1. As you were advised via reference, a two-way pass took place between [Redacted] and [Redacted] at the reception given by IDENTITY I in his apartment on 27 August. [Redacted] passed to [Redacted] the ops message received from Headquarters (with postscript), and the document received from HQ. Enclosure 1 to this dispatch is the material received from [Redacted]. Enclosure 2 (with identities under separate cover) is [Redacted] report of the circumstances under which the pass was made.

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2. Time is short and the pouch closes within the hour. I will therefore keep my comments brief:

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the pass did not come off as planned (via drop), it would not have come off at all if [REDACTED] had not decided to take the proper action.

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b. [REDACTED] had been briefed to gently but firmly take the initiative with regard to the pass and to maintain it. Unfortunately, [REDACTED] did not exactly permit this to happen, and instead chose to go into a play which he had used in an earlier encounter with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] had been prepared for this possibility, but we had hoped that [REDACTED] would be ^{more} inclined to follow [REDACTED] lead on the latter's home territory. We will utilize our two recent experiences with [REDACTED] to attempt to make our next contact with him a little more certain, if we can.

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c. [REDACTED] was briefed to be alert to the opportunity to passively collect data as to [REDACTED] present circumstances and future plans within the context of normal reception chatter. Aside from [REDACTED] expressed hopes to travel to the US in the indefinite future, nothing of any consequence resulted from the conversation between [REDACTED] & [REDACTED]

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2. The floor plan of IDEN 15 apartment is the same as mine. Considering the circumstances, I would be reasonably certain that [REDACTED] would see anyone who might be in a position to observe him rendezvous with [REDACTED] in the particular bathroom used. I therefore am inclined to believe he was not observed.

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2. We are pleased that [REDACTED] and IDEN 3 did not repeat their Gold Dust touris performance of the 4th of July. You will note that Enclosure 1 includes photographs of ^{PETROCHENKE} IDEN 3 and samples of his handwriting. Accompanying messages yield no clue as to why.

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3. [REDACTED] reports that ^{GKKNR} IDEN 2 officials do not particularly like IDEN 1 and that they are now demonstrating a desire to deal directly with him ([REDACTED]). This is a most promising development and one we shall play in the hope that it will lead [REDACTED] in the direction we all want to see him go - toward more direct, adequately covered contact with [REDACTED].

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1. The exchange of packages between [redacted] and [redacted] took place at the reception given for the Tobacco delegation in IDEN 1's apartment. Present from [redacted]

present were all tobacco specialists, except for one young man [redacted] does not know, but who met the U.S. delegation at a lunch when the group first arrived and who is presumably a correspondent. He came with the tobacco specialists.

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2. The first Soviets to arrive were the tobacco specialists, who came about 1815 (the reception was from 1800 to 2000). [redacted] arrived about 1830, and, [redacted] thinks, he came alone. He

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moved toward [redacted] slowly and they talked for a few minutes with [redacted] (and Peter MACDONNELL. [redacted] then moved off, and in a few minutes went in and loaded the drops (the package taped to the underside of the water tank cover of the toilet in one of the bathrooms - see below). He came out and rejoined the

party from another door, and moved slowly toward the other side of the room, where [redacted] was

still talking to MACDONNELL. The three talked together for a moment and then MACDONNELL moved off to ask someone a question. [redacted] then

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Julien F. Macdonald

[redacted] said, in English, "I have a small package for you. Do you have something for me?" [redacted] 1.3(a)(4)

answered "yes, go to the ^{bathroom,} toilet, through this door and turn right, under the lid of the toilet tank."

As soon as [redacted] said "bathroom," [redacted] said "yes, yes!" HACDONVEL and DIKE DAVIES then approached, and the conversation turned to innocuous subjects. ~~After a few~~

3. After a few minutes [redacted] said "this is a nice apartment. How many rooms? May I see it?"

[redacted] and DAVIES said "yes", and the three moved off, [redacted] leading. As they passed the bathroom [redacted] said "this is the main bathroom."

[redacted] went in, looked around, came out, & the three went into the hall, where IDEN I was showing ^{DANIELA IDEN I} the apartment. All went

into the children's bedroom, then out into the hall again, and past the bathroom. [redacted] 1.3(a)(4)

[redacted] said "May I see it?", and [redacted] and DAVIES said "Of course." IDEN I and ^{IDEN I} had by this time moved off, back to the party. [redacted] stood

aside to let DAVIES pass, and to said "Go ahead Dike." DAVIES said "I guess he doesn't need any help in there", and moved off. [redacted]

was left alone, and went into the bathroom with [redacted] and locked the door. [redacted] gave [redacted]

the package and said something like "for me," or "you have for me?" [redacted] said "Shh" and pointed to the toilet tank. [redacted] did not



move, so [redacted] took off the lid of the tank, turned it over and put it on the mat, and 1.3(a)(4)
 tore off the envelope and the extra tapes which had been left for [redacted] to fasten his package with. [redacted] ^{put} ~~and~~ the envelope in his pocket, ^{said "goodbye"} ~~and~~ and left as [redacted] unlocked the door. There was no one in the hall. [redacted] then relocked the door, flushed the toilet, put the lid back on the toilet, and stayed some 2 or three minutes washing his hands. ~~He~~ He then opened the door. There was still no one in the hall. He looked back and noticed that two handbrushes which had been on the lid had been left on the sink. He closed the door, replaced the brushes, and left the bathroom. There was still no one in the hall. He walked back to the group in the living room ^{via} ~~by~~ the long hallway, and entered the room at the opposite end from which [redacted] had entered when he returned.

Comment: [redacted] was obviously somewhat nervous, obviously had not gotten the message about the drop, and was in too much of a hurry. As before (4th July) he talked only in English when ~~he~~ talking about the operation. [redacted] thinks that [redacted] had his mind set on a pass similar to that used in the past and therefore did not listen to anything beyond what he was told the places of the exchange. [redacted] does not think any of this was apparent to anyone else, however
