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MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Conversation with Messrs [Redacted] re [Redacted]

1. This morning, after discussions with key officers of the Division, Mr. Bulik and I met with [Redacted] regarding the visa application of [Redacted]. We said that we thought [Redacted] was applying for a visa to visit the U. S. and wanted to make sure the application was not turned down. However, we emphasized the sensitivity of the matter and [Redacted] on how it could be handled without revealing our operational interest. [Redacted] he was at a loss to know how to proceed, and said he thought we should consult [Redacted]. [Redacted] we explained the problem to him, pointing out that in the normal course of events, there was some danger that a visa application for [Redacted] might be rejected since he had formerly served as a military attache abroad and thus was doubtlessly carried on the records as an intelligence officer.

the information provided by [REDACTED] was of unique and outstanding value, that this was by far the most productive intelligence operation he had ever known of and that, with the possible exception of technical sources, nothing else had ever produced material of such concern to the national interests.

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4. [REDACTED] somewhat reassured by this and expressed a desire to see some of the recent [REDACTED] reports, which I promised to bring over and show him in the near future. As examples of some of the reports, I mentioned the Soviet awareness of [REDACTED]

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[REDACTED] he had not read this report and would very much like for me to bring it over and show him.

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5. I later reported the above to Mr. Helms who was disturbed that we had revealed [REDACTED] identity and said that, while perhaps we had no alternative, in the future he wished to be consulted before we took any such step. He also asked that we call [REDACTED] impress upon him the importance of the handling the matter with the utmost discretion. Mr. Bulik later called [REDACTED] and emphasized the security problem in the strongest terms.
