this duty. This is due to the time that is required to train intelligence reception committee personnel in a hostile area, having only questionable local contacts.

In a more advanced phase, the unit will be able to furnish instructors, radio, demolition and communication specialists, etc. to the local guerrilla bands. Operating as a mobile reception committee, the unit will be contacted by the guerrilla and guerrilla elements as their only contact with the outside world. The unit will staff making a continuous effort to bring about the reformation of guerrilla bands operating in proximity, it is probable at a later date that this mobile unit will become the headquarters element that directs all local and guerrilla activities for the entire zone.

Included in the mobile unit's mission is the preparation of radio personnel to have as access to the radio recruited elements that will be organized after the unit is in a secure and effective operational status. The unit will be in a position

state of readiness to cover contact with one guerrilla unit so that it may serve as a reception committee for another more distant unit.

Immediately after being infiltrated into Cuba, the unit will proceed to conduct numerous reconnaissance points of the area in which it plans to conduct future operations.

Among the numerous objectives of the reconnaissance points is intelligence relating to:

- (1) Means methods of operation
- (2) Attitudes of local inhabitants
- (3) Information of the terrain
- (4) Current political situation
- (5) Current economic conditions
- (6) Biographical sketches of enemy leaders
- (7) Enemy capabilities
- (8) Presence of friendly guerrilla forces and resistance elements
- (9) Health and sanitation data
- (10) Natural geographical boundaries
- (11) Routes of communication

Once the unit has prepared a working operations map of its area, it will proceed to gather, prepare, and transmit intelligence to the agency concerned.

The unit will continue conducting its many reconnaissance points as security offices or until all personnel are completely familiar with the unit's area of operations. If possible, all available local cache sites will be plotted and an airstrip or landing zone will be established prior to conducting local resistance elements. This is to allow the unit to establish secure supply lines that couldn't be brought in when initially infiltrated. Thus, if contact with resistance elements results in betrayal, the unit will have sufficient material if forced to operate as a part of guerrilla column. The duties of the unit when detailed as a mobile reception committee are numerous. Primary is the evaluation of the guerrilla unit in question, determine its potential, operational effectiveness, ability to use the supplies reported, and insure their knowing the prevailing factors governing selection of caches.

The personnel involved in this operation are native to the area in which they

are to operate. The primary factors being developed concerning this mission are:

- (1) Transportation and security of the unit while infiltrating Cuba.
- (2) The support of this unit once inside Cuba, and the tactical support once they are engaged in decisive operations.

Attached are the following:

- (1) Detailed list of the material that will be used to maintain the unit in operational status.
- (2) Detailed description of the training site.
- (3) Description of the zone in which the unit will operate.
- (4) List of the personnel involved in the operation.

RESTRICTIONS

The personnel selected for specialized training will be transferred by vehicle or aircraft to the ARMY PARK AIR FORCE BOMBING RANGE, Area Park, Florida. This area is located approximately 121 air miles North Northeast of the city of Miami, Florida.

Though the entire area is considered a bombing range and under U.S. Government control, only the South Southeast sector of the reservation is used as such. The personnel involved would, of course, be restricted from entering the larger area.

As this is U.S. Government property, civilian personnel do not frequent the area. U.S. Air Force personnel surely fear the sectors not included in the bombing range target area at the S.E.S. sector of the site. They are restricted from entering the other sectors due to the lack of even a simple security. The area is completely inaccessible by other vehicles.

This area is extremely sensitive and highly desirable due to the following physical factors:

- (6) Close proximity of aircraft.
- (7) The area is under control of the U.S. Government, thus anyone observing our personnel in training will assume that they are U.S. Air Force elements undergoing survival training.

Due to the character of this mission, the training site must be secure from civilian observation and its existence must be maintained SECRET from all other organizations. To insure secrecy, all personnel will be strictly prohibited from exiting the training area.
